### **Book a Future for Deddington Library**

After the well-attended Public Meeting on Tuesday 15 February, the following night the Parish Council voted unanimously to fight OCC over the proposal to close Deddington Library. We believe that a very strong and persuasive argument can be built as to why our library should not be on the list of those set to close, and that a huge weight can be put behind the case, not only from people living within this Parish but also neighbouring parishes that rely on Deddington's facilities. OCC's own study (2010) into the demographics of our Parish presents us with a strong case for survival in itself and OCC would find it difficult to dispute!

It was agreed that four parish councillors would work with the Friends of Deddington Library (and any other interested supporters in the village) to devise a strategy and build the case for continuation and the Parish Clerk will be writing to OCC to convey this intent. When we have received and interpreted the Consultation process document, we will be urging everyone in the Parish and surrounding area capable of writing to put pen to paper to let OCC know both the strength of feeling and the compelling reasons why its proposal is wrong.

Updates, meeting dates and progress will be posted regularly via the *DN* website and Deddington OnLine and of course we would welcome ideas and suggestions from supporters via the DoL website or on our Facebook page.

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### **DEDDINGTON PARISH COUNCIL**

### held at the Town Hall on 16 February

The meeting was chaired by Jim Flux; there was a good turnout of County, District and Deddington Parish Councillors and three members of the public. The meeting took place in the recently redecorated Town Hall and it was warm, well lit and much better furnished. The major issues for discussion were the threat to Deddington Library, the Ash Cottage, Clifton redevelopment and the new Calcutt Farm, Hempton silo development, and the review of the emergency response plan.

### **Open Forum**

Two Clifton residents addressed the meeting to thank DPC for their support concerning the planning approval of the Ash Cottage development and asked what more could be done. More pressure and an appeal were being considered. Some procedural anomalies were being investigated.

One Deddington resident raised the Library closure threat. It was suggested that surrounding villages outside the Parish should be approached for support. It was also suggested that DPC should consider purchasing the building and taking over joint responsibility with OCC for running the Library. A DPC led working group is to be formed to plan a Deddington response to the Library threat. It was pointed out by County Councillor Jelf that many places were well advanced with their plans to take community responsibility for their threatened libraries. CC Jelf suggested that to stand a chance of success a response to OCC should be prepared earlier than the time allowed in the 12-week consultative period.

#### Library

The DPC response to the threat was discussed. The conclusion was that DPC would fight the threat. A working group would be formed led by a DPC working group. The alternative plan for the Parish to take responsibility for the Library was thought to undermine the primary objective of fighting the closure. However the dilemma was that if Deddington Library was saved it would be at the expense of some other recipient of OCC funds. Other parishes were already preparing community driven library management groups and if Deddington did not compete for the limited available OCC support funds, DPC would possibly miss the one chance funding opportunity. A separate working group would be formed to consider alternative management options.

### **Cherwell District Council**

In April bus passes will be accepted on the 'Dial-a-Ride' bus services and the first service for bus pass

holders will be changed to 9.00am. [And bus tokens are no longer being issued, so they can no longer be used to buy a Senior Rail Card – Ed.]

### Highways, Finance & GP, and Environment & Recreation

Little new progress on many of the issues; OCC were criticised for lack of response to the many letters and requests from the Highways group.

### **DPC** procedures

A discussion took place about the turnover of Parish Councillors. With the support of two recently retired councillors a small attitudinal survey will be undertaken amongst the existing councillors to shed light on dissatisfaction and the causes of so many disaffections.

### **Planning**

Applications: Calcutt Farm, Hempton has submitted a revised plan which repositions the proposed 35ft high silo. The plan also includes tree planting; the group considered the plan an improvement and made no objection. Bentleys,14 High Street, felling a eucalyptus tree in the garden, no objection. Ash Cottage, Chapel Close, Clifton, a revised plan has been submitted; confusion surrounds this whole planning process because of inaccuracies with the plans, the suggestion of some procedural anomalies and now some evidence of a bat population; the planning group again recommended objection to the plan.

Appeals: End Cottage, The Stile, redevelopment of the land behind the end cottage; the planning group repeats its original objection.

### **Deddington OnLine**

DPC will take a more active part and improve communication with both DoL and Deddington OnAir. Efforts would be made to improve the accuracy of DPC information on site.

### **Emergency Response Plan**

A review of contingency planning for predictable emergencies (weather, major accident, power, gas or water failure, fire or flooding) will be prepared for the DPC meeting in June and publication in September.

Invoices agreed for payment £3,518. Investments of £567,158 at Barclays, West Bromwich BS, Santander and Anglo Irish Bank.

Next meeting – Wednesday 16 March 2011 at Hempton Church Hall.

