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**Meeting in Town Hall - 15 October 2003**

PRESENT: Cllrs FLUX (chair), Alton, Ellis, Harvey, Haslam, Rollason, Spencer, Squires, Swash, Watts, Westley, Wood, C/Cllr Jelf, the Clerk, the Minutes Secretary and 6 members of the public.

**GEOFF TODD**

Cllr Todd is ill and is now in the Horton Hospital. PC sent him best wishes for a speedy recovery.

**10-MINUTE OPEN FORUM**

Barry Haller, Deddington Mill, thanked the Chairman, PC, C/Cllr Jelf, D/Cllr O'Sullivan and all those who took seriously the OCC proposal to locate, on Deddington's doorstep, a transit camp for gypsies and travellers. He urged PC to keep the parish informed of developments.

Raymond Morris, Secretary of Deddington Royal British Legion Branch, and also of the Legion Club, summarised the events of 2002 and 2003 that led up to the application to the Justices for a change of Licence to a new, commercial organisation. No changes to opening hours etc would be involved. After several deferments there has still been no hearing by the Justices.

**PROPOSED TRANSIT SITE FOR GYPSIES AND TRAVELLERS**

OCC's answers to the questions raised at September's Public Meeting (see October DEDDINGTON NEWS) were given within a week, and are available in Deddington Library and on the parish website. PC was formally advised on 10 October that OCC would not be progressing their planning application in October. An Executive Council meeting in December will review the County Council's strategy countywide, possibly bringing in neighbouring areas of Thames Valley. It is likely that their Scrutiny committee will look at the issues in November. This means that any planning application for a new Travellers' Transit Site would not be possible until the latter part of 2004. OCC emphasise that the potential for such a site in the Deddington area will be part of any amended strategy. Objections to planning proposals are taken into account only if they are made within the regulation 3 week period.

PC decided that no parish referendum is necessary, because the public meeting gave a clear mandate. However, opinion may not be unanimous and parishioners are encouraged to make their views known. Anonymous circulars are not wanted and should be ignored. PC will pursue ways of influencing OCC policy, with C/Cllr Jelf's advice on timing. The issue has not gone away. A solution must be found.

**IDEAS WANTED - 1**

Parishioners are invited to put forward suggestions for improving facilities/access for disabled people at public places. Contact the Clerk on 337447.

**NEWS IN BRIEF**

Cllr Squires was elected PC vice-chairman in place of Cllr Harvey, who has resigned but will remain a Council member.

Cllr Wood succeeds Cllr Todd as Chairman of Finance & General Purposes Working Group.

PC is looking at all options for the management of grass-

cutting in the parish.

Deddington Colts were commended for their efforts to sort out car parking problems near the Castle Grounds on football days. PC Middleton is monitoring the situation.

PC no objections to (i) No 29 Gaveston Gardens - single storey rear extension. (ii) High Bank, St Thomas Street - fell conifers and reshape plum and damson. PC recommended replacement planting. (iii) St James Farm, Clifton - erect 2m high wall and gate, and make outbuilding into office. PC stipulated that it should remain one property. (iv) Mullions, Castle Street - convert existing garage to study/office with garage, to be sold as one property.

CDC approvals (v) Loke Cottage, Castle Street - fell silver birch. (vi) The Bungalow, Earls Lane - single storey extension and conservatory. (vii) Deddington Mill - re-roof SW elevation in reclaimed slate. (viii) Home Farm Clifton - new house, double garage and access. (ix) No 2 Archway Court, New Street - change from offices to residential. (x) Habitat, Hopcraft Lane - solar panels for swimming pool. (xi) The Finishing Touch, Market Place - alterations to shop front. (xii) Southgate, Market Place - replacement windows. (xiii) Cotswold House, New St - convert integral garage to office. (xiv) No 21 Gaveston Gardens - convert garage to living space.

Deddington Map Group made over to the parish a further £500 from sales revenue.

Membership of Oxfordshire Rural Communities Council (ORCC) was renewed at £20.

Affordable housing is on the agenda at ORCC's AGM. PC to be represented.

**WINDMILL CENTRE**

Trustees wish to change the status to a Limited Company but with no change of objectives. PC agreed to transfer the lease to the new Company, subject to it being granted charitable status. (Cllrs Flux and Rollason declared interest.)

