#### **Open Forum:**

- Christmas tree: well received, traffic cones necessary to prevent cars getting too close.
- Street lighting: in spite of light pollution and cost it was necessary for all street lights to be left on all night for security.

#### Highwavs

Finger posts being repaired.

New Street: two possible crossing points are being discussed with OCC.

School Crossing: warden post still unfilled.

Postbox: re-sighting still being discussed.

Parking at school: the idea is accepted in principle providing it is on agreed days and supervised.

Clifton footpath repair: SUSTRANS who recently were awarded £50 million lottery funding are to be asked for support.

Hempton traffic speed is to be monitored.

- Gaveston Gardens footpath: repair has been authorised.
- A manhole at the Chapel Square end of the Market Place has lifted and is being repaired.

#### **Environment & Recreation**

Windmill Centre play area is waiting for funding for repairs and refurbishment; 8 bales of bark are to be ordered.

Teen Scene 'Drop in Centre' under discussion -

Cricket Club windows which are boarded up, having been vandalised, were thought unsightly. Mesh

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screens were suggested, or perhaps the boards could be painted. The sight screen was damaged and needs repair.

#### Highways

- Reduction of street lights for economy and environment: OCC advice being sought.
- Clifton Footpath: SUSTRANS have been contacted and have detailed requirements.
- Hempton Pinch Point: OCC have agreed to move centre white line subject to resident consultation.
- Bus Concessions: details to be posted on Town Hall notice board.
- Flooding in Clifton: Cllr Collins preparing a letter/ report with photographs.
- School Crossing: conversations between Highways Group, School Governors & OCC Travel Plan Liaison Team are continuing and various initiatives are being considered.
- A4260 South: remedial work to improve safety, including SLOW road markings, buff coloured high friction surface on dangerous sections, improved road studs and signage in the hands of contractors. Further consultation to discuss action for A4260 North required with OCC.
- A4260 crossing points: OCC undertaking survey.
- Finger-posts: have not been stolen but removed for repair (*picture right*).
- Parking: The 2001 survey to be revisited and reviewed with Environment & Recreation group.

#### Finance & General Purposes

- Precept 2008/09: PC decided to restrict precept application to 3.5%. Exact expenditure forecast not fully agreed for next year but in spite of rising costs the PC decided to hold precept at similar level to last year because budget is cushioned by investment income.
- Members' allowances: CDC have issued notification about members' allowances but not relevant to Deddington PC because members do not take allowance.
- Johnson & Gaunt have informed PC that they are holding unspecified Deddington deeds.

#### **Environment & Recreation**

- Teen Scene: £20,000 grant approved, contracts about to be placed.
- Youth Drop in Centre: projects in Banbury and Bicester to be visited to gain operational advice. Location needs to be agreed and a consultation with 14–18 year-old target group to understand facilities required.
- Allotments: interest in setting up a group to run the allotments.
- Friends of Daeda's Wood: application for support for pruning event and update of the photographic display declined. A request for a brown direction sign on the A4260 referred to OCC.
- Castle Grounds: working group recommended pruning and cutting back around entrance. English Heritage need to replace info boards.

- Christmas Eve: concern about the amount of broken glass after the festivities; hostelries to be encouraged to only use plastic glasses at such times.
- Windmill Centre: the missing CCTV signs to be replaced.
- Blood Service: consultation to assess interest and possible site for donation service to make regular visit (see insert).



#### Fuel crisis? What fuel crisis?

ow do you feel about paying well over £1 a litre for your car fuel? And does the thought of paying 15% more for your heating and lighting make you angry? This is just the start, so read on ...

Back in November a couple of hundred people – including three from Deddington – met in Oxford to hear Rob Hopkins talk about his ideas for Transition Towns (TT). He starts from the now familiar message that, not only do we face the challenge of global warming, with its need to reduce carbon




emissions. but also that oil and production gas peaked have From already. now fuel on, prices are going up and up as it becomes more difficult and expensive to

extract oil. You will pay more at the petrol pump and more to heat and light your home. In the UK we have the third problem of meeting demand for electricity in the short term while the government gets its act together over power stations in time to replace those that are fast clapping out. But already in Oxfordshire, TT ideas are taking shape in Abingdon, Wallingford, Wantage, Wolvercote and Yarnton as well as Oxford City where local people are making a start on finding ways to reduce their demand for energy. Around here only half-a-dozen people have put their heads above the parapet so far despite media exposure of the most serious challenge to face us in all our lifetimes. #### WIND AT THE WINDMILL - UPDATE

Plans for a wind turbine at the Windmill are gathering speed. We are looking at two options: either a single, horizontal 20kW Westwind turbine on an 18m tower on the far side of the playing field (see *DN* November '07); or four 8m high vertical 5kW Helix Wind turbines between the bowling green and the all-weather court.

