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DEDDINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Meeting Town Hall 17 December 2008

Recreation

Allotments: Letter from PC to all allotment holders in the New Year explaining need for billing in advance. The letter will also advocate voluntary membership of the Allotment Association for an additional £5.

Castle Grounds: Most of the site is owned by PC although parts are owned by English Heritage and the Church Commissioners. Any development will need consent from the Inspector of Ancient Monuments. Improvements to access and the 'Fitness Trail' would be encouraged by English Heritage. The whereabouts of the report and archive from the last archaeological investigation at the Castle was questioned and not resolved.

Clifton play area: The area could be reopened as soon as surface has been 'power washed'. Signs to be posted warning 'Slippery when wet'.

Environment & Special Projects

Verge clearing: OCC to be asked to clear the verge opposite the fire station to the north.

Dog bins: New bins to be placed in Clifton and on the Hempton Road near WCC entrance.

Cemetery: Proposals for the future management of the cemetery are being prepared. The objective is to manage the facility more cost effectively and to comply with Health and Safety regulations and PCC burial costs.

Environmental survey: To comply with the *Natural Environmental & Rural Communities Act 2006,* PC needs to map the flora and fauna of the Parish. An ecologist is to be retained to undertake the survey, 50% of the £300 cost is to be contributed by Oxfordshire Nature Forum.

Wildflower meadows: Start is to be made in spring, when the south area of the cemetery will be seeded. *Notice boards:* Attempts to be made to repair rather than replace the dilapidated notice boards.

Planters & hanging baskets: All the planters on the entrance roads to the villages have been replanted with bulbs and the Town Hall baskets have winter flowering pansies.

Town Hall wheelie bins: Person or persons unknown are abusing the Town Hall bins. Vigilance will result in the culprit being identified and shamed. **Planning**

PC no objection: [1] 14 High St, demolition and reconstruction of extension. [2] The Willery, Clifton Rd, replacement windows in UPVC rather than wood. [3] Cornerways, Chapel Sq, conversion of outbuildings to living accommodation. [4] Castle Barns, Castle Street, new pier and gates for existing glazed entrance.

PC approvals: [5] 34 The Daedings, single storey rear extension. [6] The Old Vicarage, Church St, external alterations to railings and wall.

Possible non compliance: Ithaca, Hopcraft Lane, CDC is in contact with owner and a further planning application is expected to regularise work.

Other planning matters: Mill Close, tree removal request. A resident has requested removal of a tree that is blocking light. CDC has agreed tree can be removed, however removal or coppicing to be undertaken at the resident's expense.

Highways

Satin Lane: Installation of no parking signs/markings delayed by weather.

Temporary speeding signs: To be posted for a maximum of two weeks, HWG yet to decide when and where.

Southgate pinchpoint: Unsatisfactory signage and road markings to be resolved.

Earl's Lane: HWG needs to analyse traffic speed data collected by OCC. HWG needs to collect corroborative data and to be seen to be monitoring drivers' speed.

Market Place crossing: Difficult to resolve because of junctions and mandatory zig-zag road marking required.

High St traffic lights: OCC to be asked to undertake pedestrian traffic audit at a more typical time.

New Street crossing: OCC are assessing the implications of a crossing point at the southern end.

Finance & General Purposes

Financial market turmoil is putting strain on local authorities across the country and PC is particularly affected as a high proportion of income is interest on Capital Account money. The location of Parish funds in West Bromwich and Birmingham Midshires Building Societies is being monitored and is considered safe and secure. However the fall in interest rates has resulted in a loss of income. At the same time PC expenditure in this financial year is likely to be £10,000 over budget. This overspend is covered from the Revenue Reserve account which stands at £30,241. If interest rates stay at the present level for the next financial year, and they could come down further, income could be £8,000 less than in the current year and if expenditure continues at the present level, the money in the Revenue Reserve account will be exhausted. At the January meeting a decision will have to be made over future expenditure commitments and the Council income precept.

Church clock: PC's commitment to the PCC for the church clock needs to be made clear. PC will agree to be responsible for routine servicing for the next five years. PC will not make a commitment to cover repairs; nevertheless the PCC can approach PC for help and each request will be assessed on its merits at the time.

Parish Finances

Invoices passed for payment £4,129. Investments totalled £528,755 at WBrom BS, Barclays & Birmingham Midshires BS.

