COMMEMORATING VE DAY

70TH ANNIVERSARY BONFIRE

The ending of WW2 in Europe on 8 May 1945- was marked across the land by the lighting of bonfires at 'the going down of the sun'. This year's 70th Anniversary will be marked in a similar manner across the country by lighting bonfires at 9.30pm after sounding the Last Post.

Thanks to swift action by the PC, there will be a Deddington bonfire in the field immediately to the south of the Hempton road, on the left (approaching from Deddington) just before the Hempton planter, by very kind permission of Mitch Cole. It will be visible from Duns Tew to the south and all the villages to Banbury

It is suggested that people assemble by 9.15pm. Remember to bring a torch or lantern.

There will be no refreshments but baking potatoes in the embers in the traditional manner will be permitted - bring your own butter and salt.

Limited parking on the roadside will be available for 'veterans'.

This may be the very last time to focus our thanks on those who took part in WW2. Very recently I lost two friends, George and Bill, who were two of the few remaining WW2 veterans.

Present: Cllrs Boulton, Collins (chair), Cox, East, Flux, Oldham, Rogers, Squires, Watts, Williams (CDC) and Wood.

Planning: Earthworm Energy, Hill Farm, Duns Tew. PC objected to an application for 11 hectares (30 acres) of solar panels in a farm field on grounds of visual intrusion on the landscape and loss of valuable agricultural land.

Highways and Transport: More complaints have been received about the phasing of the traffic lights on the Hempton and OCC has been informed.

Environment and Recreation: Businesses will be receiving letters to remind them that they may not deposit waste in PC bins.

A local gardener's kind offer to maintain the planter on the west side of the A4260 was declined on the grounds of safety and its removal is under active consideration.

The Cricket Club has requested permission to demolish the existing pavilion and replace it with a much larger one. No decision will be made until plans and financing for the proposed pavilion are agreed.

Two trees which are causing problems at the allweather court and the MUGA playing area are to be felled. They will be replaced with trees in the gap created by the collapsing fence on the east side of Windmill Coppice.

A spring clean will be held on Saturday 9 May, convening at the Holly Tree at 10.00am.

Large Scale Developments and Neighbourhood Planning: Thames Water has determined that the existing wastewater infrastructure is inadequate to accommodate the needs of the proposed development north of Gaveston Gardens.

Trees on the northern boundary of this development are to be inventoried.

PC objected to proposed bus stops on the carriageway of the A4260.

Next PC meeting: Wednesday 20 May at 7.30pm in the Windmill Centre.

The annual Parish Meeting will be held on Wednesday 6 May at 7.30pm in the Lounge at the Windmill Centre.



DEDDINGTON 150 YEARS AGO

The following are extracts from the diaries of the Revd Cotton Risley for the month of May 1865:

8th May – A girl came begging money to buy clothes preparatory to her going into service in Oxford – I told her to call again. I attended the Penny Bank.



10th May – Jordan brewing for haymaking.

13th May – A. Hall (from Duns Tew) came again having found that his Butler had robbed him of a hat and pair of boots. I granted a warrant for his apprehension.

15th May – In London till the 27th when we returned home. Susan consulted Dr. F. Bird who confirmed Mr. Symonds's opinion of her case in all particulars and prescribed for us. Willy and John dined with us most days, Holford came up for the Levee but returned for his annual Yeomanry duty at Woodstock.

29th May – Franklin's estimate was accepted for completing the Church restoration work – total £1,900.

31st May – Scroggs came to collect a Church Rate, not a strictly legal one being retrospective and improper items having been introduced into it. Told him I should consider what I should do under the circumstances.

DOWN ON GEORGE'S FARM

Tell, that's it for another year! As I sit and bash this out we have just a few stragglers left in the ovine maternity ward, so it's time for me to exchange my shepherd's crook for a bee veil and smoker.

The lambing season has gone very well; all we need now is some grass and, dare I say it, some rain. Although we have had some warm days it is still very cold at night with early morning frosts. With the blackthorn

only just coming into flower on the river meadows, we seem set for a late spring. I am hoping that is the reason why, for the first time in over 40 years, the curlew have not returned to our river valley meadows. In years past, late February or early March have always been heralded by the provocative wild call of the curlew, an early indicator that spring was on its way. I am sure that the 'beards and sandals' will be very quick to point the finger in the direction of modern farming methods, bringing about a change in, and loss of, habitat.

