

### Rosemary Arnold has retired from the Library

Rosemary Arnold nearly missed getting her job at Deddington Library in 1984 when her car wouldn't start, so she walked the four miles in the rain from her home in Somerton. She changed for her interview in Saunders ice-cream parlour. 21 years later she has turned our library into the second busiest branch in the county - second only to one with more space and longer hours, at a time when library usage was on the decline. She introduced jigsaws, and later videos, CDs and DVDs. When closure threatened in 1997, her loyal clientele rallied round as the Friends of Deddington Library to keep it open. The Parish Council and generous donors ensured that more books were acquired. The Library received a make-over, and thus became the first in the county to have broadband and public access to the internet. Rosemary took the conversion to computerisation in her stride and became an expert among her colleagues. If she was missing from the library, she was either on holiday, on the mobile library or looking for special books; in 21 years she had 3 days off sick. Follow that! ... On 3 April Margaret Boon arrives to take on Rosemary's mantel. From being librarian at Drayton School she will first need to be inducted into the County's library system.

You might also like to know that from Tuesday 11 April to Saturday 15 April it will be possible to follow a Way of the Cross meditation in the Churchyard. Pick up a leaflet from the Parish Church and walk the Stations, which Year 6 of Deddington Primary School are designing and making. During the same period, there will also be a loop video meditation available inside the Church.




world filled with passionate people" was how Monty Don described the allotment gardeners whom he found in Birmingham and filmed for Gardeners' World on BBC2 last month. It must have been one of the largest allotment fields in the country and, presumably because it was close to the centre of the city, there was a waiting list for any of the 120 gardens that might become vacant. But then at a rent of £25 a year for a standard plot of 35 x 9 metres, it must be a great deal cheaper than moving to a house with a similar size garden.

Allotments, we were told, grew out of the Industrial Revolution to provide a creative leisure occupation, as well as fresh food, for some of the many workers who were crammed into narrow streets of back-to-back industrial homes. It was also to get the men 'out of the pubs and into the open air.' Circumstances are different today, but the basic requirement of digging the soil and to 'stick at it, little and often and keep the hoe on the go' is as true now as it was then.

As our Spring may soon burst through, I am sure that readers of the **DN** will wish those several new gardeners in Satin Lane, whose plots were started this year, many happy and rewarding hours and, hopefully, the satisfaction of growing-your-own. \*\*Hugh Marshall\*\*

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### ON THE FARM

### or Rumbles from the Lambing Shed

The February-born lambs are now out in the grass paddocks, but due to the very cold dry weather we are short of grass for this time of the year. The ewes are still on full winter rations. Although we always keep two years' hay in stock (in case of a wet haymaking season), the portents for the coming year suggest we may not have sufficient grass to be able to cut any hav this year. We could well be going into next winter's feed stocks by mid-summer, as we did in 1976 - not a very happy thought because we may well end up having to sell off a large part of the flock as we will not have enough feed for them, as in 1976. The main ewe flock started to lamb in the middle of March and at the time of putting pen to paper are about half-way through. The fall of lambs at the moment seems to be quite good with a large number of high birthweight lambs. Rather too many triplets for my liking, but better that way than being short of lambs, even if it means having to put some lambs on a milk substitute feeder.

The late spring and lack of rain is also delaying the spring field work. The oil seed rape should have had its first visit from the fertiliser spreader by the start of March, but the soil temperatures are still too low for it to do any good. With the hike in oil prices nitrogen is far too expensive a commodity to throw around in the hope that the plants will take it up.

The weather of late has also given the bees a hard time. Over the last few years we have experienced some very mild winters which have brought the queens into lay far too early. This year it is the reverse and it is too cold to risk opening the hives to see what is going on and give them a feed of sugar candy. But bees were around before the last Ice Age, and I expect they will survive this one.

Work on the environmental stewardship scheme for the farm is well under way, with this year's hedge and tree work completed. The Curlews have returned to the meadows and I hope that they can find enough damp feeding areas to encourage them to stay and breed. In many ways it seems to be "sod's law" that the start of a project to increase the number of wet-land birds coming to the valley should coincide with the first year in living memory that the meadows have not flooded.

