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DEDDINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Meeting in Hempton Church Hall 18 November 2009

Present: Cllrs Flux (Chair), Anderson, Collins, Day, Finnigan, Ince, Squires, Ward, Watts and Wood, County Cllr Jelf and the Parish Clerk, Minute Clerk, 8 members of the public and the DN correspondent.

Open Forum: Geraldine and Derek Lay, Deborah Labuschagne and others drew attention to the excessive speed of vehicles passing through Hempton and to the flooding caused by the poor state of the drains. The meeting was informed that the drains had now been repaired and that the speeding problem would be referred to OCC. A number of remedial suggestions and traffic-calming measures were discussed and these suggestions would be passed to OCC.

David Westbury, Chair of the Friends of Castle Grounds, briefed the meeting on progress at the Castle Grounds in consultation with English Heritage and Natural England. The work EH has suggested will require funding and a request for funds will be made which will have to be put forward by the PC on behalf of the FOCG. Cllr Flux confirmed that the land is owned by DPC.

Recreation

Sports clubs: The fees charged to clubs to cover DPC-related insurance and maintenance costs are to be reviewed.

Youth activities: DPC to take the initiative supporting the Youth Club and seek support from CDC to offer sports sessions for 11–16 year olds.

Dogs: Owners are reminded that dogs must not be allowed to foul playing areas and that there are dog bins.

Environment & Special Projects

Wildflower meadow: A grant of £500 is being sought from the Trust for Oxfordshire's Environment for the creation of a wildflower meadow and 'hotspots'.

Christmas tree: DPC acknowledges the support of Phil Rudge, Cllr John Day and the *Deddington News* for sponsorship and decoration of this year's tree.

War Memorial: The possible relocation or alternatively the refurbishment of the war memorial is being reviewed.

Hempton and War Memorial cemeteries: A programme of refurbishment and maintenance is being undertaken.

Planning

PC no objection: (1) Lime Cottage, New St, hand rail for front steps. (2) Holcombe Hotel, High St, technical amendment to previous application and various internal enabling works. (3) Corner House, High St, refurbishment of brickwork and drain restitution. (4) Ivings House, Philcote St, two-storey rear extension. (5) Knowle, Philcote St, fell laurel. (6) Heathfield House, High St, fell one Leylandii and trim one holly. (6) Her-

mitage, Market Pl., trim one yew and fell another. (7) Calder Cottage, Philcote St, replace interior wall.

PC objection: (8) 1 The Paddocks, conversion of house into four self-contained flats, concern about traffic flow but aware of the need for low-cost housing, qualified objection.

Approvals: (9) 22 St John's Way, Hempton, rear garden room. (10) 27 Gaveston Gdns, side extension and garage conversion. (11) Featherton House, Chapel Squ., various tree works. (12) Manor Farm, Hempton Rd, fell one sycamore.

The Berlin Wall - A Memory

In 1989 I was working as the Librarian at the American Library in Geneva. This was a large English language library, but its membership included more than 40 nationalities and my volunteer desk staff came from all over Europe, the UK, America and frequently from beyond.

Many of the staff were retired professionals, who had worked for international organisations or for their country's Foreign Service and had now settled in Geneva. They were intelligent, realistic, not given to undue displays of emotion. Then came 9 November and the collapse of the Berlin Wall. As befitted an international city, there were scenes of bounding happiness in Geneva's streets and homes, and among the many people with first-hand experience of the anguish of divided communities and illiberal regimes. Everywhere, there was an almost tangible sense of euphoria. The collapse of the Wall represented so much more than just one city's journey to unity.

In the Library my European staff forgot protocol. They forgot to speak English, momentarily greeting their fellow countrymen in their own language. They forgot to check date-dues and fines but clasped hands and looked at each other, often with tears of joy as they exchanged brief reminiscences or mentioned names and places from the past. A past, you felt, that had rarely been spoken of in public spaces. Several members became so lost in happiness that they forgot to return their books. It didn't matter. Most touching was a kind of cracking of the carapace of experience. It was suddenly all right to hope. Peace, freedom, brotherhood, justice, all the unattainable wish-list words were newly validated. Cynicism evaporated. We were children again, believing in the perfectibility of the world. The euphoria didn't last of course, but while it did, it became one of the most moving experiences of my life.

Country Life and the Church of England sought nominations for an 'Unsung Hero of the Rural Church'. George is included in the final shortlist of 12 invited to Lambeth Palace on 4 December – his first visit to London for 36 years! He was nominated inter alia for being churchwarden, choir member and crucifer, Warriner Choral Society chair, DN and Four Shires contributor, speaker on farming and beekeeping, pantomime actor and stage-set builder, hosting farm walks and Rogation services, making the church wrought-iron gates, sanctuary lamp, and candle stands, plus wooden tables and staging. In 1997 a group of 12 Deddingtonians got together to create a map of the parish of Deddington – that is, Deddington, Clifton and Hempton and the surrounding countryside. Their aim was to mark the passing of



the millennium with a kind of snapshot of the end of the 20th century. Deddington's Millennium Map was launched in November 2000. This ambitious project was three years in the making, and involved a specially commissioned aerial survey, painstaking hand colouring, artistic illustrations, historical research and computer technology.