In fact, the farming methods used to manage these traditional grazing meadows have changed little in the last 500 years, but the habitat and ecology of the river valley have seen some considerable change since my boyhood days of adventure in the 'wild lands' that surrounded the site of the 1914-18 war munitions factory well south of Banbury. There was little change until the M40 was carved across the wild lands and Banbury became just another town with a motorway junction ripe for development into the flood plain. Today we have a flood defence scheme which has allowed even more flood plain development. All that this has done is to push the problem downstream, so the valley land some ten miles to the south of the town floods a lot faster than it did, to a much greater depth and for a longer period of time. That is what has changed the habitat and ecology of the river valley. Although we have had a dry winter with little flooding, the last two winters and springs have been wet and the curlew have returned to find their nesting sites under water or, as last year, been washed off their nests by a late flood, exacerbated by the design and management of the flood defence controls. But there is still time for the birds to show up. I do hope so as it was the call of the curlew that greeted me on my first day as a Deddington estate tenant farmer way back in the March of 1974.

I am pleased to report that the first of our summer visitors have returned to their nesting sites in the farm buildings. To date we have three pairs of swallows hawking the sky above the farm for early insects, so it won't be long before the house martins turn up, followed by the real harbingers of summer, the masters of aerial acrobatics, the swifts.

The over-winter ploughing has been worked down into a perfect seed bed and planted with spring barley. With the 'open' winter, our autumn-planted crops are



in fine form. The oil seed rape has put on a lot of growth and is coming well into flower, something that has given the bees a flying start to their season, so it's a race against time to get them sorted, before they start to swarm. With the ewes back on the their summer grazing, I am off with the bees and, maybe, a little fly fishing, until I am recalled for duty, flying the Green Goddess (the combine).

Last month I made an appeal to our local dog owners to keep their pets on a lead when walking through or past the fields with the ewes and their lambs. Many thanks to you all for heeding my appeal, but sadly another equally catastrophic situation (for the sheep that is) has become a regular event; the bridle gates along the right-of-way from Clifton to Deddington and on to North Aston are being left open. It seems that the local 'running man' cannot spare the time to shut the gates as it may add a few seconds to his timed training run. So, if you find a bridle gate open when you go for a walk, please shut it, as grazing a lush crop of wheat or oil seed rape could give the sheep a lot of problems.

CHRISTIAN AID WEEK

Christian Aid Week, 10-16 May, is approaching, and we look forward to making it even more successful than last year when our total for the parish was the magnificent harvest of £2,006, £120 more than 2013's £1,886. We think this is a Deddington record. To this can be added a further £216 in tax reclaimed as 100 people were able to sign the Gift Aid form attached to their red envelope, 20 more than last year.

This year Christian Aid celebrates its 70th birthday – 70 years of work dedicated to the relief of suffering. In 1945 many British people, who had lost not just their loved ones and homes but their hopes and dreams too, were horrified when they saw the suffering and devastation that Hitler had brought upon his own people in Germany.

In May 1945 the leaders of all the main churches asked that Christians should resist celebrating a victory on the Sunday after VE Day and instead donate what they could to help reconstruct Europe. More than £3 million in today's money was raised that weekend.

When the red envelope drops through your letterbox, please think of putting the cost of one meal into it, and, if you can, please sign the Gift id declaration, ready for the volunteer collector to call for it.

DAEDA'S WOOD

Daeda's Wood is a sight to behold: a hazy shimmer of soft leaf green at eye level with bursts of sun-reflecting white blackthorn blossoms lining the open areas. Lush verdure underfoot, occasionally punctuated by bright yellow dandelions and wood anemones, provides good habitat for the unseen wildlife which races for cover at the approach of human footfall.

The youngsters who constructed the shelters might well see and hear more from spending time in these 'hides' than the visitors who, like myself, sometimes walk a bit briskly. I have tried ... and it is possible to just about fit in, to sit beneath the roots of the riverside willow in the hope of seeing the otters just before the sun sets.

