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DEDDINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Meeting in Town Hall 20 October 2010

The meeting was chaired by Jim Flux and was well attended but unfortunately by no members of the public. The PC still needs to co-opt a further member and it is hoped someone who cares about the interests of the parish will make him or herself known to Lorraine Watling. The main issue of interest was the expiry of the Town Hall lease and what is to become of this rather neglected building at the heart of the Parish.

Planning:

New Applications

1 Park View, New St, felling a eucalyptus tree, no objection. *Land to rear of End Cottage, The Stile*, second application for a single-storey residence and PC will make the same objections as before. *Old Farmhouse, New St*, installation of Velux roof lights, various windows and internal works, no objection with qualification. *Ilbury House, New St*, conversion of existing outbuilding to self-contained residential accommodation, no objection with qualification. *Hempton House, Snake Hill Lane, Hempton*, canopy to front and side of the house, no objection.

Approvals, details previously published in *DN*:

Stable End, St Thomas St; Priory Dene, Hudson St; the Antique Centre; Orchard Bank, Goose Green; The Retreat, Chapel Sq; 1 Park View, New St; Hamisaren, 2 Castle End, Castle St.

Finance & General Purposes

Support is urged for the connection of fibre optic high-speed broadband; your registered votes count – please go to Deddington OnLine Forum>Deddington Matters>Deddington Discussions.

The Local Government Boundary Commission is considering the Oxford County Council (OCC) composition and constituency boundaries; if you wish to make your opinion known, please contact Lorraine.

Consideration is being given to investing PC funds in a solar electric generating array at the Windmill Centre.

Environment & Recreation

The wildflower project has now begun at the cemetery

and seeds, plug plants and bulbs have been planted.

The dilemma of security for the all-weather court has been raised again. The chain-link fencing which had been cut to enable unauthorised access has been repaired again. Cycling on the courts destroys the playing surface and to prevent this, the gate is locked; the damage caused is not widely appreciated.

Highways

Speeding and intrusive parking are persistent causes of concern. The Highways group is constrained by the limits to their delegated powers. Responsibility rests with OCC and the Highways group has a frustrating time getting attention paid to our Parish concerns. If you would like to help, volunteers are being recruited for speed monitoring. Those selected will be trained to operate a radar speed 'gun' and become part of a local team. Volunteers should contact Lorraine.

Town Hall

The Town Hall is a sorry tale. To repair the structure, install modern lighting, heating and to redecorate will cost an estimated £150,000. Deddington Charity Estates (DCE) do not have such money and are reluctant to launch an appeal at a time of financial stringency. The plan is to delay the main works and to undertake only emergency works to maintain the structure with some superficial cleaning and maintenance. The consequence is that the future of the hall is unclear. It is obvious that DCE need help and anyone who has the time and initiative to drive this project forward should step forward. In future the Council will only meet in the Town Hall in the summer; other meetings will be held in Hempton, the Holly Tree Club and the Windmill Centre. PC has agreed with DCE to hand over their current responsibilities at the end of the lease.

Opening Times: lunch and dinner Tuesday – Saturday.

Average Cost: starter £7, main course £13, dessert £6.

Are They Pleased to See You? Sally and Nick jointly own and manage the restaurant and Sally, who takes care of front of house, provides a friendly welcome.

Is the Restaurant Attractive? Housed in a listed building with open fireplace and window seat, the restaurant feels warm and intimate.

Was the Cooking Good? Nick, the chef, uses seasonal and locally sourced ingredients wherever possible and creates varied, imaginative and well presented dishes. Our starters included a foie gras and pistachio terrine, lamb sweetbreads and a smoked fish plate. All were first-rate. Among our main courses were roasted belly of pork with black pudding, a Mediterranean fish stew and an artichoke and goats cheese dish, which were all beautifully cooked. We finished by sharing some indulgent and delicious desserts.

No hesitation.


DEDDINGTON 150 YEARS AGO

The following are extracts from the diaries of the Rev. Cotton Risley for the month of November 1860:

9th November – Holford and I went to the Police Station to hear two assault cases – against Thos. Wilkins and William Kilby. Convicted them both. Wilkins was fined £1 and 10s.6d. costs and bound over in his own recognisance of £10 to keep the peace for 12 months towards all persons, especially towards Mary Ann Gardner the woman with whom he had co-habited for several years and by whom he has a family of 5 children. Kilby was fined in like sum and to be bound over as Wilkins was should he strike his wife again. Both to go to House of Correction for 3 weeks if the fines were not paid tonight – Wilkins paid his money, Kilby did not appear – on proof of summons the case was heard in his absence.