# AN EVENING OF ENGLISH SONGS BY CECILIA McDOWALL AND DONALD LANE

The Holywell Music Room in Oxford is the oldest custom-built concert hall in Europe. It opened to the public for the first time in 1748 and has been the venue for professional recitals ever since. On 12 February, its doors opened for an evening of songs written by two distinguished contemporary composers – Cecilia McDowall and Donald Lane.

Cecilia McDowall's compositions are regularly commissioned. One of her most recent was performed for the first time last year in Deddington Church by the choir of St George's Windsor as part of the Maurice Frost Festival. Her style is innovative, energetic, and her work portrays a wide range of emotions, from passionate songs of love and nature to the witty 'Song of the Mice' and 'The Chipmunk', settings of poems written by Russian political prisoner Irina Ratushinsksya.

Donald Lane's pieces are complex and fascinating. His skill lies in a particular ability to interpret poetry and translate the words into a musical language where the harmonies and rhythms, rarely conventional, communicate the passions of the poet. His settings of both Yeats and Spenser were colourful and fervent.

The second half of the concert opened with the world premiere of Donald's song cycle 'Kings and Tanists' brilliantly performed by Anna Tilbrook and James Gilchrist, the tenor to whom it is dedicated. The music aptly reflected the emotional soul-searching in the poems of Irish poet James Stephens. It was James Stephens too who furnished the words for 'In the Poppy Field' – a delightful piece for soprano, tenor and flute, cleverly combined with an Irish folk tune, which charmed the audience.

The music of both Cecilia McDowall and Donald Lane demands virtuosic performers and the two singers, James Gilchrist and Jane Harrington, the flautist Julian Sperry, and the pianist Anna Tilbrook, although fully stretched, did not disappoint. Indeed the audience was spellbound by their stunning performance and sensitive interpretation. Being in the audience when music is being performed in public for this first time is a unique experience and having both composers present added something very special to the occasion. It was a privilege to be there.

### DOWN ON THE FARM

Here we go again! By the time this has scraped past the editors' red pencil the countdown to the new lambing season will have begun. Due to the 2010 snow the ewes have already been 'inside' some four weeks longer than planned, something that has placed a heavy burden on the winter feed stocks as last summer's hay crop was reduced by some 40% due to the dry weather in June and July. As the sheep came in early we have been bulking out the rations with oat straw to save the hay, but as lambing approaches and the growing lambs reduce the stomach area, the ewes need a higher level of nutrition, so the haystack has been opened up. Even now it is having to be carefully rationed to last until the spring grass can take over. The down side to feeding straw is that we had to increase the amount of bought-in feed nuts to keep the protein levels up, so what we gained on increased grain prices will be lost on increased feed bills, but that's life on the farm.

The bees have made an early start and by the middle of February all the hives were producing brood and on warm sunny days they were collecting pollen from the snowdrops, and hazel and alder catkins. This is a sure indication that the Queen is laying but it is still very early in the year and a prolonged 'Blackthorn winter' could cause heavy losses.

The woodwork shop has been very busy and I have made a lot of new equipment ready for when the

season takes off. Due to the very hard weather the Green Woodpeckers (chisel bills) have done a lot of damage. I have 'patched' the damaged hives for now but as soon as the weather warms up (15°C plus) the bees will have to be re-housed in new hives and the damaged hives re-built.

The farm has a number of well-used rights of way and many people use the paths to walk their dogs. Although the main ewe flock is housed at the moment, the Cotswolds, being a long wool breed, are better left outside in a small sheltered paddock. During the afternoon of 12 February, a very pleasant sunny day, some idiot allowed their dog to worry and maul my Cotswold flock. Although the sheep that were bitten were not badly injured, they are heavily in lamb and the stress of being chased could cause them to abort their lambs. I have spent a lot of time and money trying to reintroduce the Cotswold breed back into the parish and these lambs will be the first born on this farm for 200-plus years. I am very distressed to think that my small flock of an endangered breed has been damaged in this way and I ask you all please to keep your dogs on leads at all times when walking on the farm. I give warning to the owner of the sheep worrier that we are on high alert and will take all lawful steps to prevent it happening again.

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### **DEDDINGTON 150 YEARS AGO**


The following are extracts from the diaries of the Rev. Cotton Risley for the month of March 1861:

**5th March** – Attended the Assize Courts with Holford – our Adderbury corn stealing case was tried and the parties – thief and receiver, (Paynton and Wilkins) – were convicted, the former was sentenced to 6 months imprisonment with Hard Labour, the latter to 3 months. The sentence was considered a light one in each case, Paynton had been receiving 11s. per week of his master, Mr.

Wyatt, for some months past and beer occasionally.

**8th March** – I signed a summons against Mr. Hiorns for assaulting his female servant and refusing to pay the wages due to her.

**13th Marc**h – Holford on his return from hunting reported that Radley College had become insolvent – and was about to be broken up.