Oh well, that's life and you never know what next year will bring. I wonder if the powers that be will allow me to change the programme from wet-land birds to a camel breeding project, but even that would be fraught with a whole load of extra paper work in trying to work out which would be better, one hump or two. But that is something for another day; it is 2 a.m. and time for another round in the lambing shed before the day shift comes on.

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### **NOSTALGIA RULES**

Derrick Robbins' memories continue ... Commuter Travel London - Deddington in the 1930s. Derrick writes: "I started travelling alone from about the age of seven. It was quite safe in those days. I would leave my home in Forest Hill, East Dulwich early in the morning, board a No 63 bus and travel about 6 miles to Peckham High Street. From there I'd take a No 35 bus to Paddington Station and catch the 9.10 am Express train to Wolverhampton making quite sure to climb into a carriage labelled "Bicester Slip" (normally the last 2 coaches on the Wolverhampton Express). Just before the train reached Bicester I was greatly relieved each time to feel it slow down, brakes grinding while the "Bicester Slip" coaches were uncoupled from the Express which speeded on, without stopping to Banbury. My fellow passengers and I could now safely cruise to a halt at Bicester Station. A steam tank engine would be coupled to our carriages to pull us down the line to Banbury stopping at all the stations in-between! I would leave this train at Aynho Station and walk through Clifton to Deddington and my favourite holiday home 'Tower View' in the Bull Ring."

"Just occasionally, 'Great Western Railway' (God's Wonderful Railway) forgot all about 'slip' coaches in which case I had to sit tight in the Express until it stopped at Banbury then jump on the next available bus to Deddington." (No synchronisation of rail and bus time tables then, just as now!) \*

With Great Britain at war from 1939 Derrick became what he calls a private evacuee in Deddington, living with his aunt and Uncle Chris Ell at 'Tower View'. "At the beginning of the war my uncles Chris Ell and George Clarke built an air raid shelter in the back garden of "Tower View". I suspect it was the only one in Deddington. It became a great playhouse for my cousin Chris Clarke and me except for about 10 minutes one night when we all took shelter for real when a German bomber flew around over Deddington. I can't remember quite clearly now if that was the same night when 2 bombs were dropped into a field south of Deddington which failed to explode. But I remember well walking into that field with my aunt to inspect the 2 holes in the ground. Neither Police nor military personnel nor safety fencing stopped us from looking down those holes! My uncles dug out a second air raid shelter, not nearly as grandiose as ours, for Grandpa Bull and Mr Ell senior. My uncles reckoned, quite rightly, that neither of them would take shelter without puffing away on his pipe, which, during an expected lengthy stay under ground could have become a greater hazard to the rest of us than German bombs!" \* [The 6.00 pm departure from Paddington on the same line used to slip a coach at Princes Risborough. That connected with the 'Watlington Donkey' - a tank-engine and single carriage - except for the fortnight when the fireman was away on honeymoon.

### **DEDDINGTON 150 YEARS AGO**

The following are extracts from the diaries of the Rev. Cotton Risley for the month of April 1856:-

