

The Brownies meet on Monday evenings at 6pm in the Windmill Centre. There are currently 24 with ages ranging from 7 to 11 years. Lots of activities are offered, including songs, games, adventure days and interest badges. Camping is planned for the future. They take part in Church parades, Mothers' Day and Remembrance Day services, and St. George's Day celebrations in Banbury. Anne Kent is the Brown Owl.

Deddington Ballet School:

The dancers study with Joanna Cox at the Windmill Centre. Classes are run 6 days in each week. There are currently 170 children involved. They are prepared for I.S.T.P. Cecchetti ballet. They take part in shows and the annual Deddington pantomimes. 10 of Joanna's pupils are Associate students, which means that they auditioned and were accepted in specialist classes in London. One pupil has won a place at the Royal Ballet School.

Deddington Youth Club:

The Youth Club meets on Monday evenings from 7 to 9pm at the Windmill Centre and currently attracts between 20 and 30 young people between the ages of 10 and 15. There is a wealth of activities for members to take part in – a variety of sports, music, art and craft. The sale of tuck is a popular part of each session! New equipment has been able to be purchased from a grant from Deddington PC. Outings, eg. Oxford Ice-rink & Ten Pin Bowling, are part of the year's programme.

The very successful Boys' Brigade was started in 2001 and is fortunate to have a number of very dedicated people to run it. The band was formed three years ago and practises on Monday evenings in the Parish Church under the guidance of Graham Wallington. The Brigade currently has 40 boys, divided by age into Anchor Boys (5 to 8 years), Junior Section (8 to 11) and Company Section (11 to 18). Activities include games, sports, and camping. The Church embraces the Boys' Brigade and the band plays in many church parades and services.