12th November – After luncheon Susan and I walked to the other side of Adderbury Bridge and back. *[I reckon this is about a three mile round trip.]*

17th November – A rainy morning which turned to snow which continued throughout the day till nearly 5pm., the ground being 2ins. deep at least, the first fall of the season.



20th November – Saw Kilby and his wife and persuaded them to try and live more peaceably together in the future. Called at E. Bennetts to order some Pudding Pies. J. Hopcraft at work here stopping out the rats.

22nd November – Wrote to Isaac Smith forgiving him his debt to me with interest, his wife having besought me to do so for the family's sake, 7 children, and her own. Holford and I went up to the Police Station and heard a case, 'Drunk and Disorderly' and of wilful damage against B. Sykes, committed him to House of Correction for 7 days and 14 days additional unless 10s. damage and costs were paid. This was his 4th conviction for drunkenness and riotous conduct. Our Annual Fair took place.

24th November – G. Ford met with an accident in the farmyard whilst helping to repair the pump there, he jumped off a ladder which was giving way and sprained his ankle. Dr. Morris attended him as his Club Doctor, who said there were no bones broken.

[WCR visited him daily for over a week as he had internal pain and periodically after that, he did not return to work until the New Year.]

FROM THE FIRE STATION

The last two months have been varied, with this month being quieter than usual and last month almost as busy as the rest of the year. Last month's 20 firecalls included a house fire in Hempton, an animal rescue, two caravan fires, a field fire, a road traffic collision, a car fire, and three false alarms along with a handful of standbys to Bicester and Banbury (as normal) but also three calls in as many days to stand by at Chipping Norton.

The housefire in Hempton was caused by a pile of DVDs and some blankets that had fallen onto an electric heater which was plugged into a 2-in-1 adapter, which was itself plugged into an extension lead. This in turn was plugged into an unswitched socket. I believe that the heater had an over-temperature sensor which cut out once the heater got too hot, but then reset itself once it had cooled and allowed the heater to operate again. This cycle of heating and cutting out would have happened many times, and eventually the heat melted the DVDs and set the blanket smouldering. We found that the first floor of the property was heavily smoke-logged but with no visible flames. After locating and rescuing the owner's dog, we searched the first floor using our hands and a thermal imaging camera. As we entered the rear bedroom for the second time, the flames leapt up from underneath the desk but were quickly dealt with using a high pressure hose. After ventilating the property, we were able to make it safe, and remove the damaged equipment. Luckily, the owner was out at the time of the incident, but did return whilst we were in attendance. The brigade was able to offer some additional assistance by calling on our Red Cross Response Unit who looked after the owner and his immediate welfare needs.

This month's 12 firecalls included a kitchen fire, a car fire, a road traffic collision, a lady locked inside her house, and a handful of false alarms.

Sometimes Control will send an officer rather than commit us, so that it keeps us available for other incidents. What I would say to you all is if you have had a fire that has extinguished itself naturally, or you have dealt with it yourself, still call it in – play it safe!

This month, we say a fond farewell to our station manager, Paul Debling, who is retiring after some 30-plus years in the fire service. We wish him and his wife all the best and are truly going to miss him. Also, we say farewell to Watch Manager Anne Waters, who after 14 years in the service has decided to pursue a different direction in life. Anne has had such a positive influence in the brigade by supporting women in the fire service and has been chair of the networking for women group. We'll be having a leaving bash for both Paul and Anne in the near future, where current and past firefighters will be able to say goodbye. At the same time, we also wish to welcome our new Station Manager, Gary Mattingley, who takes over at the end of September. I think we're in for a different style of management in the future! Gary has served both at Rewley Road and The Slade in Oxford, before transferring to the Fire Service College at Moreton-in-Marsh where he has worked on the development of things like the High Volume Pumps that the government have purchased for the whole country as part of the 'New Dimension' programme.