We are aware that horizontal wind turbines can be noisy. That is why we would propose to install one at the far side of the playing field, much further away from houses than the recommended minimum distance. Vertical axis turbines are very quiet, and can therefore be much nearer to houses without being noticed; in fact they are often attached to buildings. But they are very new on the market and their output needs to be verified.

We will be inviting residents in Mill, Murdoch and Wimborn Close, and the houses on Hempton Road near to the Windmill, to a meeting to discuss the project when we are in a position to make a decision.

The views of environmental bodies such as the RSPB, Thames Valley Environmental Records, and also Oxford Airport have been sought, and no adverse comment has been received.

An exploratory planning application will shortly be submitted to Cherwell DC. In the meantime, if you think the project is a good idea and will benefit Deddington, please write to us at the Windmill. Letters of support from local residents and user groups will greatly help further our case with Cherwell. *Mary Robinson*

#### On the Farm

ere we are again! The tide came back in during the first week of the New Year on the Clifton marshes. Although flooding in the Cherwell flood plain during the

winter period is a normal event, what we experienced in the last 12 months is far from normal and will have far-reaching effects on the way we will be able to manage the river valley land. The meadow land on the farm is part of a nationally important breeding wader bird project.



These birds need wet land, not flooded land, for over-wintering and breeding. Last season saw a record number of Curlew returning to the Clifton valley for the breeding season. We also recorded for the first time in over 30 years Lapwing nesting and despite the early summer flooding 18 chicks were able to fledge. Drumming Snipe (mating display) were seen but no evidence of breeding was found. The problem with excessive and prolonged flooding at this time of the year is that if the returning Curlew and Lapwing find their nesting sites under water they will move on and not come back to breed. Providing and managing the right breeding conditions for these endangered birds has taken a lot of time and effort and it would be very disappointing to see it all washed away.

It is not just climatic change that is making life difficult on the meadows. The flood plain has

## From the Fire Station

**INCIDENTS:** We received 24 call-outs during December & January: 7 were road traffic collisions, 4 car fires, an electrical fire in an office, 2 fires in homes (one in a kitchen & 1 caused by an electric blanket), a chimney fire, one call to a domestic dispute, where one partner set fire to the other's property (in the garden thankfully), several calls to stand by at other stations and one false alarm caused by rainwater in a fire alarm system. Our total



calls for 2007 was 139, this was 40 less than last year; perhaps all our hard work in fire safety education and home fire risk assessment is working.

Attending incidents involving fatalities at anytime is upsetting, however at Christmastime it is always worse, thinking about

the families experiencing the loss. One young man, 21 years old died just 2 days before Christmas in a road traffic collision right outside the Fire Station. On the same day there were many other collisions, entrapments, and another fatality in the area - all due to the adverse weather conditions. We are not out of the season yet, so please take greater care on the roads. Don't take any chances overtaking, and heed the advice given by the agencies on the radio and television.

**CREW:** Congratulations to Pete Taylor for passing his recent Crew Manager's assessment. At

traditionally been grazed by livestock. At Home Farm we run the only resident flock in the parish. Last year was a cataclysmic year for the livestock industry, with almost continuous flooding during the summer grazing season, foot and mouth,

blue tongue, movement restrictions and a ban on exports. This resulted in farm gate livestock values going through the floor to give us an average return of little more than 70p a kg. for a prime fat lamb (what did you pay for lamb in the supermarket ?) The ewe flock has been reduced by 50% and has

become little more than a low-cost low-carbon method of keeping the grass sward at the right height for ground nesting birds. Even the wool clip, a commodity that Deddington and many of the Cotswold towns were founded on, returned us an average of just 24p per ewe, with a shearing cost of £l.12p and the cost of packing and transport on top.

