Game Duty certificates

The shooting of game was one of the country pursuits enjoyed by the landowning classes. As a revenue raising device, shooting required obtaining a Game Duty certificate (cost 3 guineas). Lists of grantees were published in local newspapers each autumn.

These lists are useful in identifying local gentry, including attornies and Oxford academics.

In the case of the parish of Deddington, although numbers varied, on average three certificates a year were issued during 1800-1819, largely to members of the Churchill family.
