

George Henry Gardner
Bapt: 06/07/1845 Deddington

From Jackson's Oxford Journals

Saturday 15 May 1858

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John Gardner, of Deddington, was charged by **George Henry Gardner**, a lad, of the same place, with assaulting him on the 28th ult. It appeared from the evidence that the boy's father rents a stable in the same yard where the defendant, who keeps fowls, lives. Defendant having been told that the boy was frequently in the habit of driving and throwing stones at them, did, on the day named, after having as he said, the sanction of his father, give him a "good thrashing;" but it coming out that he beat the boy most unmercifully with a "leather strap" having a "buckle" attached, the Magistrates told him that he ought to have corrected him in a different manner. Defendant was convicted and ordered to pay a fine of 2s 6d, costs 10s 6d and police fees 2s.

Sat 12/05/1866

One months' imprisonment

George Henry Gardner, alias Wilkins, of Deddington, who has many times been convicted at this Bench for various offences, was charged with having on the 2nd inst., on a highway in the parish of Dunstew, been at an improper distress from a horse and cart driven by him whereby he had not the proper control and government of the same. W M Foster-Melliard, Esq., proved the case, but did not take part in the decision. Convicted, and adjudged to pay fine 18s, police fees 2s, costs 10s, or one month; defendant preferred the latter, and was accordingly committed.

Saturday 12 October 1867

Petty Sessions Wotton North Division, Deddington, 04/10/1867

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George Henry Gardner and Samuel Southam, both of Deddington, were charged with being drunk and disorderly on the 21st of September; Gardner was fined 5s and costs 10s, or 7 days. Allowed till next meeting.
