BUS SERVICES

Mr. Douglas Ward, Maunds Farmhouse, Convenor of the Deddington Transport Group, invites comments on the following letter from the National Bus Company (Midland Red):

I would inform you that from Monday, 15th November 1976, the following alterations to services in your area will take place

<u>1</u> Service 491: Due to lack of patronage, and following requests from Bloxham Parish Council, the 2235 hours departure (Mondays to Saturdays) from Banbury to Deddington will no longer operate beyond Adderbury West, but will serve Milton and Bloxham instead. Consequently the 2302 hours journey from Deddington to Banbury will also be withdrawn. This alteration will be for an experimental period only and we would appreciate the views of your group as to whether the 2135 hours, 491 service, should continue to serve Deddington, or whether the 2235 hours journey would offer a better facility for the village.

2. Service 491: The 1705 hours departure from Aynho (Mondays to Fridays) due at Deddington at 1716 will now leave Aynho at 1655 and Deddington at 1706 arriving in Banbury at 1732 hours.

I trust that the above alterations will meet with your approval and I look forward to receiving your comments.

JUBILEE CELEBRATIONS

<u>A Parish meeting</u> was held on 9th November to discuss the possibility of-holding events in Deddington to celebrate the Queen's Jubilee in 1977. Mr. Garrett chaired the meeting (consisting mainly of representatives from local organisations). June 6th and 7th next year are designated Public Holidays, and many parish councils had already started preparations for events and fund raising.

It was unanimously agreed that some form of celebration should be held, and many different suggestions were made. Some organisations had already decided on their contribution: Mrs. Betty Francis, representing the Parish Church, outlined plans for a flower festival and craft exhibition to be held in the Church. Hrs. Mary Rignall said that the Brownies wanted to tidy part of Deddington weekly for a few months; she suggested that each child in the parish should be given a celebration mug or coin. Mr. Drake raised the Parish Council suggestion that the council status should be changed from 'Parish' to 'Town' in 1977 which would be a good time to celebrate the Chairman's new designation as Mayor.

Mr. Webber and Mr. Isaacs, representing Hempton Residents' Association, said that Hempton wished to be included in the parish celebrations and suggested that the amount of money raised by organisations should be matched by a similar amount from the Parish rates.

A Committee was formed to decide on, and organise, events and fund raising. Mr. Garrett was elected as Chairman, and members are: Mrs. Ware, Rev. Palmer, Mr. Hindley (Deddington Society), Mr. Kimble (Playgroup), Mrs. Jones (W.I.), Mr. Duxbury (Primary School), Mrs. Sansome (Parish Council and Newspaper), Mr. Hayward (Parish Council and Football Club,) Mrs. Rignall (Brownies), Mrs. Rampley (Guides and Deddington Ladies), Mrs. Edmonds (Holly Tree Club and Deddington Players). Other organisations would elect their committee members at a later date.

Jubilee Committee Meeting: 17 November

At this first meeting, new members were nominated by their organisations following the Parish meeting: Mr. Tony Welford (Cubs and Scouts), Mr. T. Dunton (Primary School), and Mr. P. Walker (Wesleyan Chapel). Two vice-chairmen were appointed - Mr. W. Caporn representing Hempton and Mr. D. Welford representing Clifton. The Committee elected Mr. E. Kimble as treasurer and Mrs. M. Rampley and Mrs. M. Sansome as joint secretaries.


The main business of the evening was to make an outline plan of events and discuss ways of financing them.


Children up to and including 11 years of age will receive a celebration mug, and possibly the 11-16 years old will receive a celebration coin. Mr. Walker said that the Wesleyan chapel members were in favour of a United Service, and it was provisionally agreed that this should take place on Sunday June 5th. Mr. Hayward suggested that he should approach the Football Club Committee to see whether their annual six-a-side matches and Fete could be arranged to take place on Monday 6th June.

It was agreed that Tuesday 7th June should be the main day for celebrations, perhaps starting with a full peal of bells. At 2 p.m. there would be a carnival with each organisation providing a float, followed by a children's tea party in the market square. Entertainment would be provided by the playgroup, guides and primary school pupils. A dance in the main square would provide the evening celebration with possibly a disco in the Bull Ring. The Holly Tree Club are planning to hold their own Victorian tea party on Wednesday 8th June.

