

Tradesmen, artisans and farmers

Whilst, consistent with its status as a small market town, Deddington had a sizeable local community of tradesmen and artisans, only relatively few find mention in *Jackson's Oxford Journal* 1820-1837, whose readership largely comprised the gentry, clerics, landowners and the professional classes.

The following information has been extracted from the newspaper and trade directories:

- list of tradesmen and artisans in Deddington mentioned in *Jackson's Oxford Journal* 1820-1837 (see Appendix I below);
- list of milliners 1820-1837 (see Appendix II below);
- list of shopkeepers and traders in [Piggott's Directory 1830](#)
- list of tradesmen and artisans in [Robson's Commercial Directory 1839](#)

Out of the 47 shopkeepers and traders listed in Piggott's Directory in 1830, 26 were mentioned in *Jackson's Oxford Journal* 1820-1837, whilst out of the 40 tradesmen and artisans listed in Robson's Commercial Directory in 1839,¹ just 11 were mentioned in the newspaper in the preceding years 1830-1837.

Notices about tradesmen and artisans were essentially limited to probate notices, changes of proprietorship and bankruptcies or insolvencies. It was not uncommon for a tradesman or artisan to have more than one trade.

The various trades in Deddington mentioned in newspaper notices included (in no particular order):

Linen and woollen drapery was one of the principal businesses, and there was reference to 8 such businesses in Deddington during the period 1820-1837, although there was no specific mention in *Jackson's Oxford Journal* before 1829:

1829 Daniel Hartley, Market Place, linen & woollen draper

1829 Robert Kirby and Timothy Sedgley, drapers, mercers & haberdashers, Banbury and (up to 1829) Deddington

1832 Edward Bartlett and Son, linen & woollen drapers, silk mercers, hosiers & hatters; removal from Market Place to New Street (Robert Bartlett and Son in 1830 per Piggott)

1834 H. Stanley/Staley, linen & woollen drapery, silk mercery, hats, hosiery, haberdashery, ready-made clothes, funerals

1835 Mr. Warner, linen & woollen draper

1835 Mr B. Harris, New Street, linen draper, silk mercer, hosier, clothier &c.

1836 A. and G. Philpots, Banbury and Deddington, linen & woollen drapers, silk mercers, furriers &c.

1837 Samuel Bennett, draper and grocer - insolvency

1837 W. Matthews, draper and grocer (business acquired from insolvent Samuel Bennett)

As might be expected, the drapers' shops appear to have been concentrated in Market Place and New Street. In several cases, the shops in Deddington were branches of Banbury based businesses.

Only two drapery businesses were noted by Piggott's Directory in 1830, Robert Bartlett and Son (also stamp distributors) and Daniel Hartley in Market Place (the latter's wife was a milliner). Hartley himself became insolvent in 1836.

Another lucrative trade was the grocery business. In Georgian England, grocers were involved in supplying a wide range of high value commodities such as tea, sugar, spices and tobacco.

6 grocers are identified during the period 1820-1837:

1820 Henry Churchill, son of a Witney grocer

1830 William Claridge, Hudson's Lane (also stationer) - who removing

1830 William Hudson (per Piggott)

1831 William Margetts (also stationer and insurance agent)

1837 Samuel Bennett, draper and grocer (declared insolvent)

1837 W. Matthews, draper & grocer (acquired above business)

Robson's commercial directory in 1839 also identifies 6 grocers:

Henry Churchill, grocer

Edward Franklin, druggist and grocer, and dealer in patent medicines

William Margetts, grocer & dealer in British wines

William Matthews, draper and grocer

John Robinson, linen & woollen draper & grocer

William Robinson, grocer and cheesemonger

Occasional notices of auctions of the stock-in-trade of artisans, such as that of Mr. G. Rudkin, ironmonger and brazier, on his leaving Deddington in 1828 (see below), provide a fascinating insight into the nature of these businesses, and the great variety of implements in use.

Whilst there was a virtually complete absence of retail advertising by tradesmen and artisans, all male unless widows, the female monopoly of the millinery business had no such qualms. There were usually 2, sometimes 3, milliners in Deddington actively competing for custom at any one time, who would place their somewhat repetitive advertisements in *Jackson's Oxford Journal* each May and November, which notices the editor usually grouped together.

The milliners active in Deddington during the period 1820-1837 are set out in Appendix II below. The foremost millinery business appears to have been that of Mrs. Lucy Ann White (*née* Hitchman), who had been in business since 1807. Her premises were in a house in Market Place. She retired in 1831.

3 bankruptcies and 11 insolvencies were recorded amongst Deddington tradesmen, artisans and farmers during the period 1820-1837:

At this time only traders who became insolvent could qualify for bankruptcy protection. If non-traders could not pay their debts, they were categorised as insolvent debtors, and could be kept indefinitely in a debtors' prison if their creditors so wished. Debtors' prisons were not abolished until 1869.

In addition, there were also 3 professional bankruptcies or insolvencies during the period. Samuel Churchill, solicitor, was declared bankrupt in 1827 (see [Churchill's bankruptcy](#)).² Thomas Gibbs and George Smith, both surgeons, but with unrelated practices, were declared insolvent debtors in 1836.

Farming, the foundation of the local economy and the predominant local employer, found only limited coverage in the columns of *Jackson's Oxford Journal*. Notices concerning the local farming community generally related to the sale or auction of farm houses and agricultural land (which might be freehold or leasehold, or partly one and partly the other), livestock, farm equipment (implements in husbandry) etc.

² Samuel Churchill successfully persuaded the Bankruptcy Commissioners that he was a "scrivener, felt manufacturer, dealer, and chapman".