Finance & General Purposes

Investments: to maintain income and security £200,000 has been transferred from the West Bromwich BS to the Anglo Irish Bank.

Precept for 2009-10: The dilemma facing the PC is that for years a higher level of service has been delivered in Deddington than surrounding parishes because of the benefit of investment income. In the year 2007-08 this income amounted to £29.384. Interest rates have declined sharply and the draft budget for 2009-10 forecasts that investment income will be reduced to £15,810. Additionally expenditure has run ahead of budget for the last two years. In the present straitened economic circumstances it is the fiscal responsibility of the council to reduce costs and increase income. The expenditure budget for 2009-10 is being reduced from £73,767 in 2007-08 to £59,174. At the same time the council is going to apply to CDC for a precept increase of 10%. The increase means that a Band D house in Deddington parish will see the parish component of Council Tax increase from £33.16 this year to £36.48 next year.

Allotment charges: Charges based on a local and national comparison of allotment fees; fees to be charged in advance or *pro rata* through the year; no refunds for surrendering allotments through the year; a one-off registration fee for new plot holders of £10; plots only to be rented in chains [22yds] or half chains; a fee increase for a full plot to £21 pa, smaller plots *pro rata*; existing smaller plots at Stonepits to be phased out over time; a separate voluntary/discretionary fee of £5 to be charged for membership by the Satin Lane Allotment Society; no concessionary rates and no further rentals to non-residents; all these terms to be reviewed annually.

Cricket Club: have applied for a grant or a loan of £4,500 to improve coaching facilities. At the moment the club is financially only breaking even. If a loan is agreed PC needs to be reassured that the improved facilities will generate sufficient incremental income to repay loan.

Town Hall: Rendering on outside is delaminating and will need to be repaired before repainting. The rent is to be increased and PC may have to consider not renewing the lease after 2010.

Stonepits: Papers relating to title and ownership of the land have been sent to the Land Registry.

Recreation

Castle Grounds: The Colts are to be asked what they want to do about the moles that have invaded the pitch. The area may have to revert to mown footpaths.

Clifton play area: The area has been spray cleaned and reopened.

Environment & Special Projects

Oxford Conservation Volunteers: A programme of works has been agreed for 2009:

the construction of a dry walkway across the boggy area on the south side of the Castle Grounds;

assess and report back to PC on the reinstatement of the pond in the Clifton play area as a wildlife habitat;

clear footpath and lay hedge at the Windmill copse.

Wildflower meadow: OCC to provide a map confirming areas of responsibility and ecologist's advice being sought.

Oxfordshire Nature Conservation Forum: publish a weekly activity newsletter which may be linked to Deddington website.

Deddington planters: Nicholson's Nursery has offered sponsorship of the north and south planters on A4260. Providing the signage is in line with guidelines, the offer is to be accepted.

Planning

PC no objection: [1] Treholford, New Street, single storey rear extension and tree felling.

Retrospective: [2] 5 The Paddocks, approval of additional roof light and sunpipe. [3] Ithaca, Hopcraft Lane, works exceeded original approval, being reviewed by CDC.

Approvals: [4] 5 St John's Way, Hempton, trees, additional windows, doors and provision of parking. [5] Castle Barns, Castle St, division into two separate dwellings. [6] The Old Vicarage, internal and external works, demolition of part of wall. [7] Or-chard House, Hopcraft Lane, reduction of screen height. [8] Deddington Health Centre, Earl's Lane, tree lopping and pruning. [9] The Willery, Clifton Rd, use of UPVC in place of wooden windows. [10] Cornerways, Chapel Sq, conversion of outbuildings to living accommodation.

Other planning matters: Hempton Lodge, Hempton, fence erected on highway, being pursued by OCC.

Highways

Satin Lane: No Parking sign now in place.

Earl's Lane: OCC have not yet provided speed data they collected.

High St traffic lights: Response to OCC being prepared.

New Street crossing: OCC have responded to the suggested crossing point at the southern end, but too late to be considered at HWG meeting.

