Book Club

ast month we met to discuss *Balzac and the Little Chinese Seamstress* by Dai Sijie and
here is our review:

A short, humorous, semi-biographical tale, set during the Cultural Revolution in China. Two boys, guilty of being the sons of doctors and of completing high school, are sent to the remote countryside to learn to live the life of peasants. Ironically this 'reeducation' takes an unexpected turn when they discover a stash of banned western literature, which opens up a new world to them and brings hope for the future. Quite unsentimental, with only brief details of the hardship and hopelessness of the boys' situation, perhaps to emphasise the resilience of youth. Our only criticism would be that it reads like (and is) a translation and it may have lost some emotional impact as a result. Interestingly, the book is set in the same geographical area, Sichuan Province in South West China, as the recent earthguake.





FROM PETER MIDDLETON, CLIFTON

As a resident of Clifton for some 15 years, the heavy truck traffic seems to be getting worse. Drivers should see the 7.5 tonne weight limit signs in Deddington and Aynho but there are no repeater signs until they get to the weight restricted bridge, then it's too late for a 40 ft truck to turn round, and so it takes a chance and crosses the bridge.

When I moved to Clifton my main water shut-off valve was buried in the grass verge approximately

nine inches from the road. Now part of the valve sleeve has been smashed by passing traffic and the road width has gained fifteen inches. Police used to do speed checks but we haven't seen them in the last few years.

I now come to parking in the main street outside St Anne's and the design company in the old church. We all know parking is limited, but cars park half on the path and over-size cars in the protrude over the path. My wife took our baby in a pushchair and our three-year old to play in Welford's Piece but could not get past the cars across the pavement outside St Anne's and the old church, plus they were too close together to get to the road. She had to back up some metres before turning round to walk back home. My three-year old would like to thank the inconsiderate car owners that prevented him from playing in Welford's Piece on the swings and slides.

IT'S ALL GROW

On the Farm

h help, harvest is just a few short weeks away so it's all hands to the pump. For the first time I am unable to do my bit in the preparations for the most important time in the arable farming year. After a few days in the local garage to have a new suspension unit fitted, I find myself under close arrest, confined to barracks and banned from driving for six weeks. But as I am a model patient (!!) and have a brilliant personal nursing team I should be up and running in time to drive the green goddess for the start of harvest.

The crops look very well and the harvest prospects seem promising but after last year's deluge nothing is certain until it's in the barn and even then the roof might leak.

Just before I went into dock all the remaining bee hives that had made it through the winter were split into three nuclei boxes and left to get on with it, the theory being that it would take them a few weeks to draw out the new frames of sheet wax and rebuild the brood chamber, and I would be back in time to put them into full size hives. But this theory did not take into account the tenacity of the female of the species. The new queens had 'drawn out' all the frames before I had got off my Zimmer frame. The assistant bee-keeper had to do the job for me and has had to take another lot of nuclei to stop them from swarming. So after the problems of last autumn and the doom and despair in the national press about the demise of the honey bee, old

mother nature has proved that she is not done yet. We should be back to full strength a lot sooner than we had expected and we shall get a honey crop this year.

Our masters have extended the Blue Tongue protection zone to cover Oxfordshire and we have vaccinated all the ewes and lambs. With any luck by the time this has got past the editor's red pen the ewes will be in the buff, but I expect that, as last year, the shearing will yet again be a welfare exercise as the cost of shearing the ewes will be more than the value of the wood clip.

Although the meadows have been extensively flooded again this summer, our wading bird project under the higher level environmental scheme seems to be working to plan. Red Shank have now returned to join the Curlew, Lapwing and Snipe in this neck of the woods (or should that be floods) but it is too early to judge their breeding success just yet although the signs are looking good. Unfortunately the same cannot be said about this year's moth and butterfly population as they still both seem to be suffering from the effects of last summer. It has been estimated that last year's overwintering larvae are some 70% down on the previous year.

