CLIFTON NEWS

A 67-year old man, Mr. Dudley Bryan of Banbury, suffered serious spinal injuries in a fall from a lorry which he was unloading at a farm in Clifton. He was taken to the Intensive Care Unit at the Horton General Hospital and was later transferred by helicopter to Lodgemoor Hospital, Sheffield, for specialist treatment.

The fine weather has meant that the harvest has been earlier than usual, but the drought has caused the corn to be light in the ear.

The Church: as a result of the sale of the Church, the organ was given to Barford St. Michael, the plate to Zaire Christians, and the bell to the chapel at Grendon Underwood prison. The stained glass went to the Stained Glass Fuseum in London and the font to Woodstock Museum. The floor tiles are now in a private house in Juniper Hill. The Church was sold to Dennis Allen of Middle Aston and Robert Prior of Croughton who used to work in Hatton Garden, and are manufacturing Victorianstyle bracelets, mostly in silver, but also in a smaller quantity in gold, with the help of Dennis' wife Gillian and Jane Hemsley. Their work is entirely for wholesale, and in time they hope to expand into other lines. They have scrupulously retained the external appearance of the Church, and intend to plant shrubs and flowers in front of the building to make it an attractive part of the village.

Mr. Donald Welford has raised with the Parish Council the placing of village nameboards at either end of the village. Their want has long been felt but previous efforts to obtain them have been unsuccessful and it is to be hoped that Mr. Welford will be able to convince the authorities.

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

THE GREAT DEDDINGTON SKIRMISH

Research for my new book, "England in the Age of Caxton", has led me down some brackish backwaters of our local history. During the 15th century 'law and order' in England was by no means what it might have been. The occasional battles known as 'The Wars of the Roses' caused far less disturbance than the strong-arm activities of a hundred local " Mr.Bigs". Most places had at least one local war - Deddington's was against John Aston of Somerton.

Fill

Aston was a prosperous gentleman thanks largely, it appears, to active lawyers backed up by active bully boys. Early in 1430 a group of exasperated neighbours, led by John Somerton of Deddington, also 'gentilman', hit back. Somerton's party was recruited largely from his fellow townsmen -Richard Baynard, carpenter; Thomas Schlatter, a slater; Richard Wodeford, tailor; John Cook, bell maker; Richard Smyth, blacksmith; John Smyth, another carpenter; and William Spicer, husbandman. 'Arrayed in manner of war', they proceeded to break 'the close and houses of the said John Aston at Somerton, assaulted him and took away goods to the value of £20, and beat and wounded his servants and so threatened them that they dared not go about his business for fear of death and mayhem.' The Aston nuisance was abated for the time being but, in March that year, he brought a summons against the 'malefactors'.

One reputation at least survived the trial. Fifteen years later the name of John Somerton heads the list of Deddington men who set up the Holy Trinity Guild which provided the town with its first school. The medieval syllabus did not include a course in Civics. Even if it had, one doubts whether John Somerton, gentleman, would have been called in to advise.

Service Constants

The records contain quite a lot of anecdotal material on Deddington and the region round about during the middle ages. The next issue of the News Letter will carry a report of low dealings in high places during the 1450s. It exposes the doubtful business ethics of a Banbury man at law, the unprincipled self interest of a Barford gentleman and the corruption of a Westminster clerk, brought to light by some shrewd detective work at Westminster and in Oxfordshire.

Geoffrey Hindley, President of the Deddington Society, has lived in Deddington since 1966 as a writer and editor. He has written numerous books on music and history, such as <u>Castles of Europe, The Medieval Establishment, Medieval</u> <u>Warfare, The Shaping of Europe and, most recently, a</u> <u>Biography of Saladin. He has lectured in music appreciation</u> at Epwell and Adderbury and starts a new course at Hook Norton this term. In 1974 he gave a course of lectures on Deddington Local History.

AN OPEN LETTER TO THE RESIDENTS OF DEDDINGTON:

Rubbish: the subject has been raised time and time again, wheels have been set in motion and the job actually undertaken but, as always, all good intentions have failed to come to fruition. Why is it that we have been unable to find the answer to the problem? No doubt someone has an idea that will work once and for all, or have we all become too complacent and accepted the situation for what it is?

We all play our part in some small way. Blame can be offloaded so easily - that 'invisible body' leaving a trail of destruction in his wake. Deddington could and should be a lovely village we have so much to be proud of and yet we allow the filth to spread like the plague. We really should be ashamed of ourselves letting our village go downhill at such a rapid pace.

Wake up Deddington and take a long, hard look at the situation. There is a solution somewhere.