**PARISH FINANCES**

Invoices passed for payment totalled £5,686.59, including £1,397.18 imprest, mainly stewards' wages; £2,049.20 Playsafe Playgrounds for teenage shelter at BMX track; £765.22 DesignGro for grasscutting.

Investments totalled £533,100.86, of which £11,726.89 Barclays @ 0.1% instant access; £1,000 Bradford & Bingley @ 3.4% on 120 days; £520,373.97 West Bromwich @ 3.4% overnight.

Accounts for 2002/3 were approved and will now go for external audit.

### BRASS BITS CONCERT

Over 100 people, young and old, filled the Parish Church on October 11 to listen to something a little different from "sweet singing in the choir". Grahame Wallington and his musicians made the place jump as the sound of their instruments rose to the roof. The first half of the programme included favourites such as There's No Business Like Show Business, a cha cha cha version of 's Wonderful (with child accompaniment) and three soloists: Keith Bailey on the E flat tuba, Les Taylor on the euphonium and Alison Stevens who sang I Dreamed a Dream, the first of her two solos. In the second half we were invited to sing along to Elton John's Crocodile Rock and, with a tear in the eye, to You'll Never Walk Alone. An encore, Offenbach's Can Can, raised hopes that two members of the audience were so inspired by the rhythm and pzazz of the performance that they were about to high-kick it down the aisles. Well, next time.

Brass Bits was formed about five years ago. The musicians, both men and women, come from as far away as Swindon and Milton Keynes, but regard Deddington as their home base and chose the Parish Church as the setting for their first formal concert. The vigour and variety of their programme (Grahame Wallington's back, as well as his baton, registered every crescendo, every change of tempo) had the audience asking for a return visit.

The concert was in aid of the Church's Living Rooms fund-raising (Brass Bits already supports two other charities) and we are promised further rousing evenings in connection with this project. *Kristin Thompson*

In the last instalment of this survey of changes in the last ten years, we bemoaned the fact that two popular premises were closed, and we are delighted that both "the deli" (Foodies) and Bowlers have reopened. Returning to the S.W. corner of the Square, what is now the Police Office, (having in living memory been a tea shop and two separate restaurants) in 1993 became "Dexters" run by James Dexter Harrison. When he felt the need to expand and moved across the square into what is now Bowlers, the premises did not stay empty for very long but were turned into its present use. Moving a few yards further north we come to what is now again a private residence. Clydesdale had been home of the eponymous beautician's shop, which has now moved up a short distance into Red Lion Cottage. So this swap leaves the balance between residential and business premises unaltered. Next to the original Clydesdale is a house which used to contain a shop called the Sale Room, a slightly curious mix of antiques, second-hand furniture, electrical goods and crafted wooden articles. It has been turned into offices as an extension to the publishing office of Philip Allen, here again a firm bearing the name of its proprietor.

A recent change is the establishment of Bluebells the florists, formerly of Hudson Street, into part of the Old Bakery, most of which is now an estate agents' office and so no longer a retail outlet. Adjoining this on the corner of the Tchure, Viva has been selling ladies fashions for 11 years.

### **Mrs. McKERN'S CHESTNUT**

There has been quite a lot of talk about our Market Place in the DEDDINGTON NEWS lately, and that reminded me of Jane McKern's efforts with the Chestnut. In the early '80s, Leo McKern, the actor who played Rumpole so brilliantly, had bought the big house at the top end of Chapman's Lane. Leo was doing a succession of plays at Oxford Playhouse, and a TV Serial 'Our Mutual Friend'. The family liked their children to live at home, not to board, and were keen on education. So they followed Leo around the country, wherever job and school fitted together. Harriet went to Overthorpe Hall. That year, and it was an exceptionally dry and hot summer, two little Chestnut trees had been planted in the Market Place, one by the bus stop and the other outside Tucker's. The latter began to shrivel for lack of water and looked doomed. But along came Jane Holland, Mrs Leo. She was also an actress, a small, determined person with strong principles on conservation and diet. She never touched food before mid-day, it was said. But the tree: Jane decided that the tree must live, so every morning she walked up from Chapman's Lane to the Market carrying two heavy metal watering cans, filled and refilled them in one of the shops and watered the tree. The Chestnut survived and is now big enough to give shade to a bench under it. Thank you, Jane. Leo died not so long ago. He was a wonderful actor. Who will ever forget his Rumpole? But she, too, deserves to be remembered for what she did for our village.