The Friends of Daeda's Wood hope to have an information table at one of the summer Farmers' Market days. Contact me if you would like to join the Friends to help support and spread the enjoyment of this community wood which is virtually on our door step.

FROM THE FIRE STATION

Our station has had fifty call-outs since the beginning of the year which is definitely down on last year but still quite busy for a small station. The cause of this is not clear but with the ongoing safety message we deliver, safer equipment in people's homes, and the smoke alarms that are fitted, all help to keep our community safer. Deddington was also covering more stations last year which meant more call-outs, but now other stations have started to get more crew.

Deddington has attended some quite large incidents this month. For example, a restaurant in Bicester Village required five fire engines and the closing of the road into the Village. When we arrived the roof was well alight and we had to get ladders up to try and get directly onto the fire. However this proved really difficult as it had burned through the tile battens and slates were sliding off the roof. It took some time to get the blaze under control and quite a bit longer before the shoppers could be let in or out of Bicester Village. There was also a call to a farm near Sibford which was another roof fire, but this one was considerably smaller. It was caused by an electric water pump overheating and, not only did the farmer have no roof on his house, he lost the water supply for his 500 head of cattle. The Fire Brigade will always try to help to get these issues sorted and we had the water and electricity board on site almost immediately and sheeted his roof with tarpaulins to keep the weather out.

Other calls have been to a couple of road traffic collisions, but nothing on our patch. Some alarms and the usual number of standbys to other stations. I can report that there were no chimney fires last month so hopefully that will be the end of those till the end of the year.

Training is always ongoing at Deddington and we have been doing some breathing apparatus training at Horton Hospital. They have a large derelict building which they have kindly let us use for training. This is really important for us because after a while you get to know the layout of our usual venues and then it is not so realistic. With a large venue like the hospital, other stations can get involved which helps crews work together. The drill at the hospital involved three fire engines and lots of casualties with many entry points into the building. The feedback we got was all very positive and we will be using it again.

There has been a big push at Deddington to get the development Fire Fighters fully trained. This is very time consuming and they have spent many hours attending lectures to get learning needs signed off. It is hoped that by the end of the year at least half of the six still in development will be fully competent.

The car wash was a great success. There was a steady flow of people and we managed to raise £350 for the Fire Fighters' Charity. I would like to thank Tom Hall and Lewis Mahony for organising the event and the crew who gave up their spare time to help on the day and a really big thank you to everyone who brought their car down to get it washed.

Our next big event will be the Four Farms Challenge on 10 May. This was a huge success last year. Registration is from 10am at Castle Grounds and there will be a barbecue, bouncy castle, licensed bar and a cake stall. By the time you see this, the second drop-in sessions will already have taken place and the Neighbourhood Plan steering group will, with luck, have a lot more feedback on what you think of our progress so far. In the coming month we'll be analysing the results, and, if necessary, the topic groups will be rethinking their goals and objectives. After that, we begin forming policies and the real work of composing a neighbourhood plan gets under way.

As it happens, there'll be another chance to air your views soon after the drop-ins - at the annual parish meeting which this year falls on Wednesday 6 May at 7.30pm at Windmill Centre - the day before the General Election. How much democracy can you take? Lots, we hope.

The parish meeting will, of course, focus on local issues. Alan Collins, chair of Deddington Parish Council, will give his report on the Council's activities over the past year, and then the meeting will be turned over to the public for comments and suggestions. If you'd like to make a more lengthy contribution, let Lorraine Watling, the parish clerk, know as soon as possible and she will include it on the agenda (deddingtonparishcouncil@googlemail.com or drop her a line at the Windmill Centre office).

One of the strong messages to emerge from the recent Neighbourhood Plan survey was that, although Deddington parishioners place a high value on the parish's play areas – the sports fields and the Windmill Centre—there is also a high level of criticism of them, which took some by surprise.

We now know that a fair number of residents would like better playground equipment and more space more pitches and more courts – for sport. So the PC and the neighbourhood planners would be pleased to hear what your priorities are, or, indeed, if you think there's too much emphasis on sport and play.

Nobody wants to raise false expectations. Croquet lawns and swimming pools might be some parishioners' heart's desire, but new loos at the Windmill may be more doable. Realistic or not, let's hear it.