AOB Someone has been stealing milk from New St doorsteps. Be aware or someone else might be drinking it!



from nails to saucepans and paraffin lamps in his ironmonger's shop. Fast approaching the entrance to Hudson Street, we pass Mr and Mrs Stockdale's chemist shop next to the Volunteer pub run by Mrs Jenner with her son Frank and his wife. On the bend into Hudson Street stands the house and business of Mr Saunders, colloquially known as "Fudgy". He sells a wonderful selection of sweets temptingly on offer from glass bowls and for the weekend reader he sells the Sunday papers. Crossing Hudson Street, we come to the Holliday's garage and shop with bikes, bike accessories, car tyres, petrol and paraffin on sale. Now, keep walking north and you will reach Lewis high class grocer shop where Mrs Lewis senior, clothed in a long black dress and white pinafore, sells her wares helped by her son and his wife. Before we reach the Magistrates' Court (now the Library)



Turning into Market Square, keeping to the right, we pass Miss French's sweet shop (now Red Lion Cottage) and, next door, the Red Lion run by Mr and Mrs James Green. We now stop awhile at The Bakehouse owned first by the Dodwells and later by Mr and Mrs Bernard Wallin, their sons Lawrence and John and their wives. They cook a very good batch loaf and their specialities are: on Mondays lardy cake, on Wednesdays jam doughnuts, and on Fridays dough cakes, and they also cook Sunday roasts for their esteemed customers.'

As the last edition of the DN was being printed, four of us from Deddington attended a meeting at Bodicote House jointly hosted by Cherwell District Council and Oxfordshire ClimateXchange. Called 'Joining the Dots', its purpose was to make local climate and energy-conscious groups aware of each other and to exchange ideas. Elspeth Cox told the meeting that 'together with the Woodland Trust, we have created a ten acre woodland [Daeda's Wood] which, in only 12 years, has become a valuable habitat'. And Jean Rudge said that our Parish Council is 'ever mindful of the necessity for ecological considerations to underpin everything that we do ... our immediate project is the creation of wildflower rivers and hotspots'. For me, energy is the big one, so I related the present state of play on the Windmill turbine project. This attracted some interest, even CDC representatives being most encouraging.

The next committee meeting of the Friends will be on 4 February at 10.00am.


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FROM THE EDITOR'S POSTBAG

FROM NICK ALLEN, BARN END, ADDERBURY In reference to Jill Cheeseman's article 'Here and There' and Rob Forsyth's 'Account of those Sentenced to be Transported' in December's DN: glue the two stories together and I think Mrs Cheeseman will have an answer to her query. As to The Blackboy – that is the pub in Milton that has borne that name since the middle of the eighteenth century.

Mr Forsyth reports that the men transported in the nineteenth century were all from Adderbury. They would more than likely have known The *Blackboy*, as Milton historically always has been

(and still is) a hamlet of Adderbury. Milton's present church is a daughter church of Adderbury's as its medieval chapel was a chapel to Adderbury's church. Incidentally, the Parish of Adderbury, until 1865, covered a vast acreage – consisting of East and West Adderbury, Milton, Bodicote which became an independent civil parish in 1855, and Barford St John which became an independent civil parish in 1932.

IT'S ALL GROW

On the Farm

As there was no January issue of the Deddington News may I wish you all a belated happy new year.

At this time of the year life down on the farm revolves around the livestock. The sheep flock was finally pushed off its grazing by the Clifton sea in

mid-December. However they were very content to come into their winter housing, where they will stay until they return to the river valley with their lambs. The last of the 2008 lamb crop have now left the farm, as has about 50% of the last harvest, with the rest contracted to go out by mid-March just

before the lambing season gets into full swing. Most of the fieldwork is up to date and the late drilled oil seed rape seems to have survived the recent spell of very cold weather which managed to reach -9°C for five days in a row. But as I pen this it is back to the mud and water that over the last few years we have come to associate with winters in the age of global warming.

In mid-January Hilary Benn, head mandarin of Defra, made a pro-farming speech to the assembled delegates at the annual Oxford Farming Conference, in which he announced to a stunned audience that he wanted British farmers to produce as much food as possible, and that the future of the world would literally depend on farming, a considerable U-turn given his usual reticence on all things agricultural. But sadly, in the light of recent developments in the High Court and the European Parliament, he seems to be using a different hymn sheet to the rest of our masters. If the High Court ruling on the protection of the public from crop spray exposure is upheld on appeal, it will be almost

impossible to grow any crops on land adjacent to housing, which would mean the land we farm behind the Grove and Gaveston Gardens may well have to be left to become derelict. Also the recent vote in the European Parliament to ban the use within the EU of a large number of the most

widely used crop protection products will have the effect of reducing crop yields: grain crops by 40%, potatoes 50%, carrots 100% etc.