- 10<sup>th</sup> April Ryan the gas man brought us our quarterly bill for gas 1,900ft. at 8s.4d. per 1000ft. and 1s. 3d. per quarter for meter.
- 11<sup>th</sup> April I committed two women to the House of Correction for 3 weeks for breaking Calcutt's windows, he having refused them relief one was from Birmingham, the other from Bristol. I signed a warrant in a bastardy case for non-payment of affiliation order.
- 14th April About 7 o'clock were alarmed by a cry of Fire, and soon found that the premises of Powers the Cooper, below us had ignited and burst into a flame, from the carelessness of his wife with a candle whilst putting the children to bed. The fire broke out at the back of the premises - and from its immediate discovery it was soon got under control without any serious damage being done, tho' the large engine was useless from being unsupplied with buckets - of a proper kind - i.e. there were no leather ones - and the supply of water could be obtained from pumps only. Had it broken out at midnight when nobody was about, the consequences would have been disastrous. The property was insured. I called before going to bed to see that due precaution was taken to prevent a fresh outbreak during the night, and found two men, Curly Gibbs and S.Knibbs were engaged to sit up as watchers. I should say from £20 to £30 would put everything in place again.
- 16<sup>th</sup> April Powers, the Cooper, whose house unfortunately caught fire on Tuesday last came to ask if I would recommend him to go round the Town to beg a few pounds to make up his loss in certain articles and the injury done to them by the careless and reckless removal of them into the Street on the occasion by ignorant inconsiderate persons. Some articles were taken away at once by unprincipled persons, and had not been returned. I gave him £1 and told him to use my name to others, as thinking him worthy of their charity he having a wife and 8 small children and she ready to go to bed again any day.
- 23<sup>rd</sup> April Mullis the Saddler came and I requested him to inform me of the price of Leathern Engine Buckets. Hill the Chemist came to ask my advice about Mr. Brogden's not paying his taxes for his dog he said Mr. B. accused him of laughing at him and threatened to knock him down.

### Parish Thickets and the Iron Age Hill Fort

Thickets are briar patches, places where shrubs and climbers grow thickly tangled, where the rabbit eludes the fox, and the fox the hunter. Usually treeless and formed mainly or entirely of thorny species, thickets are often so dense that light is shut out, and a ground flora is sparse or absent. In Deddington parish, thickets are associated with steep and rough ground. The two largest are on Ilbury Farm: one on the ridge of Steepness Hill, the other on the eastern flank of the hill that was the site of an Iron Age promontory hill fort. Bramble, dog-rose and hawthorn are the bricks and mortar of Deddington parish thickets. Herbaceous species commonly found in deciduous woods - bluebell, cow parsley, ivy, lesser celandine, lords-and-ladies and sweet violet - are generally absent from thickets. Nettle is the most common herbaceous plant.

Junction Thickets

Peter C. Lack writes that 'hedgerow birds in general prefer those parts of a hedge near to intersections'.1 There are two on Ilbury Farm, and on College Farm there is a junction thicket of exceptional height and density where the streamside vegetation of Sor (South) Brook meets the Duns Tew Road, where shrubs swell and bulge from the hedge.

Select Bramble-Dominated Thickets

The largest bramble thicket is on the west side of the A4260, across from the entrance to the Milton Gated Road. The longest thicket, about 145 m and with an average width of 8-12 m, is on Kestrel Ridge, Steepness Hill, and extends 50 m east from the Hempton Road.

Woody Thickets

'Scrub' is the term that the Ordinance Survey gives to what is here called 'woody thicket', a habitat, in Deddington parish, dominated by hawthorn and blackthorn. A blackthorn-dominated woody thicket occupies the steep western face of Mackley Hill (90-

155m), the whole length of the face of the ridge north of the footpath that cuts across it. Snowy Bushes, a field on College Farm, is a woody thicket, jam-packed with small blackthorn, elder and hawthorn trees. The ground-storey is mossy. The woody thicket with the greatest number of hawthorn trees is the hilly land in Pest House field.

Thicket of the Iron Age Promontory Hill Fort

The southern flank of Deddington's ancient hill-fort site, which has such views to the landscape of the Tews as to afford notice of the advance of hostile archers or of dedicated members of the tribe, is covered in bramble. Trees 2,000 years old would have been welcome testimony to the venerable past, but a thicket (22 m above Sor (South) Brook) holds the ridge, and is not allowed to spread either on to the flat plain above, where the ground is cultivated, or lower down the hillslope, where sheep graze. 'There are clear views of the surrounding terrain in all directions', but there are no clear views from any but the southern side of the site; and, while it is said that, 'The defences include a single rampart and outer ditch', only the outer ditch on the south side is visible - the rampart is not. The farmer, lan Pauling, and his son, said there were once supporting stones on the southern side, but that these had been taken away. Walter Meagher
