Survey of Christ Church properties in 1728 contained in the Cartwright family papers - comments on some of the people mentioned:-

1636

The Cannons of Windsor was one of the three Manorial Estates owning most of Deddington.

The Lanes were a well known farming family in the village - though strangely enough no mention of them appears in the Hearth Tax of 1665.

Several references to the Tey family over the years - William Tey had 4 'hearths' in Clifton - there is now a lane in Deddington called "Tay's Gateway".

Wm. Rose - A Francis Rose, Blacksmith & Ironmonger, made a Will in 1633.

Wm. South, a Blacksmith, made a Will in 1725, though William is mentioned in 1636 and 1787, and Samuel in 1728.

I. Aris - Many members of this family in the village in the 16th and 17th centuries.

1728

Leadenporch House in New Street is still here, it was built in approximately 1325 and is the oldest house in Deddington.

A John Langston, Gentleman, made a Will in 1708.

Thomas Wells, a Tailor, made a Will in 1732.

James and Hugh Stilgoe (and John, 1787) - members of the farming family who have been in Deddington and Adderbury for approximately 300 years and are still farming in Adderbury today.

William Franklin - possibly a member of the Franklin family who were internationally renowned builders and joiners in Deddington in the 19th century.

Joseph Churchill - member of a farming family resident in Clifton and Deddington for 300 years, he died in 1732 and was Juror of the Court Baron of the Windsor Manor from 1707 - 1732.

Richard Bignell (and Robert, 1787) - members of a well known local Presbyterian family.

Samuel Sturch - a member of the Sturch family was Landlord of the Unicorn Public House in the Market Square in Deddington in the 1840's.

1787

John Whetton - a local farming family, descendants living in Clifton today.

Samuel Churchill - member of the same family as Joseph (above), he lived in Leadenporch House, was a Solicitor and Surveyor and became very wealthy.

Bartholomew Churchill, 'Gentleman', was Samuel's brother.

Jn. Hopcraft - member of a family of Masons and Brickmakers, descendants living in the village until recently.

Wm. Knibbs - many members of the family lived in the village. Wm. Knibbs, a saddler, was one of the longest serving members of the Oxfordshire Yeomanry, from 1798 to his death in 1853.