Well, it's now the time of year again when we all start to light fires and wood burners, so don't forget to have your chimney swept and get rid of all of the soot and carbon deposits that were left from previous years. In particular, pay attention to ridges and shelves that some older chimneys have, as the build-up of soot here can cause a chimney fire, and check your smoke detectors whilst you are at it!

UP THE ALLOTMENT ...

You may be one of the organised ones whose allotment is ready for mulch. If this is the case you may be pondering why use mulch and which one should you use.

Mulch is not only used for suppressing weeds but also for retaining water. It is also useful for conserving warmth in the soil and therefore encourages earthworm activity which helps to improve soil structure. Mulch also adds nutrients to feed your plants. You need to mulch before it gets too cold to seal in the warmth rather than the cold.

So if you've decided to mulch your allotment, the question now is, which mulch? Garden compost, farmyard manure, mushroom compost or green manure or plastic?

Garden compost tends to be low in nutrients but is excellent for improving the humus of the soil and is free!

Farmyard manure will contain straw or other bedding material, so the quality can vary. This is great for

the vegetable plot but ensure it is well rotted. It can be hard to handle.

Mushroom compost is a by-product from mushroom growers and is made from the composting straw and casing used to grow mushrooms. The casing is often made of soil and lime and often has a high pH. It is a good soil conditioner supplying some plant nutrients. If you can get hold of it this is fabulous stuff.

Green manure is a living mulch. It helps to hold on to nutrients that would otherwise be washed away from the soil, while its roots aerate the soil and prevent erosion. Grazing rye, forage peas or winter tares are ideal for autumn sowing and can be dug into the ground for spring.

When you've decided which mulch to use, cover the soil four inches deep to suppress weed growth.

Then sit back and enjoy the quiet time.

... AND DOWN ON THE FARM

The farming year has once again turned full circle. The seed for next year's harvest has all been sown and, as I write, the last of the planted wheat is showing through in drill. The oil seed rape which was planted at the end of August is now well established and will soon be entering its winter dormancy period. The bees have all been fed with sugar syrup and treated for the dreaded Varroa mite and are now making good use of the ivy crop to top up their winter food stores. A good crop of ivy at this time of the year will give the bees a good start next spring. The ivy pollen is collected and stored to feed any early brood which, given a mild winter, will be appearing long before the spring flowers get going. With the exception of two colonies which were hit very hard by wasps, the bees at Home Farm seem to be in good shape and well set up for the winter. It will soon be time for me to start making yet more hives for next spring. If things go according to plan all the colonies that survive the winter will be given new brood boxes which have been fitted out with new wax foundation and frames, with the best of the old woodwork being

cleaned and sterilized before going into store for use another year. It is a lot of work making the hives and involves shaking the bees from the old frames into a new hive (shook swarming). It is a method we use as part of our integrated pest and disease control strategy to reduce the numbers of Varroa mite and other diseases that can build up in the old wax, propolis and other general detritus that collects in the cracks and crevices of the hive. Anyway, that's my excuse for disappearing into a nice warm carpentry shop in the depths of winter.

Big Fred, our hired-in Cotswold ram, arrived at the beginning of October, so assuming Fred is up to the job next March we should see the first Cotswold lambs to be born in the parish for 150 years. The Charollais rams went out with the main Mule flock in mid-October, so we should see them start to drop their lambs in mid-March. So what with the bees and the sheep it seems there could be a lot of buzzing and bleating come next spring down on the farm.

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
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Deddington Charity Estates

The Almshouses continue to demand our attention this year with a fire, burst cold-water tank and, by coincidence, we have had the chance to offer an almshouse to a new resident. The notice of the vacancy was posted around the Parish asking for interested parties to apply and we expect to have a new resident soon.

The Pest House Field raises my first question. Does anybody have a photograph or any printed material, rosettes or anything similar, which relate to the time in the 1940s, 1950s and perhaps 1960s when it was used for scrambling? At the moment it is a fond memory for a few but it would be great to include some detail on our website - perhaps the details of a winner or two!

The Town Hall will be returned to us at the end of October. The Parish Council is surrendering the lease after 44 years and we are looking forward to the day when we can start giving it a new lease of life. Is anyone willing to help us clean and paint it any time between 3 and 15 November? We would really appreciate your help.

