This is the last Will of me The Reverend William
Cotton Rosley of Scobington in the County of Oxford Clerc I desire to be buried
by the side of my wife in the family vault at Abberbury and that my funeral may
be performed in the quietest manner possible and I particularly wish that my body may
not be inclosed in lead but in an oak stell and a coffin made of the same wood of a
size such in thickness and that my coffin may not be covered with cloth of any kind or
I bequeath to drawe out if in my power at my decease one hundred pounds for
of legacy duty for the sole and separate use and also a sum of money owing to each of
my present servants engaged in or about my house who shall be in my service at my
death six months wages and a tract of mourning I trust the cottages and premises ~~at~~
~~situato at or near Abberbury aforesaid in the County of Oxford which I have heretofore~~
~~bequeathed to you by my will~~
bearing my life to the uses upon the trusts and with all suffit^{the power and provisio} to which the late Earl and
Cotton estates in the County of Oxford of which I am trustee for life in possession shall &
stand limited at my decease I am desirous that the diamonds which belonged to my late
wife (but over which I have an absolute power of disposal) and also the robes were
preserved to me by the late Earl of Shrewsbury and preserved in the family as long as
possible and with that object I desire that my eldest son Wm. Cotton Rosley shall ^{have}
have the use and enjoyment of the said diamonds (except carriag^{the} and brooch hereinafter
bequeathed) and the said son during his life and that after his decease the said

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diamonds (except as aforesaid) and the same shall be held by my executors upon trust for such one of his children as shall first attain the age of twenty one years and a sume entitled in possession to the said Barber and Cotton Estates (of which I am now tenant for life) or either of such estates and if there shall be no such child of my said son then upon trust for such other son of mine (if any) as shall after the death of my said eldest son first succeed to the possession of the said estates provided and notwithstanding the trusts above declared and with the object aforesaid and so far as I can lawfully do I hereby empower my said eldest son to include the said diamonds (except as aforesaid) in any Settlement of the said estates to be made by us in my lifetime or by him after my death I direct my executors hereinafter named to separate from the rest of my plate all plate bearing the marks of the Barber and Cotton families respectively or which can otherwise be identified as plate formerly belonging to a citizen of those families and also to separate from the rest of my china all china which belonged to the said Barber and Cotton families respectively and in like manner I direct my said executors to separate from the rest of my pictures the family and other portraits which belonged to the Barber Cotton and Driscoll families respectively and it is my will and I hereby declare that the aforesaid Barber and Cotton plates (so far as I can dispose of the same by will) and Barber and Cotton china and Barber Cotton and Driscoll Portraits shall be held by my executors upon the like trusts and subject to the like power as are hereinbefore declared and contained concerning and in respect of the diamonds (except as aforesaid) of my wife and the same hereinbefore bequeathed and I hereby direct that as soon as may be after my death an Inventory shall be taken of the said diamonds plate portraits and china hereinbefore intended to be retained and one copy of the said Inventory signed by my said eldest son and another copy by my other executors and the said chattels shall be kept adequately insured against loss or damage by fire (so far as the same are capable of being so insured) and properly preserved by and at the expense of my said eldest son PROVIDED that after the signing of the said inventories my executors (other than the said Dolford Cotton Driscoll) shall not be responsible for any neglect on the part of the said Dolford Cotton Driscoll to insure or preserve the said chattels but they shall have full power at their discretion to interfere for the protection thereof & bequeath my Cabinet of Coins and all books relating thereto and also the diamond carings (formerly Miss Bradshaws) to my son William Cotton Driscoll I bequeath my microscope and the diamond brooch which belonged to my wife to my son John Barber Driscoll I bequeath my gold watch chain and seals to my son Robert Wells Driscoll I bequeath all my linen equally amongst my four sons and I hereby declare my will to be that my eldest son Dolford Cotton Driscoll shall have the option of purchasing my house stables and outbuildings at Dodington with the lands adjoining timber yards cottages &c and also the furniture in and about my said house within three calendar months from my death at such price as my residuary legatees may think fit to name PROVIDED that such option shall not exceed to less than the whole of the furniture and that the said Dolford Cotton Driscoll shall at the time of exercising such option as to my property at Dodington (and this is a condition precedent) pay to my residuary legatees or towards the payment to them to their satisfaction of all principal sums which I shall or may have paid in my lifetime in discharge of any mortgage or incumbrance affecting my said property the said sums to be paid by my said eldest son to form part of my residuary estate and I make the repayment of these principal sums as aforesaid a condition of my said eldest son exercising the right to exercise the option I have given to him because the sums he has paid in discharge of any such mortgage or incumbrance as above mentioned have been trust monies which (subject to my life interest) belong absolutely to me the third year after your death my Marriage Settlement My eldest son is so amply provided for as tenant in tail male of the various estates of which I am tenant for life that at least as above I have not made any provision for him under my will I desire and I impugn my said mortgage and proviso at Dodington aforesaid and the furniture in or about my said house (subject to the option of purchase aforesaid) and also the furniture which belongs to me in and about my late uncles house at Abberbury and all the residues of my real and personal estate and effects whatsoever and wheresoever

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with each son, the absolute use and benefit of my three sons William Cotton Risley John D. Barber Risley and Robert Wells Risley their respective heirs executors administrators and assigns in equal shares as tenants in common subject nevertheless to the payment now hereout of my just debts funeral and testamentary expenses and the pecuniary legacies hereby or to be by any Civil Court given provided nevertheless and it is my express will that my furniture (subject to the option aforesaid) books horses carriages and all other household effects (except pictures engravings china and plate) forming part of my residuary estate shall not be divided in specie among my three younger sons but shall be sold upon my death and the net proceeds of sale equally divided amongst them I direct and bequeath all estates vested in me solely upon trust or on mortgage unto my said four sons upon the trusts and subject to the conditions affording the same respectively I appoint my four sons Dolford Cotton Risley William Cotton Risley John Barber Risley and the Robert Wells Risley Executors of this my will and I hereby revoke all other my testamentary dispositions by me at any time heretofore made. Be witness whereof the said William Cotton Risley the testator came to this my last will set my hand on this eleventh day of February in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixty seven — **William Cotton Risley** — signed and acknowledged by the said William Cotton Risley the testator as and for his last will in the presence of us who present at the same time also in his presence at his request and in the presence of each other have hereunto subscribed our names as witnesses — **Archibald Wolden Milgoe — John Davis —**