At least the arable section is showing some improvement due to adverse weather conditions around the world. But the price rise we are getting for our crops is not enough to warrant the savage price hike for food we are seeing in the shops. Most of the wheat from last year's harvest was sold before it was cut, for less than £1 a ton, so contrary to the comments I heard recently it's not those wealthy greedy farmers laughing all the way to the bank who are ripping you off.


#### **News from Clifton**

## **GLEANINGS FROM THE PAST**

#### DEDDINGTON 150 YEARS AGO

The following are extracts from the diaries of the Rev. Cotton Risley for the month of January and part of February 1858:-

6th January - We attended a meeting of the Church Restoration Committee, a rather disgraceful meeting took place with several

people indulging in the most abominable insinuations as to doctrine etc. (not founded in truth) against Mr. Burgess (one of the two curates) branding him as a Puseyist and Romanist, Mr. Mitchell stating that he preached up the doctrines of regeneration and transubstantiation. More than half the time, 3 hours and above, was consumed in this manner – instead of

being consumed as it ought to have been in deciding on the adoption or not of Mr. Street the Diocesan Architect's plan for the re-seating and restoration of the Parish Church, which was carried ultimately by a majority of votes of 15 to 13.

# DEDDINGTON WOMEN'S INSTITUTE 1925~2007


'The foundations of national glory are set in the homes of the people' (King George V).

So proclaims one of the homilies preceding the monthly meeting plan of the newly founded

Deddington Women's Institute. Founded at the end of 1925, affiliated to the Oxfordshire Federation of Women's Institutes, it was felt to be the first social meeting place for all women in Deddington, Clifton and Hempton. It has kept its object 'For Home and Country' sacrosanct from those early days to the present. Dedicated members of our present day Institute spent hours researching and compiling a most interesting collection of programmes, snippets of minutes and photographs to fill a historic scrap book, the cover of which boldly displays in green and white the logo of the National Federation. All this work was done in celebration of their 80th anniversary in 2005.

The local Institute's first President

from 1926 to 1929 was Mrs Muriel Jones. She was the daughter of Mary Vane Turner, who won joint second place in a Village History competition set by the Oxfordshire WI Federation. She published her entry *The Story of Deddington* in 1933 and dedicated it to her daughter (a copy is held in our Library). Turning the pages of the massive



- 23rd January I buried poor old Hatten by his own particular desire for many years Landlord of the Kings Arms.
- 25th January The bells rang in honour of the marriage of the Princess Royal with Prince Frederic William of Prussia.

9th February - Poor Finch, the gardener, much as he was last night – Susan and I both visited him – Mr. Turner (the doctor) considered him in a precarious state. (He visited him 11 more times in the next month or so.)

17th February - I heard a case against 6 young fellows from Gt.Barford for being drunk and disorderly – convicted them in 5s. fine each and costs – payable within a week or 21 days in the House of Correction

at Oxford. Mr. H. Churchill our clerk said he never remembered hearing such a noise and row in Deddington for many years. I bailed one boy to appear at the Assizes.

#### Buffy Heywood

Deddington WI scrap book we find a list of 27 serving Presidents from 1926~2007. Miss Loveday set a record 7 years of keeping the chair warm from 1937 to 1944. Not listed there are the Hon Treasurers and Secretaries, who are in the collection of well-preserved yearly programmes.


These were professionally printed on thin cardboard, decorated with logo, date, year and the name of President, Hon Treasurer and Secretary, whose responsibility it was to set up a programme from month to month. The sturdiness of these early programmes suggest that they could be hung at the beginning of each year in the meeting place for all members to peruse. Subjects presented varied then, as now, from serious educational to home-grown entertainment, the crafts, singing and dancing, not forgetting cookery and gardening. Summer meetings, in those early years, were held in a member's garden - if wet, in the British Legion Club on the first Tuesday of the month at 2.30. Traditionally Jerusalem was, and still

is, sung at the opening of each meeting - except for that refreshing incident, carefully minuted in February 1945 when "in the absence of Miss Weaver, resident WI accompanist, Mrs Tucker accompanied a hearty singing of *God Save the King* as she considered the piano unworthy of Jerusalem!" *[to be continued]*