The Deddington Millennium Map and posters can now be viewed on line, not just as scaled images, but full size with the ability to move around to view detail.


penhagen for the critical Climate Change Conference. Justin Forsyth, who grew up In Deddington, has been closely involved in the preparations as a key advisor to Gordon Brown, and may well be there.

A recent *Times* poll found that only two in five people in Britain accept as an established scientific fact that global warming is largely man-made. It doesn't help that popular broadcasters like Clive James confuse their listeners by confusing weather and climate. Not all weather forecasts prove accurate. Forecasting climate is different; it deduces clear trends from the evidence of hundreds of centuries. There is far more CO_2 in the atmosphere now than for the past 130 millennia, and the increase has soared in the 150 years since the industrial revolution – 29% and rising since 2000.

Ostriches will keep saying: 'Don't confuse me with the facts; my mind is made up'. If you are not an ostrich, have a look at the interactive map on the Department of Energy and Climate Change's website (http://www. actoncopenhagen.decc.gov.uk/content/en/embeds/ flash/4-degrees-large-map-final). It graphically illustrates, with supporting evidence, what the Met Office Hadley Centre and other leading impact scientists agree is likely to happen to people in each region of the world if apathy combines with vested interests to allow the average temperature of the planet to increase by 4°C, and 6°C is now likely if the nations fail to agree. The Met Office has also produced Warming: Climate change - the facts, a readable guide for those who still have an open mind: http://www.metoffice.gov.uk/ climatechange/guide/downloads/quick_guide.pdf.

Down on the Farm ...

There is very little weather lore connected with December, but one that predicts a good spring and summer to follow runs 'sun though the apple trees on Christmas Day means a fine crop is on the way'. These old country sayings have been handed down over the generations and many have more than a grain of truth in them, which is more than can be said of most of the modern-day forecasts. As yet we have had little in the way of frost, so the crops which should by now be in their winter dormancy period with their leaves 'waxed up' to protect them against frost are still growing away. This is a little worrying – if we get a sudden drop in temperature the growing spike which will produce next year's crop could be damaged.

Although the bees have been put to bed for the winter the mild weather has kept them awake and many of the hives are still flying out to forage on what is left of the ivy. A close watch will have to be kept, as if they are active in the hive and not 'clustered' up in hibernation we shall need to give them extra feed to get them through into next spring.

We have been pollarding a number of willow trees around two of the farm ponds which will be opened out to form shallow pools for amphibians. I know it looks rather drastic action to take but pollarding willows at this time of the year is the traditional method of crack willow management. Willow trees grow very fast and if

they are just left to grow away they become top heavy and collapse, which would split the main trunk and ultimately kill the tree. I well remember as a boy going with the men to pollard the numerous willow trees on the farm. This was done in rotation about every ten years or so. The coppiced branches were trimmed out with a bill hook (usually the boy's job) and used either for post and rail fencing or 'binding' the top of a newly cut and laid hedge.

Another source of fencing materials that grew on the farm were the ash 'stools' which grew in the hedgerows. These were the stumps of ash trees that had been cut off at ground level and left to produce a number of shoots which, when big enough, were again coppiced off and split (cleaved) for fence rails. An ash rail could last for over 20 years but an ash fencepost will rot at ground level in less than 12 months.

The Clifton sea has started to rise so it will not be long before the ewes will come inside in preparation for the rites of the new lambing season. Although I have spent over 50 years playing midwife to a load of belligerent ovines, I always look forward to the start of a new season, a magical time of year and I wouldn't change it for the world.

Happy Christmas, and see you at the pantomime.

... and on the Allotment

There is definitely a chill in the air, so now is the time to protect your produce. Put straw or bracken around the crowns of globe artichokes. Ideally you should lift and store your root crops such as carrots, beetroot, turnips and swedes. However, if you don't have storage space and still have root crops in the ground, cover them with a thick layer of straw, bracken or leaves. Alternatively put cloches over them. Parsnips can be left in the ground as they taste better when frosted.

Protect your brassicas from wind rock by earthing up the bases or staking them. If you have Brussels sprouts ready for harvesting, pick the largest sprouts from the bottom of the stalk first. Remove any yellowing leaves to prevent the spread of disease. You may also need to protect your brassicas with netting from hungry pigeons.

Spread a good thick layer of manure round fruit trees and current bushes. Rhubarb needs cold to trigger spring growth after the first hard frost, so collect the old stalks and throw them on the compost. Then spread a layer (5–8cm) of compost (or leaves or hay) to prevent winter winds from drying out your roots.

Prepare your greenhouse for the winter: lag the pipes – bubble wrap is excellent – and clean your greenhouse thoroughly to prevent the spread of pests and diseases and to allow as much light in as possible. Happy Christmas to all!