Rhubarb, rhubarb

The market specialises in local seasonal produce and there's a lot of produce about at this point in the season. It is the season of gluts. Some things, like asparagus, you just have to enjoy while they last - though in previous years attempts have been made at the Market to sell asparagus bread. Some things are just persistently productive and usually end up as chutney.

Take rhubarb. There's a lot of it about. More than you could possible

consume or preserve in conventional ways. And, being a lot cheaper than the likes of asparagus, there isn't the incentive to be reverential about it. I spent a good portion of my schooldays consuming stolen sticks of rhubarb dipped in sugar, to the point I can barely look at the stuff now. I'll tolerate it in chutney but there are so many nicer chutneys it seems pointless to lay down one that is less good.

My recently discovered preference is for a jam. This is no ordinary jam. The recipe comes originally from Pamela Westland's A Taste of the Country. It's virtue can be judged from the fact that Jane Grigson (who disliked rhubarb intensely) included it in her classic, Jane Grigson's Fruit Book. The recipe produces a jam that is halfway to marmalade. It is as fantastic on hot buttered toast as it is with a pan-fried pigeon breast on a bed of warm puy lentils, which is how I ate it most recently. I think it is a very clever way of preventing a

2 grapefruit 34 kg sugar

Put the rhubarb in a bowl, and grate the grapefruit rind over it or you can use a

zester. Peel the fruit and cut it in half. Press it through a sieve with your hands

or a pestle into the bowl. Pour the sugar on top, cover and leave overnight. Next day, bring slowly to the boil in a heavy pan, stirring often. When the sugar has completely disappeared, raise the heat and boil hard for 15 minutes. Test to see if setting point has been reached. Pot as usual. Enough for four 1/2 kg jars.

Once you've tried this you will look at the stacks of rhubarb on sale through different eyes.

Deddington and District History Society

Our April speaker was Carol Anderson, Director of the Oxfordshire Museum at Woodstock, who told us of the glovemaking industry that at one time involved pretty much the whole of west Oxfordshire and centred on Woodstock. The industry relied upon the good supply of leather to be had from the deer of Woodstock (later Blenheim) Park and Wychwood Forest. First recorded in 1241, the industry seems to have flourished from the 16th century onwards: Henry VIII and Elizabeth I were but two of the notable figures for whom Oxfordshire gloves were considered appropriate gifts. The industry provided much employment for women, many of them out-workers, who sewed skins prepared and cut by men. In 1851, for instance, there were 888 gloveresses

in Charlbury alone. The pay was small but crucially it gave women and girls an income of their own to spend as they wished – often to the disapproval of their, usually male, betters. Woodstock glovers continued to make high-quality products into the 20th century, such as the white gloves of the Household Cavalry, but the industry declined after 1945, unable to compete with cheap, stylish imports. The last Woodstock factory closed in 1981. There are still a few (only a handful probably) stitchers left, sewing gloves for firms elsewhere, but the industry is effectively dead.

Our final speaker of the season, on Wednesday 13 May, is Richard Radcliffe, on school education in Victorian times. We meet at the Windmill Centre at 7.30pm and all are welcome.

To mark the bicentenary of the Battle of Waterloo we are hoping to arrange a private tour of the Duke of Wellington's London residence, Apsley House, plus a tour of Admiralty Arch, on 11 June. She managed, however, and despite being strict with her children which, under the circumstances, was probably necessary, they agreed that she was loving, kind and as generous as she could be.

Eventually, in 1947, the family moved to The Paddocks where they had more space and a better environment to grow. Christmas it seems, was a particularly happy time at The Paddocks, when the family enjoyed

many Christmas parties that were especially joyful and happy occasions.

Rene also knew how to enjoy herself. During the war when she was able to let her hair down, she loved to dance and have a social life. She was a pretty good card player and enjoyed going to whist drives. Her special talent though was playing Scrabble – a game she enjoyed right up to the end.

Rene has also left the remarkable legacy of her family. She had four children, eight grandchildren, a staggering 18 great-grandchildren and more recently, two great-great-grandchildren, all of whom she loved dearly.

Rene moved to Holly Cottages about 20 years ago, and it is there that she ended her days on 2 March, quietly, with some of her family around her. She brought such love to her family. When I met with them they agreed that they were truly fortunate to have had her for their Mum.