We are in an interesting situation. We are responsible for a unique building in the heart of the community that has changed very little in the two centuries since it was built. It is one of the Deddington, even Banburyshire's, icons. On financial grounds we would make money by converting it into shops and offices, some have even suggested a public lavatory, others a couple of almshouses. The Trustees are of the view that it should be restored and allowed to continue as a hall, available to the public, equipped as far as is practical for the disabled, but they also recognise that their decision is a balance between our heritage and the need to generate an income. Deddington and District History Society

Our October speaker, Liz Young, gave a wide-ranging talk on 'Churchyards and their Monuments'. Christian burials were originally placed around a stone cross, the area later becoming an enclosed churchyard. She told us about constant threats from animals and grave-robbers, and about various ingenious forms of protection. The familiar yew trees had the dual purpose of warding off evil spirits and, of course, of providing a supply of wood for longbows. One unexpected statistic: tombstones in a churchyard are likely to represent only 10–15% of the total population. Liz showed us various types of tombs, memorials and monuments. They featured a remarkable range of materials, from wood through to stone (local stone is best, marble unsuitable and bordering on the vulgar), brick, slate, and cast iron. Liz was especially interesting when explaining the symbolism of the decorative work on tombs.

The Oxfordshire Family History Society, which is recording all the county's churchyards, has reached Deddington. The survey of Deddington's churchyard will begin shortly. If anyone would like to take part in this fascinating and important project, let us know and we will put you in touch with the organisers.

Our speaker on 10 November will be an old favourite, Martin Way, on 'Cotswold Sheep and Shepherd-ing'. We are always delighted to see new members. Just turn up at the Windmill Centre on the second Wednesday of any month to be assured of a warm welcome.

WELL REMEMBERED

GROUP CAPTAIN DENYS HEYWOOD 1926–2010

Denys and I shared many common interests from our respective service careers and I feel very privileged to be writing this 'salute' to someone for whom I had the utmost personal and professional respect.

Denys was born in India but lived with relations in the UK during the war years. In 1944 he was allowed out of school to sign up for the Fleet Air Arm but was unable to find the RN recruiting office. He was about to give up when he saw the RAF office; the rest is history and the Navy lost a great flier.

In 1945 he was sent to the Middle East where aircraft and desert landings strips were often unreliable so accidents were common: in one he lost a couple of fingers, in another he had to bribe some Bedouins to guard the aircraft, rather than remove parts of it, while he went for help.

The 1950s included time flying with the Royal Navy from aircraft carriers, so achieving his schoolboy ambition. Cold war operations based in Germany – where his Soviet opposite numbers patrolled within sight just the other side of the border – also meant he was close to ski slopes. This was a sport he pursued all his life achieving the distinction of a free ski pass at 75. More importantly though, it was on the ski slopes that he met Buffy whom he married in 1957.

In 1964 he was promoted Wing Commander and appointed CO of the Dambusters squadron. His task was to maintain the Blue Steel nuclear deterrent mounted on Vulcan aircraft at full alert 24 hours a day. This tour was followed by three years in America, working largely underground with Strategic Air Command, interspersed with family caravan holidays exploring the States.

In 1971 he was promoted again and appointed Group Captain Flying at Akrotiri in Cyprus, then the biggest RAF flying base in the world; so a perfect posting for Denys to complete a career in which he flew so many different aircraft that his peers called him '57 varieties'. The family, now including Rob, Annabel, Carol and Simon, found life on a Mediterranean island pretty perfect too!

The Heywoods moved to Deddington in 1977 just after Denys retired. For 10 years he was Bursar at Tudor Hall School, then retired again to look after the grounds of Deddington Manor and enjoy playing sport. He was a lead player in the Deddington Tennis Club at which he excelled with deceptively casual expertise – along with squash and later golf – and skiing of course.

Deddington will remember Denys as a quietly courteous and enormously supportive member of the community with a mischievous sense of humour and always a twinkle in his eye.

They celebrated 62 years of married life earlier this year.

They moved to Hempton in 1985 and John particularly enjoyed the country life, which was perhaps surprising as he was a city man. He enjoyed holidays in France, where he went many times. He joined the village Church and became a member, committee man and secretary of the Friends of the Church, positions he only gave up during the last year. It was mainly his idea to restore the proposed new doors to the Gothic arches. John had strong views about things but he always put them over in a nice way. A Thanksgiving Service was held recently in St John's Church with a full congregation of family and friends. He will be sadly missed by all who knew him.