The east side of the Market Place is probably the most important retail emporium in the town, "the Co-op" or more simply The Shop. Until recently run as part of Bernard Hughes' chain of Acorn Stores, it was sold to the very large Oxford, Swindon & Gloucester Co-operative Society, and provides virtually all the basic essentials, which confers on Deddington amenities not enjoyed by so many other communities of our size.

On the South side the larger of the two shops is the "Finishing Touch" a salon in what was briefly in 1998/99 an antique shop. Before that it had been for generations the village butchers, but in 1998 the last manager gave in to the twin threats of a serious illness and an excessive rent review. So now we have three hairdressers and no butcher....

The last shop on that side is already almost in Hudson Street. "Little Princes & Princesses" provides chic children's clothes. It was established in 2001 taking over the tiny shop from Bluebells when that moved to its present shop in the Square.

The Parish Council was formally advised on 10 October that the County Council will not now be progressing this planning application in October. The notification stated that:

*"In coming to this conclusion, officers have taken account of the local opinion of Deddington residents, but, notwithstanding this, the potential for a transit site in this area will still be part of their amended strategy. They will now be taking a paper to the County Council Executive in December which will set out both the general approach and specific actions.*

*It is probable that the Scrutiny Committee will want to call this paper in prior to the Executive in which case the first public airing will be in the second half of November."*

The Parish Council will ensure that you are kept informed about progress on this matter.

The Council's working group will continue to monitor the situation and will report back to the Parish Council meeting on 19 November.

**ON THE FARM**

October has been another dry month here at Clifton, which has made for a very dusty planting time. The winter cereal crops for next year's harvest have now all been drilled leaving just the winter beans to be ploughed in during November. The lack of rain has meant that the August-planted oil seed rape has had a very uneven germination, with some seedlings only just coming through and other plants with 4 true leaves. The September drilled wheat is also very uneven, with large areas still to germinate and the last 2 fields planted in mid-October look more like rock strewn deserts than English arable fields. However as yet I have not seen any camels.



The grass keep for the sheep is becoming very short and we may soon have to start to give them some extra help, which will make things difficult if we have a long winter as we could run short of winter feed. The rams have gone out and are hard at it so we should see the first lambs in mid-March with the replacement Mule Gimmer lambs (Swaledale x Bluefaced Leicester) dropping their lambs in April.

The warm autumn weather has meant that the bees have had a good time with the ivy and they have now been put to bed for the winter with a good feed of sugar syrup. The warm autumn weather has also made for a very colourful back end to the year with the hedgerows ablaze with autumn colour - you could see them through the clouds of dust from the cultivators.

Our summer visitors have now all gone south for the winter and it was very sad that so few Swallows returned last spring to breed. Perhaps we shall see more next year and we shall soon see the first of the winter migrants arriving to stock up on the hedgerow fruits before moving on. The open warm weather has also meant that we have seen Dragonflies on the wing in late October and there has been a very late hatch of Brimstone Butterflies which are normally seen from March until June. I only hope that next year's numbers will not be reduced as it is the first Butterfly to hatch in the spring along with the Orange Tip, and you know summer is on the way.

As there is now a breathing space whilst the County Council reviews its choice of proposed sites for Travellers, may I make some suggestions in case the Deddington site is again put forward.

1. That sufficient time be allowed to circulate a clear statement of why this site was chosen. Not all of us have unlimited access to the Web so some old fashioned paper copies should be available.

2. That anyone wishing to make a point does so over their own name and address, and not anonymously. The deluge of unattributable leaflets and notices that has descended on the village debases the debate. A "hotmail" address is not an identity!

3. If a public meeting is called, those proposing the site be given sufficient time to make their case before questions or general discussion are allowed. If we are to approach an issue of this nature democratically and fairly, there has to be an informed debate and open discussion.

Is there a case for arranging a meeting between a group of Parishioners and a group of Travellers to discuss the concerns and mutual expectations arising from any proposed Travellers' site in the Parish? Though I understand that the recent proposal (a transit site by the Milton Road) has been put 'on hold', this presumably will not be indefinitely. If various representatives of the community (PC, school, youth groups, church, businesses and concerned Parishioners generally) could meet a similar number of Travellers, and all agreed to listen as well as air their views, we might have a better idea of what we are talking about.