**16th March** – The Vicar cut down and sold the remaining ash tree in the Church-yard during the week.

**21st March** – Mr. Brogden called with a paper relating to the value of this Living and its future increase by the Ecclesiastical Commissioners. I called on Mrs. Emberlin and Mrs. Rizbah Matthews who were both very poorly – sent them each something to comfort and support them.

### FROM THE FIRE STATION

Tell, it's been a busy start to 2011, with a fire call virtually everyday for the first three weeks of January, a brief respite for the last week, followed by another busy couple of weeks into February. In total so far, we've had 30 fire calls.

At this time of year, we're seeing the usual chimney fires and more road traffic collisions. When the icy conditions came back in January, we attended four collisions in a matter of hours rather than days. These were both local incidents (A4260 Duns Tew crossroads) and further afield at Mixbury and on the M40.

We've attended five chimney fires so far, in Somerton, Fritwell, Duns Tew and Clifton, with the Clifton incident being at Watch Manager Fenemore's farm! I have since checked the mobilisation times with Control and this has been the quickest turnout time for our appliance this year. Chris did request a silent approach to this incident, but as a crew we decided to let the world know whose house was on fire, approaching at full volume!

Probably the most interesting job so far has been the oil fire in Southam Road, Banbury, which was caused by an oxy-acetylene cutting set which ignited rubbish in a pit of oil. This was tackled initially using foam extinguishers and high pressure hoses, but eventually needed a type of foam called FP-70. We don't use this much as it has serious environmental consequences and we have to notify the Environment Agency and Food Standards Agency just in case any runs into local watercourses. In this instance, the foam was contained with the oil, inside the pit. It took the foam stocks from the whole of North Oxfordshire to extinguish the fire.

Finally, we were called out in the small hours of the morning to reports of some rubbish that had been set on fire under Deddington Town Hall. On arrival, it was apparent that a large pile of newspapers had been deliberately set alight. Fortunately, passing police spotted it and called us and they are now investigating.

Chris Fenemore has now been appointed as the permanent Watch Manager. He's busy setting out the way forward for the station in terms of training, recruitment and crew development. Whilst we are not currently engaged in large scale recruitment, there are a couple of kit pegs available here and we are looking to fill these positions this year.

### **Photographic Society**

At our last meeting John Prentice gave an interactive workshop on 'The comparison of photo-processing software'. Summarising the nine most popular software applications currently available, John went on to consider four applications in more detail, demonstrating their common aspects with a series of specimen photographs. Starting with Corel Paint Shop Pro, he showed the application's large number of features and ease of use, but noted several shortcomings. There are even more features with Adobe Elements, currently the market leader, with few disadvantages apart from the steep learning curve and its lack of instinctive feel. Adobe Lightroom had been developed in response to the specific requirements of a photographers' forum. Consequently it was judged as easy to use and there were perhaps fewer features. Finally John reviewed Google Picassa, which can be downloaded from Google. It had a lot of the more common features and was easy to use and good for anyone wishing to gain a first experience in photographic processing.

It was a most interesting examination of the different photo-processing software available, with lots of audience participation, which made for a popular and very lively evening.

On 2 March the noted local photographer, Jane Ryman, will give a presentation on 'Taking portrait photographs of family and children', followed by a workshop on 16 March from members Valentina and Anatoli on the 'Software processing of photographs'.

Oxfordshire children worked in agriculture, in domestic service, and in lace-making, gloving and a host of other small-scale occupations. We also learned that cottage industry and agricultural work were by no means a soft option compared to work in factories and mines.

### Derrick Edward Frederick Robbins 1928 – 2010

Derrick was evacuated to Deddington in September 1939 to stay with his uncle, Chris Ells, at Tower View (now Wirral House). He subsequently moved to the USA and was living in Sarasota, Florida when he found the *DN* on the internet some years ago; he then contacted Ruth Johnson to offer his crystal clear recollections of his war years in the village for publishing in *DN*. Many people will remember the series that ran over some two years.

I took over the contact from Ruth in order to facilitate the transfer of the, by now, very extensive collection of stories to Deddington OnLine. In the process Derrick became a good internet friend and a most amusing correspondent. He followed the month-tomonth goings-on in Deddington closely and provided yet more memories for the website. I would have very much liked to meet him and we joked about his now being legally able to drink a pint of Hooky if he came to visit us - as opposed to a furtive sip from a friend's glass behind the Unicorn as a schoolboy.