It seems more than a little perverse that the same MEPs who voted to ban the use of these crop chemicals, then voted to support a report calling for greater food security within the EU, a report that expressed alarm that a ban on the use of these crop protection products would lead to a dramatic reduction in food output. So how's that for joined up thinking? The High Court ruling may very well prevent large tracts of land from being cropped and the EU legislation will cut the yield on what's left, so it's just one pantomime after another. At least the Deddington Players' production will only run to four performances and will be a lot of fun!

The Allotment

Recently, Tony Campion handed over the reins of his beautifully cared for allotment and I'm delighted to be taking over. However, I may struggle to maintain his military precision! I've had vegetable patches and fruit in my garden for years but this is my first allotment. I'm very much looking forward to learning from the great pool of experience around me and removing fruit and vegetables from my supermarket shopping list.

The January frosts may have delayed your bed preparation somewhat, but to warm you up, it is now time to dig in manure or lime, depending on your soil PH. Most fruit and vegetables will thrive in a soil PH of 6.5 to 7.0, so if your soil has a lower value than this liming may be required. However, to avoid a loss of nitrogen which is essential for vegetative growth, do not lime and manure in the same area.

Whilst on the subject of fresh manure, a useful note from the RHS book *Fruit and Vegetable Gardening* says that planting onions in a bed with

We particularly require someone to take an interest in the Community section of the site.

While many parts already have their own subeditors, it would be useful to have one person maintaining an overview/co-ordination role. This might appeal to someone who does not wish to fresh manure is likely to cause them to grow 'soft'. So as onions are due to be planted from mid Feb to

March it might be wise to dig the area well but keep it clear of manure.

Having pruned your fruit bushes you can now turn your attention to the rhubarb. To effectively force rhubarb do not cover plants younger than two years old as it will weaken them. First, clear the area around



the plant and cover with dried leaves or straw to help raise the temperature of the earth. Then cover the crowns with a rhubarb forcer or upturned bucket and keep them in the dark. Leave the stems to grow as tall as the cover before harvesting them and you'll enjoy sweet juicy rhubarb.



DEDDINGTON 150 YEARS AGO

fter a break of two months when he was unwell, the Rev Cotton Risley re-starts his diaries in February 1859, of which the following are some extracts:

13th February, Sunday - today I went to Clifton twice as usual, last Sunday evening the Church was lighted with gas for the first time – it was very satisfactory to the congregation which was a large one.

16th February - A woman named Rymill from Clifton came to report the accidental death of one of her sons working at Swerford, who was killed by a blacksmith's anvil falling upon him which he had boastingly attempted to lift as high or over his head, in doing which he fell backwards and the anvil fell upon him. He lived a day and a half after the accident – his skulll was crushed and injured – I am to bury him tomorrow.

I had a long chat with Mr Kinch about impending Evils – the Vicar's return etc.

20th February - Mr Faulkener went to Oxford yesterday and delivered a petition to the Bishop, against Mr Brogden's notified intention of immediately returning into residence (by giving Mr Burgess and the other two curates notice to quit the

From the Fire Station

We have had 15 call outs in the last month, a thatched roof fire, three chimney fires, two false alarms, one car fire, one computer fire and several calls to stand by on the M40 and at Banbury and Bicester stations.

Over the past year we had a total of 216 fire calls, one of the busiest years for a long time. Mainly due to the commitment the crew has given, we have been able to respond to emergency calls for 98% of the year; for a station that has only a crew of nine this is quite a feat and proves how committed we are to protecting our community.

The start of the year will see some changes at the Deddington Fire Station with Fire Fighter Steven Potter moving to Banbury. He has been at Deddington for two years but the bright lights of the town (and house prices) have drawn him away. All is not lost, however, as he will be joining our colleagues at Banbury Fire Station, so we wish him well. Hopefully we have some potential new recruits from Adderbury in the pipeline, so Steve's peg will not be empty for long, although there are still four empty ones that need filling!

As with the seasons of the year, in the fire service we have our own, and at the moment the chimney fire season is in full swing! We recommend that you have your chimney swept at least twice a year especially if you have a wood burner. Thatched roofs are also very vulnerable.

If you would like some more advice on chimneys and protecting thatched roofs or any other fire safety issues, please give the station a call (338281) and have a chat with our community fire safety team. Curacy) – signed by more than 100 inhabitants, it was said 130.