Oh well, enough of this for now. This model patient is off to sneak a malt before the district nurse finds out.

Out of the frying pan and into the car

othing's straightforward in this world; environmental matters are no exception. Just as we thought the solution was to *grow* fuel, we find that in turn causes more problems. It seems

that making ethanol to replace petrol takes more energy than we can usefully get back out of it. More importantly, land turned over to growing crops for diesel or petrol substitutes is needed to supply food in many parts of the world. In some cases, rain forest has been cleared, and no eco-warrior wants that.

What we can usefully do locally is to re-use cooking oil from the catering industry to make fuel for diesel vehicles; otherwise it would be thrown away, sometimes in most damaging ways. (Thames Water spends £7 million cleaning fat out of sewage.) You can fill up at Silver Group in Banbury (Cherwell Business Village, Southam Road or see http://www.thesilvergroup.co.uk/); it's up to 12p

cheaper than fossil diesel and contains around 20% locally grown rape. Cheaper still are Golden Fuels (a not-for-profit workers co-operative at 38 Cowley

Road, Oxford or http://www.goldenfuels.com/); they reckon theirs is made just from waste oil. As this stuff loosens up junk in your tank, you'll need to have your fuel filter checked after a while. Biodiesel can thicken up at low temperatures, so in winter, stick to 50:50 bio: regular diesel to avoid starting problems. However, it is nowhere near a total solution. Even if all used cooking oil

were collected and re-used in this way, it would still only account for around one third of one per cent of current UK diesel consumption.

My car is now successfully running on 100% biodiesel and no it *doesn't* smell of fish'n'chips.

DEDDINGTON 150 YEARS AGO

The following are extracts from the diaries of the Rev. Cotton Risley from the months of July and August 1858 – note on the 15th August the ingenious way of avoiding bank notes being stolen in the post:

12th - 14th July - Went to Oxford to attend the Assizes, 10 prisoners only, one Railway Accident case against the London & North Western, verdict for the Plaintiff - £700 - a Mr Shepherd injured in a collision.

16th July - I walked up to the Church for a minute or two - a great deal of dust was raised by the persons removing the rubbish after the hideous old south gallery had been taken down.

19th July - Edward Clarke came after our footman's place – when we agreed that he should come on trial in August provided his character was good at £30 per annum wages, he finding his own clothes and we a great coat when necessary.

14th August - I sent a tramp to prison for 21 days -

he having been begging about the place for the last week. I also granted 3 or 4 summonses in drunk and disorderly cases.

15th August - I heard from my sister acknowledging the receipt of the 1st halves of two Bank of England notes. The other halves were posted today.

16th August - I visited the Church twice during the day and talked to W Hopcraft about the stopping up of the window over the North porch. The window was finally blocked up on the 20th.

23rd August - Old W Malings of Clifton came to talk over and complain of his son Joseph's conduct - he having joined himself to the Methodists, the reformed ones - and otherwise demeaned himself towards his parents very unlike a son.

Jos Williams's wife came to complain of S Wilkins's wife having beaten her little boy – I offered to grant a summons but she declined having one, as from her own account she could not say her son had not misbehaved himself.

he photograph of the year must be that of the Misses Weaver and Smith, honoured guests at the local party in celebration of the National Federation WI Golden Jubilee in June 1965. Although it is not mentioned in the minutes, 1965 must also have been the 40th anniversary of the

local branch. Dear Miss Lilian Weaver and Miss Smith are both still fondly remembered today by at least two generations of Deddingtonians. They were founder members of Deddington WI way back in 1925 and over many years nurtured the love of music amongst the young and not so young. Miss Weaver became the WI's resident accompanist without scruples about what was demanded of her. Her repertoire ranged from the most solemn to operatic, country folk mu-

sic and dance music. On the occasion of the Jubilee Party, she and Miss Smith were presented with photographs of themselves by the two youngest members of the Institute.