When I stopped getting responses to emails I feared what we now know. Sadly he passed away in March last year. We only found this out recently via an internet search by Eileen Anderson; it led her to a notice in the Sarasota Herald Chronicle which fortunately also provided the name of his daughter, Jasmyn Copeland, and where she lived. A further search of social networking sites led to Eileen making personal contact. So although we have lost a very good friend, we have made another to whom we send our sincere condolences. With the hint of new beginnings and those seed packets staring at us, it's time to think about propagating but what should we start them off in? The government is aiming for a total withdrawal of peat use by home gardeners by 2020. Is that achievable at the moment? There are alternatives out there

### **Irene Robinson 1922 – 2011**

Born in Peckham, Irene left school at 14. Her headmistress got her a job in a corset factory but her father insisted that she should work in his confectioner's and tobacconist shop. Marrying at the beginning of the Second World War, she gave birth during an air raid and was burnt out of the flat she shared with the family.

In the 1950s she nursed her mother to her death and so became home-maker for her husband, son, father and brother, running two homes and the shop while dreaming of a cottage in the country. She got there eventually when she moved with husband Ted from London to Middle Barton in 1981. Too soon afterwards, Ted died in1983 and at 61, Irene bought a motor scooter, never having driven anything before. For the WI, Irene baked weekly for their stall in Woodstock.

Finally, to be nearer to Mary and Colin, Irene came to Deddington in 1998. She loved this village which was quite a buzz after a cul-de-sac in Barton. Deddington Craft Club took her into their delightful circle where she discovered she could in fact do things she'd thought beyond her. Sadly her eyesight worsened until she could no longer see to sew but the Craft Club continued to scoop her up every week. Thank you ladies. A number of medical problems made life more and more uncomfortable until Irene died in her sleep in the Horton on 23 January.

and the RHS has been running trials with the current alternatives:

Loam based - sand and loam

Green waste;

Wood fibre – predominantly shredded wood Coir – coconut fibre-based media with vermiculite

In all cases, buy the seed-based alternative as the multipurpose varieties can be too coarse and lumpy to make a suitable seed bed and they will not contain the right nutrients. The product that most reflects the texture of peat is coir and there have been some very satisfactory results with this product although not in this particular trial. Whilst the product is a pleasing medium to handle the germination was erratic. (If you want information about the trial go to the RHS website and search 'Peat-free media'.)

The advice the RHS are giving is that changing to peat free alternatives will require changes in cultivation; watering regimes of peat-free media differ from those of peat, eg green waste was easily over watered in this trial

It is still early days and industries are continuing to develop and enhance their products so try, try again and hopefully we'll have an alternative that we're all happy with in years to come.

### THE APPLE OF OUR EYE

The eagle eyed among you might have seen a TV crew filming in Deddington last October. Nothing new in that, our photogenic Market Place has often been subject material for cameras. But what were they doing on the Banbury road, up by the Council road depot? The answer is in a tree,

not any old tree but an apple tree of the Deddington Pippin variety; and if you have never heard of it, read on.

It was discovered in 2007 by Adderbury grower Andy Howard who says:

'It is called a pippin because it probably comes from the discarded seed of an apple (possibly thrown from a car window) which has been wild pollinated, maybe by a crab apple. An ex-County road surveyor for Oxford who has pictures of when the new Banbury road was built in 1938 confirms there was no

tree there at that time, so we can date the tree from after then, and the size of its trunk/height confirms it as 65–70 years old. It is also a pippin due to its location: no one would intentionally plant a tree in that position, half way up a bank on a main road. It doesn't fit the description in Bunyard's classification for any apples of this size shape, colour and storage characteristics.

The apple has a green base with red stripe going to total red by January with some yellow striping. It is a tall concave shape with a long thin stalk which comes out well above the basin. Its skin is initially "greasy" but then goes drier. A sweet, crunchy, juicy apple with creamy white flesh which has a real aromatic depth of flavour with a good balance of lemony tanginess and nuttiness. If it survives the hungry blue tits who really

appreciate its flesh on cold days, it keeps well into March. It is such a good sweet late storing apple that I am now grafting it on so that its properties continue.'

Andy will be at the March Farmers' Market with samples of the Deddington Pippin. He will also have some trees for sale (Parish Councillor Jean Rudge

already has one on her allotment), together with other varieties including the North Aston Non-Pareil. On his display will also be examples of late storing apples for tasting. Andy, a member of the MidShires Orchard Group, will be demonstrating fruit tree grafting, and will be happy to answer questions and offer advice.

Back to the TV programme: The History of the English Apple is a one-hour BBC4 documentary on 'wild apples' which have been grafted and then domesti-

cated. It is scheduled for transmission this summer, time not yet known. Chris Beardshaw, who presents the programme, said in a December Gardeners' Question Time radio programme: 'This autumn I planted an apple which will be perfect for harvesting on Christmas Day. It's called the Deddington Pippin, and it's at its best after the frosts of early winter, so next year for Christmas I might just be having Deddington Pippin.'

Since this mention Andy has been inundated with requests for the tree. He has sold out now but will be grafting and budding more for next season and has a waiting/reservation list. He can be contacted on 01295 810516 or johoward@metronet.co.uk.