Many suggestions were made about raising funds for these events. Mr. Hindley suggested that the money collected during Coronation year 6 Over to p.22







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
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


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
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



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




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
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
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
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


PARISH COUNCIL MEETING, 24 November 1976

1. Before the official business, Mr. Garrett made this statement: "As this is the last meeting for Mr. Foreman as Clerk, I am sure Councillors will wish to thank him for the way he has carried out his duties as Parish Clerk for the past 4 years, and wish him well for the future". A letter of thanks to Mr. Foreman was also read out from Hempton Residents Association. Mr. C.W.G. Phillips, who had been offered the post on a 6 months' trial period, had now turned down the offer and the post has been advertised in the local press.

2. Wicksteed's report on Playground Equipment: Wicksteeds have inspected again the Castle Grounds site, this time accompanied by Mr. Garrett and Mr. O'Neill. Mr. O'Neill confirmed that the Ocean Wave is safe for some years yet, and that with new rails on the slide and concrete sleeves for the swing supports, this equipment will also be quite sound. Quotations for the work are being sought and repairs carried out as soon as possible.

3. Oxfordshire County Council have been reminded again about the Daedings footpath light, and say the work is in hand. Work is also in progress for new name signs for Clifton.

4. Paddocks lighting: Mr. Welford has re-negotiated with the SEB for 3 lights for the Paddocks. The cost is now down to £396 on the condition that the estimate is accepted within 28 days £149 will have to be paid in advance. This amount is still available in the Parish Council Lighting Account and the balance will be found from next year's budgets when the work is complete.



LOW DEALINGS IN HIGH PLACES

In the Great Deddington Skirmish (NEWS first number) John Somerton and a company of Deddington men took 'direct action' against the unscrupulous Mr. Big, John Aston of Somerton. This month we open an investigation of a case in the Forth Oxfordshire of the 1430s which leads straight from one of the local big shots to corruption at government level.

The stake was the rich manors of Stanton and Darton St. John and the inheritance was disputed by Clemence Lydeyard (nee St. John) and the well-connected Thomas Seyntcler. Both traced descent back to a Roger St. John. The crucial document in the dispute was an 80-year old Chancery record and a critical fact documented in it was the age of Roger St. John in 1354. Seyntcler asserted that his ancestor had then been forty; Clemence and her husband John claimed that the document had originally given the age as twenty-four, but that it had been tampered with by Thomas's lawyer, Banbury-born Robert Danvers. In June 1433 a hearing was held in the Star Chamber. Danvers had to clear his name and, at the same time, clinch his client's case.

Seyntcler had retained Danvers, a rising young attourney in the capital, back in 1431. The lawyer's first move was to go to the Chancery offices in the Tower of London and have a copy made of the vital document. While there he also, claimed the Lydeyards, altered the original. It was indisputably 'newly erased and rewritten in fresh ink.' Danvers was outraged, and he had John Frank, controller of the Chancery Records to back him. Lesser fry followed. Robert Poleyn, assistant chancery clerk testified that when the copy was made the original showed the age of the long dead Roger St, John as forty (i.e. XL) 'in ancient script with nought erased, suspicious or defective'. But, Poleyn now recalled that William Broket, an exchequer clerk, had recent access to the document.

Now Lawyer Danvers had only to establish alink between Broket and Lydeyard. The ground was already prepared. Letters, supposedly from Lydeyard but in fact written by Danvers, had been sent to Broket asking for assurances 'by letter whether the clerks of the Tower might in any way espie you in razing the said record.' Astonishingly Broket not only did write back but in so doing tacitly implicated himself in the falsification. Having got this remarkable correspondence accepted as evidence Danvers now called Broket to the stand. There he freely admitted that he had gone to the Chancery Offices; had asked for the St. John document; had got Robert Poleyn out of the room by asking for additional papers; and then 'being alone, with his finger nail erased the number xl which was in the document when he came and restored and blotted the same number, to make it the more suspect.' Danvers had not only cleared himself, he had also neatly established that the original document, like his copy, supported his client's contention as to Roger St. John's age.