According to the minutes, the 1960s found our members in topping party mood. This is just one sample of highly complex catering.

'At the November monthly meeting the Institute [probably the Committee] was asked if £12 may be drawn from funds to cover the cost of the party. £3 must be allowed for the entertainment leaving £9 for catering. Members were divided up into catering groups as follows: STARTERS - Hempton side of Deddington. MAIN COURSE - Clifton. DESSERTS -Clifton village and COFFEE & WINE - Hempton village. Each group is to be given a limited amount of

> cash. 35/- for starters, £3 for main course, 35/- for desserts and £3 for wine & coffee... If there are 4 to 5 members who would prefer to do games instead of refreshments they may volunteer their services. Members on the Hempton side of Deddington should go to the Holly Tree Club to set out the tables as they are

doing starters...' These arrangements may sound complicated to the lay reader but to a member of any WI they are crystal clear, practical, thrifty and very sociable.

In June 1965 members were delighted to receive a challenge to a rounders match from Bodicote WI. There were volunteers a-plenty putting down their names for the game, but when it came to a few team practices beforehand they found it impossible to get everybody together at the same time. The game had to be cancelled.

Quite a few exciting outings took place in the 1960s but more about that in the next issue of the Deddington News.

Windmill Community Centre

he AGM was held on 15 May, with Richard Broadbent retiring as trustee and being reelected; the committee was also re-elected. The chairman, Mark Tyler, reported that bookings have again increased this year, resulting in very few spare slots being available.

The overall financial position is good. Our reserves have increased over the year to £12,333 from £10,789 in 2006–07, and are in line with the Charity Commission guidelines of 3-9 months' operating costs. The overall position shows a total income of £25,852 and an expenditure of £24,308. Part of this income is revenue from the use of the all weather court, which the Windmill committee manages on behalf of the Parish Council.

Over the year £4,490 has been spent on improvements. These include: a new fire door in the hall; updating the fire safety signs; resurfacing the hall floor; new blinds for the hall windows; a new oven and urn; redecorating and installing a new carpet in the lounge.

Plans for further improvements in the current year include: upgrading the lighting in the hall (just com-



pleted); painting the walls in the hall; and installing a new condensing boiler. This will be more efficient and will reduce gas usage, although rising fuel costs will mean larger bills in the winter. The committee will monitor this closely to ensure that hiring fees cover the increases. The committee is also exploring the installation of a wind turbine for cost savings and environmental reasons.

Joyce Minnear's invaluable contribution for over 20 years as bookings secretary was recognised; and Max Pankhurst, the village steward, is also a great help to the centre in doing small repairs. The cost of his time and materials is invoiced by the PC to the Windmill. We are grateful, as always, to Chris Twomey for examining and agreeing the accounts. User groups are always welcome to the management meetings and the committee would like actively to encourage their input.

With all these improvements to a Centre envied by many communities, and with the new Teen Scene equipment being well used, it is all the more saddening therefore to report yet more vandalism. The fencing at the all-weather court has been cut through yet again – not an easy job as bolt cutters would have been used. New cctv cameras are in place at the Centre and footage will be monitored carefully!

Police

ello, I am PC Phil Morris, Neighbourhood Specialist Officer for your village. I work alongside PC Gerry Doyle and PCSOs Kevin Lewis, Nikki Dale and Lana Smith.

We are currently working with a Neighbourhood Action Group on solving problems identified by the community, namely speeding, burglary and groups of youths.

One of the other problems that we are suffering from at the moment is the theft of lead from buildings. These offences appear to be happening overnight. Lead has become a very valuable commodity recently and it is a national problem, not just in the Banbury area. If you have lead on your property, you can improve security by following these steps.