Windmill Community Centre

Over the last year there have been difficulties with the number of TENs (Temporary Event Licences) to allow the sale of alcohol, since these are limited to 12 for each location. The committee has recently been granted a premises licence with conditions on times, etc. This has been made possible with the help of Stella O'Neill of the Unicorn Inn who is now the Designated Premises Supervisor.

For any event where alcohol is sold or raffled for consumption on the premises, 21 days before the event the organiser needs to obtain the permission of the Management Committee through Joyce Minnear, the booking secretary; and then to liaise with Stella on the supply and supervision of the sale of alcoholic drinks. This new arrangement will give users far more flexibility. There will be a fee of £21 in line with the cost of a TEN. The committee is grateful and thanks Stella for her help and support in this change.

Hiring rates will be increased by 2% from 1 February 2010 to help cover the increases in utility costs.

A substantial grant of £39,835 has been made by the government's Low Carbon Buildings Programme towards the installation of solar panels. The committee will be looking into how to raise the additional £10,000 or so to make this project a reality.

Any unauthorised vehicles found parking overnight at the Windmill Centre may be clamped or removed.

DEDDINGTON 150 YEARS AGO

The following are extracts from the diaries of the Rev. Cotton Risley for the month of December 1859:

7th December – I heard from Mr. Burgess (the former Curate here) announcing that the Bishop had offered him the Vicarage of Burford and that he had accepted it. A poor fox was found in one of our hedges with a trap hanging to him and which had broken both his hind legs – I ordered him to be destroyed, he was shot.

8th December – A poor man from Milton came for advice under peculiar circumstances having reference to his wish of contracting a second marriage, his wife having left him 16 years ago to cohabit with another man. He had heard nothing of her for 12 years past. I told him he must be satisfied of her death before he could safely marry again.

17th December – Mr. H. Churchill and Hawtin the policeman came with 4 tramps or vagrants – from Manchester, Worcester, Glasgow and some other place. I committed them to the House of Correction for 10 days, they had stolen two loaves from Mrs. Wells's after having tickets given them for lodging at Busby's.

23rd December – I went after dinner to the Farm House to distribute two sheep, tea, sugar and money amongst the poor here and at the hamlets as usual. **24th December** – Mr. Egerton's choir boys came and sang the song for the times – and received each a shilling and an orange.

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FIRE SERVICE

Tell, a lot has been happening at your station over the past two months. We said a fond farewell to watch manager Anne Waters at the end of September. She has decided to further her career within the brigade and is currently stationed at Witney fire station in a fire prevention role. We wish her well for the future and will be eagerly following her progress over the coming months.

This has meant that acting watch manager Chris Fenemore is now leading from the front so to speak, and was last seen swamped under a pile of paperwork – poor fella. He has a tough job on his hands maintaining the high standards that we have achieved under Anne's leadership, but we're all keen to keep moving in the right direction. We have recently come second in the best retained station in the brigade. It was a very close call between us and Witney station, and our aim is to take first place next year. We hope that you are as proud as we are to know that you have a first-class fire station in your area.

New Recruits

We are pleased to report that we now have a new recruit in Richard Day from Barford St Michael, who has just passed his selection day and medical tests. Recent Incidents

We had a bizarre day out that started with a call to stand by at Bicester station, followed by Buckingham fire station. I think we were all very pleased that we have never had an emergency callout from another brigade's station as familiarity with local road names and numbers could have been an issue. After spending most of the morning there, we went back to stand by at Bicester, before returning home, only to be turned out as a relief crew later that night.

We were called to a single vehicle road traffic collision south of Deddington where we found a car wrapped around a tree. Hydraulic cutting equipment was used to release the driver. It is believed that the cause of the accident was the driver using his mobile phone. We have also attended a chimney fire in Middle Barton, followed immediately by a head-on road traffic collision involving two cars near Hopcrofts Holt. This was a serious incident and one driver was airlifted to the JR hospital using the Thames Valley air ambulance, whilst the other was taken by road ambulance. Again, hydraulic cutting equipment had to be used to free the casualties and we were backed up by the Woodstock appliance and the rescue tender from Kidlington.

We have also been across the border to two incidents in Northants, backing up their Brackley appliance. The first incident involved a faulty electrical meter in a house which caused smoke to pour out from underneath the stairs, and the second involved a call to an elderly gentleman's house where a small amount of paper had caught fire. Luckily he had a panic alarm system which automatically connected him to an operator at a control centre, which in turn alerted the fire service.

Honor Aitchison

Honor came to Featherton House some eight years ago. Her gentleness, politeness, kindness, her sense of humour and her ability always to see good in people meant she quickly won the affection of the Featherton community and of others in the village at large. Born in Dovercourt, she was brought up in Weymouth. Sailing rather than study was her forte early on (her father was in the Navy), but she took to ballet and after her performing days were over, remained interested in it all her life. During the War she served with the WRVS. She was a devoted wife, mother and grandmother, keeping the family knit together through diligent letter-writing. She enjoyed peppermints, bridge, sweet milky tea, flowers and cats. She had the distinction of being, at 90, the oldest and longest-serving steward for the National Trust. Though a latecomer to the village, Honor certainly qualified as a Deddington lady and will be much missed.