Broket was sacked, the Treasurer being, understandably enough, 'in diverse ways troubled about the said William's examination concerning the erasure.' Why he should have ruined his career for an unknown Oxfordshire gentleman is not made clear. Danvers made no charges of bribery against him. Nor is it clear why John Frank, a senior government official, should have been involved. Least of all is it clear why Lydeyard should have conducted so much mismanaged plotting merely to 'falsify' a document in his enemies' favour In the next number all will, as they say, be revealed.

WHAT ON EARTH IS THE DEDDINGTON HALL MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE?

Sounds pretty dull doesn't it? Bear with me a little longer! For instance, did you know that .. Local Authorities have a legal responsibility to provide facilities for "organised cultural training and recreative activities" for people over school age? But of course you did! Oxfordshire County Council has a flexible approach, unloading as much of the administrative and financial work as it can on to locally appointed Management Committees, leaving them to organise a programme of leisure activities to suit their own neighbourhoods.

In Deddington's case, discussions took place nearly three years ago between the LEA and Deddington Society which at that time was con-cerned with securing the use of a hall for community purposes. As a result, a body with the strange title of Deddington Hall Management Committee emerged. Strange in that the hall in question was the one better known as the Windmill Hall, in the annexe to the Warriner School along Hempton Road.

The DHMC has the following members:

- 2 members nominated by the Governors of the Warriner School (Mr. H. Butler, one vacancy)
- Parish Council representatives (Mr. R. Hayward, Mr. M. O'Neill) 2 members of Deddington Society (Mr. G. Sullivan Chairman DHMC, one vacancy)

The Headmaster of the Warriner School (Mr. D. John)

The Organising Secretary - Adult Education (Mrs. K. Shilvock) Co-opted members: Mrs. J. Cheeseman (Secretary), Mr. A. Mann (Treasurer) Mr. N. Draho (Chairman Deddington Scout Group), Mr. W. Mitchell (Caretaker) Mrs. M. Robinson (Editor "Deddington News")

The Management Committee has three broad functions: to arrange a programme of Further Education activities; to publicise locally a programme of events provided by local organisations and the DHMC; and to supervise the letting arrangements for the hall.

On the first of these, after a hectic start, an Adult Education Centre has been established and now attracts over a hundred students. It is open three evenings a week throughout the school year. A part-time Organising Secretary has been appointed to run the programme and a small annual grant is paid by the LEA. New this year is a day-time pottery class (with ancillary creche facilities) and a scheme whereby local societies have the use of premises whenever the centre is open for classes, in return for an annual affiliation fee of 50p per member. So far three groups have taken advantage of this scheme: The Brownies, Guides and Choral Society.

To fulfil the second responsibility, the Management Committee set up an informal Publications Committee to launch "Deddington News". Local traders have generously supported the venture with advertising and the Parish Council is making a monthly grant of £4 an issue for the first few issues. "Deddington News" will continue after a 6 months' trial period only if it can cover its costs (roughly £16 per issue) from advertising revenue and donations, and if local groups and individuals keep sending in details of their activities, articles, letters and any news of general community interest.

On the third function of letting the hall, progress has, for various reasons, been slow. Hiring charges for school premises have been rising generally and the Management Committee has to cover the rental charged by the LEA when the hall is hired. After protracted negotiations the new rates for hiring the hall will be:

Summer (1st May - 31st August) £2 per hour

Winter (1st September - 30th April) 24 per hour

Any hirer in the winter not requiring heating need pay only the summer charges. Anyone interested in helping at the Centre should contact the Secretary, Jill Cheeseman, phone 609. In particular voluntary helpers are urgently required for the creche on Wednesday mornings, 10 a.m. to 12 noon, and the Management Committee will need a new Treasurer when Tony Mann leaves in the near future. Among other subjects discussed at the meeting were surface water on the road in the gap at Hempton, which increases the already great dangers there; the possibility of allotments in Hempton; and access to the playing field which is rented from Mr. Dodds by the association. The new committee will be pursuing these matters and others, as well as organizing social activities in Hempton during the coming year.

Finally the Jubilee celebrations were discussed at some length and Mr. Caporn was elected as the Hempton representative on the Deddington Parish Jubilee Committee, whose prospective actions the Residents Association members present unanimously supported. C. R. M. Isaac