So then, time to draw breath over the Travellers' site proposal. Time to consider the kneejerk first reaction. Time to assess dispassionately the responses to queries regarding the site. Time to steal ourselves to accept a difficult challenge. Time to decide not to be dull, predictable and unimaginative, but to make a difference. Time for Deddington to propose a new identity for Middle England - trusting, open, caring, adventurous. (Time also to decide, because we are caring, to dig deep to manage compensation, if need be, for those who might seriously suffer from the site.) Time to look at a destiny and seize it. Time to opt for something startling, something selfless. Better this than nogypsiesindeddington (substitute blacks, Asians, Jews or gays for gypsies and see how it feels).

### The Flower Garden

I should have known better ! To praise the weather before the season is over is not a good idea. We had such a wonderful June and July, that it was hard not to comment on it. But it ended in tears. The drought went on and on, the flowers looked dreadful, together with a disappearing lawn - it was all very sad. So, the only thing to do is to draw a line under it all and start again.

I was very pleased with the hanging basket in the front of the house, though, it has been splendid, and that goes to show that a very small area of soil can be kept in good trim by constant feeding and watering. So, I shall get my Wisley 'Container Planting' tape out again, as I do every autumn, and refresh my memory with pictures of what they do at the RHS. The troughs and bowls will be emptied and refilled with new soil. I shall keep the trailing ivy to use again. Then come pansies and forget-me-nots; the latter self-seeding from the garden, the pansies bought. And in between lots of bulbs, Grape Hyacinths, white narcissus or whatever you personally prefer. The man on the tape urges his viewers to plant generously, which is all right for Wisley, but rather expensive for ordinary folk. The results will be lovely, I'm sure. Apart from the Wisley artistry, we have a few terra cotta pots, and those will be planted with small tulips, really bright ones, and pansies over the top.

Good gardening to you, enjoy yourselves out there.

### Good Companions

What is worse than biting an apple and finding a worm inside? (Answer: Finding half a worm). We are getting to the time of the first P in gardening - Planning. The others of course are Planting, Potting and Picking but you could also include Protecting. I've been thinking about the sort of things to grow, whether to buy seeds, take cuttings or buy plants in the Spring and the question of Companion Planting arose. For those who don't know, this is making use of nature's preferences and planting crops which go well together. According to Bob Flowerdew in 'Go Organic,' beans and peas grow badly close to garlic and onions, but are very friendly with lettuces, strawberries and tomatoes. Brassicas enjoy being near celery, dill and nasturtiums. Many herbs grown around the vegetables are useful in keeping pests at bay and some will attract natural pollinators and predators of pests. Best of all, it seems, are French marigolds whose strong smell drives away many of the less attractive insects and so protects the crop, but plant old-fashioned varieties which have not had the smell reduced! Encouraging beneficial animals by not having the garden so squeaky clean that there are no hiding places for them to hibernate or nest in, is also helpful. We found a hedgehog in the kitchen recently, but felt this was taking things too far. I hope s/he is now shackled up under a pile of leaves and sticks, ready for the Spring and to feast on the slugs that chew my Hostas.

**Deddington & District History Society**

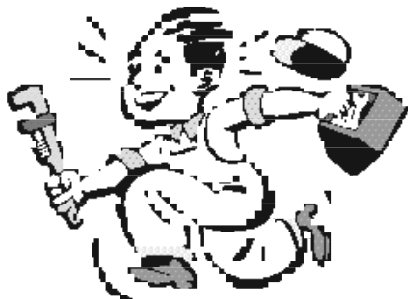

## Deddington Map Group

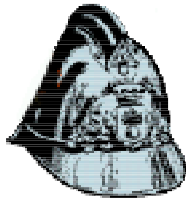

## LIVING HISTORY

FREDERICK WILLIAM DAVIS (1888-1954)

As Topper Davis reflects, the village community must have had an especially soft spot for his father because he loved to help out in any practical way he could and had the drive and often quite cheeky confidence to achieve successfully what he set out to do. Fred the worker and Fred the jester therefore qualified for the honour of village nicknames. It follows that when Fred ferried passengers to and from Deddington and Aynho Station in his father's trap he became known as 'CABBY'. (Return fare 1/6d). To his merry mates in the pub however he was 'DONOGHUE' and was proud of this inferred likeness of him to the famous Irish jockey, Steve Donoghue, who rode 14 classic winners between 1915 and 1937. According to Topper his father was also well pleased when referred to as 'COLONEL' which no doubt reflected on the smart and competent way he sat and exercised any horse in his care.