- 1. Mark your property using gloss paint, smartwater, Redweb, selectamark or a UV pen.
- 2. Restrict access by removing ladders or other climbing aids. Use anti-climb paint that will cover offenders with a sticky non-drying coating, which means the offenders' clothing can be identified by Police. Use it on window ledges, down-pipes or anywhere that can be used as a climbing point. The paint is available in tile red, black, green and grey. It can be used on wood, masonry and metal.
- 3. Use PIR detector lighting where practicable.
- Encourage neighbours overlooking the property to be extra vigilant and report any suspicious activity immediately.

The Allotment

ollowing on my report of last month, I can tell you that all the runner beans left in the ground following the late frost have grown just as strong and in line with some replaced and those left untouched.

As we await the arrival of the summer, our thoughts might well be directed to potato blight. Some few of us at Stonepits suffered the consequences of blight last year.

Potato blight is one of the worst disease problems facing the grower. It can wipe out the plant almost overnight during the growing period and travel from potato to potato in close storage. It is caused by a fungus and can also attack tomatoes. Blight occurs during a time known as the 'Smith Period', when the minimum temperature of 10°C or more and the relative humidity exceeds 90% for at least 11 hours during the first 24 hours and for at least 11 hours during the final 24 hours. However, any period of warm humid weather increases the blight risk. The very first signs of blight are brown freckles on the leaves or sections of leaves with brown patches and a sort of yellowish border spreading from the brown patch. In a severe attack you may find all the potato foliage a rotting mass. Tubers (the actual potato) affected

by blight can be identified by dark patches on the skin. Cutting the potato in half will reveal brownish rot spreading down from the skin. Later the entire potato will give off a pungent smell as it turns soggy.

There is a range of chemical treatments available to farmers but gardeners are limited. The traditional spray was Bordeaux mixture. Not a good idea as it contains copper and is hardly good for your diet although it is organically approved. Inorganic Dithane 945 is good as long as it is applied before blight takes hold. Looking forward to next year you might consider a resistant variety of potato that is less affected by blight.

If you notice a small number of affected leaves with patches you can try removing them and burn wherever possible. Spraying with Bordeaux or Dithane may prevent spread if caught early enough. If you have a more serious infection, then you should remove all the haulm and dispose of it by burning. Removing the foliage prevents the disease getting into the tubers as long as they are well covered with earth. Leave the crop for a couple of weeks to allow the blight spores to die and the potatoes to develop a thicker skin. Do check for signs of blight in stored tubers.

Being an account of those sentenced to be transported from Deddington to the Colonies

In the May 2008 edition we published an introductory article on this subject written by Rob Forsyth. What follows here is one of several further extracts that we will be publishing from time to time. The full article can be seen on DoL at http://www.deddington.org.uk/history/Transportees.pdf. Should you not have a computer then please use the free internet terminals in the library. The Librarian will assist you if you are inexperienced.

3rd March 1819 William Carter (28) and James Pritchett (44) were charged with stealing the carcase of a lamb belonging to George Ibell of Hempton. Thomas Cripps was also involved in this offence but he turned King's Evidence and thereby avoided conviction! Carter and Pritchett were sentenced to death – a common sentence for theft for an offence against the person - but this was commuted to Life Imprisonment. William Carter was subsequently transported to New South Wales. It is believed that James Pritchett was also transported

in due course but no details are held.

12th July 1820 Thomas Gardiner (17) was charged with stealing two £10 and two £1 bank notes, the property of Thomas Austin of Deddington. His sentence of Death was commuted to Transportation for life and sent to the hulk *Justitia*, where he died on 13 October 1820. These prison hulks had originally been used to hold French prisoners of war - Waterloo was only five years before this – and were notorious for the foul conditions in which the prisoners were held, so it is likely that he died of a disease but malnutrition could also equally have been a cause.

7th March 1821 George Godfree (34) was charged with stealing two pairs of stockings belonging to William Nickols of Hempton. His sentence of Death was commuted to Life Imprisonment and Transportation. He was sent to *Justitia* hulk and sailed from Portsmouth on the *Mary* to New South Wales in September.
