Henry Brome of Clifton

Dated 21st August 1661

## Will of Henry Brome of Clifton

In the name of God Amen I Henry Brome of Clifton in the parish of Dedington in the county of Oxon gent being of perfect memory (blessed be God) and considering the frailty of mans life do on the one and fourteenth day of August Anno Domine 1661 and in the thirteenth year of the reign of our sovereign Lord Charles the second over England and I make and ordain this my last will and testament in manner and form following revoking and hereby annulling all and every other will by me at any time heretofore made First I bequeath my soul in to the hands of God my creator having and confidently believing to be saved by the merits and intercession of Jesus Christ my Lord and I will my body to be decently buried in the Cloisters of New College in Oxon And I will that the sum of thirty pounds be expended for of my funeral And for such temporal estate God hath blessed me with I give and dispose of the same as followeth Item I give to my son Nevill Brome my lease and lands at Clifton aforesaid which I hold of St Mary Magdalen college in Oxon Item I give and bequeath unto my daughter Mary Brome my lease and lands in Cassington in the said county which I hold of Exeter college in Oxon Item I give more to my said daughter Mary one hundred and fifty pounds of lawful money of England which I have already delivered to herself or some friends for her use Item I further give and

bequeath unto my said daughter Mary these goods following viz my down bed and bolster and a bedstead standing in my little parlour three down pillows the best flock bed four pairs of sheets with one of.........flaxen the second best arras coverled ......a diaper a damask sheet for childbed three blankets three dozen of flaxen napkins and one dozen of hempen napkins three towels half a dozen of diaper or damask napkins twenty pounds weight of pewter at the least viz of dishes and the stewpan the lesser trunk trunk marked EB withal things that shall be with at my decease which trunk I have betrusted with a friend already to her use one diamond ring having seven diamonds which was my dear wifes as also my said dear wifes childbed linen and apparel with one riding furniture for a woman and my Cypress chest and stone morter with the pestle and it is my express will and direction that my son Nevill shall at his charge find and provide or my said daughter at my house at Clifton aforesaid and ......diet lodging and washing for the space of six months next after my decease if she shall be so long unmarried or else shall pay unto her the sum of ten pounds in lieu thereof and I solemnly enjoin my said son to deliver all the goods before bequeathed to my daughter which shall be in his custody within six weeks after my decease without strife or contention as he shall answer it at the dreadful day of our Lord Item I give unto my loving friend Mr Robert

Wherweed? Forty shillings All the rest of my estate real and personal (my debts legacies and funeral expenses first discharged) I give to my son Nevill Brome and for the same as also for the legacy before bequeathed him I make him my executor but of all bequeathed unto my said daughter I make her my executrix exhorting and straightly charging them to live in peace and amity one with the other and in testimony thereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal the day and year above written. Henry Brome signed sealed published and declared to be the last will and testament of the above named. Henry Brome in the presence of