No one can remember now what attracted Fred, who served in the Yeomanry in World War I, and who enjoyed the kudos of free village spirit, to become fettered to the Church in the job of Verger, Sexton, gravedigger, cleaner, decorator, organ blower, sidesman, bellringer of curfew, Vicar's instrument to toll the bell to announce a death to the village, groundsman in the churchyard and keeper of the keys to God's House. I have my own thoughts on the subject. The Vicar, Dr Frost, was just like Fred interested in the wellbeing of his parishioners. While he concentrated on their souls, Fred became the perfect counterpart to keep up their spirits. The formal proposal for his appointment as Sexton and Verger was seconded and carried by the PCC on 29 April 1931.

Naturally there had to be give and take in the relationship between Vicar and Sexton which is best explained by the following revelations. Vicar Frost was an avid bee keeper but needed Fred to coax them back into the fold whenever one of his swarms escaped to a neighbour's tree. And Fred needed the Vicar to keep both his eyes shut when, at the end of a perfect day's work in and around the Church, he did a bit of moonlighting giving 'short back and sides' to his mates. The barber's chair was safely stored in the stoke hole and customers queued up quietly in the church yard. We can well understand why jolly Fred needed a few extra pence in his pocket. His weekly Sexton's wage came to 27/6 and for every grave he dug another 7/6 was added. He was the sole supporter of a wife, three sons and two daughters and his dear wife made sure his wages got safely home, past the pub, by asking young Topper to collect them from the PCC Treasurer.

My brain reels by just imagining how Fred coped with the various tasks set out by the PCC. How he managed we will hear in the next instalment in tribute to this Great Deddingtonian. Topper remembers well his father's nightly saying: *"THE KEYS (Church) ARE IN MY POCKET, THE CAT IS AT MY FEET. I DO MY DUTY. GOOD NIGHT!"*

## DEDDINGTON 150 YEARS AGO

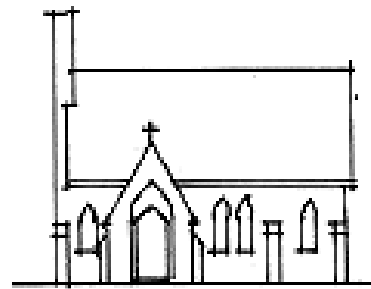
*The following are extracts from the diaries of the Rev. Cotton Risley for the months of November and December 1853:*

- 1st November - Susan and I, having been specially invited, drove over to Bloxham and were present at Divine Service there, the day having been fixed on as the Inauguration of All Saints Grammar School there.
- 14th November - Went up to The Kings Arms to hear Justices cases - convicted 10 youths of breaking Mr. Gulliver's windows on Sunday afternoon, and also a woman and 2 children from Sandford of hurdle stealing and receiving the same with a guilty knowledge. Dismissed a case of an aggravated assault with intent to murder for want of evidence - complainant's name Simpson, a miller from Deddington Mill, defendant's name Parish from Hempton, brother-in-law of the miller - a sad case.
- 25th November - A woman from Hempton came for an order to see her daughter now a prisoner in the Castle at Oxford awaiting her trial at the next Sessions - granted her the order.
- 14th December - A man named Robert Baker came to look at some timber, he had just returned from St. Petersburg and had brought over with him a young black Russian bear, 4 months old, which followed him about like a dog.
- 19th December - Finch the gardener came about filling the Ice House.

The auction was masterminded by Peggy Baker and Debbie Spengler, supported on the practical side by John Credland (display screens), Steven Plummer, Barry Clifford (catalogues), Christopher Bate (paper bags), Bluebells (flowers), Deddington Farmers' Market Committee (poster boards) and with help with refreshments from many in the village.

And the bottom line? The auction not only entertained us but realised over £2000 for ROSY.
