
#### **Deddington through Facebook - October**

### Deddington and Parish Covid-19 Response Team



Oxfordshire health and care system briefing
A briefing from the Oxfordshire health and care system
regarding COVID-19 is now available, which contains information
which you may find useful.

The Oxfordshire Health and Care System, is made up of Oxfordshire CCG, Oxford Health NHS FT, Oxfordshire County Council and OUH.

OUH COVID-19 statistics now published every Thursday
From Thursday 22 October, the Government is publishing
weekly data on the number of COVID-19 cases in all NHS trusts
and information on daily admissions up to the preceding
Tuesday. As of Tuesday 20 October the data for OUH shows
that we had 16 patients with COVID-19 in the Trust. OUH is line
444 on the spreadsheet and the total number of beds occupied
by COVID-19 patients can be found on the All beds COVID tab.
You will need to scroll right to see the latest data.

Helping patients keep connected with friends and family Since June, OUH has adopted the 'Rule of One' approach to visiting – one visitor per inpatient for one hour once a day. This is reviewed regularly and there are some limited exceptions, for example in Maternity and Paediatrics – full details are on our website.

Patient and staff safety are our priority and so visiting restrictions are still in place – including in Outpatients departments, Emergency Departments, and Emergency Assessment Units, where patients should attend on their own unless there are exceptional circumstances.

We appreciate that restricting visiting is difficult for our patients which is why we have worked hard to bridge the gap and provide a range of 'virtual visiting' alternatives:

- Friends and family can still call our wards which have mobile phones which can be taken to the bedside
- We also have some tablet devices which are securely preloaded so patients can video call friends and family
- Our 'Keep in touch' service means friends and family can send messages and photos to their loved ones by emailing keepintouch@ouh.nhs.uk – our staff print them out and deliver them to patients on the wards

The rest of Oxfordshire will remain under the relatively relaxed Tier 1 restrictions for now.

According to Oxfordshire County Council, the Covid rates across the rest of the county continue to rise.

Cases per 100,000 are 151.5 in Cherwell, 92.2 in South Oxfordshire, 91.2 in Vale of White Horse and 109.4 in West Oxfordshire.

The decision to keep the rest of Oxfordshire in Tier 1 has been taken by Government despite advice from the county's director of public health and the backing of local political leaders of all parties, local business leaders at Oxford Local Enterprise Partnerships and representatives of local health trusts.

lan Hudspeth, Leader of Oxfordshire County Council, said: "The continued rise in numbers across the county has once more been discussed with central government and Public Health England and it has been agreed that this is the appropriate moment for Oxford move to tier 2.

"However, we remain seriously concerned about the rise in the number of cases across the county, and not just Oxford. We are deeply disappointed that despite clear evidence showing the virus is now spreading to older and more vulnerable communities across the county, our request that Oxfordshire as a whole should move to tier 2 was not approved.
