ANTI SLAVERY MEETING. - A numerous and highly respectable meeting was held on Thursday last at the Assembly Rooms, for the purpose of considering the propriety of petitioning Parliament on the subject of the immediate amelioration and gradual abolition of West Indian Slavery.

The Rev. Edw. Dewdney, curate of Deddington, Oxon, then rose and delivered a speech replete with powerful argument, in which he distinctly proved the practice of Slavery to be both impolitic and sinful, at once at variance with our duty to God and man; and such was the conviction he produced on the minds of his hearers of the national disgrace of Colonial Slavery, that he was frequently interrupted by unanimous bursts of applause, and strong expressions of sympathy for the sufferings of our fellow creatures. The parties are respectable inhabitants of Deddington, in this county; and, it appeared, that after quarrelling at a public-house the defendant assaulted the plaintiff by pulling his nose. - The Jury returned a verdict - Damages 20s.

CHURCHILL v. DEAN.

This was a writ of inquiry, to assess damages for an assault committed by the defendant on the person of the plaintiff. It appeared from the evidence that the plaintiff and the defendant reside at Deddington, in this county, and that while drinking at a public-house, an altercation ensued between them respecting the loan of a waggon, and that after wrangling for about an hour, the plaintiff made some observations which were unpleasant to the feelings of the defendant, who threatened to pull his nose if he repeated

them. The plaintiff, however, not having the fear of the defendant's finger and thumb before his eyes, repeated the offensive expressions, and the defendant immediately pulled his nose. The Plaintiff then applied to an apothecary, who recommended him to keep his bed for a day or two, attended him for some time every day, and afterwards every other day, until his nose assumed its former appearance, and charged two guineas for his trouble and medicine. It also came out in evidence, that the plaintiff's brother-in-law was an attorney, and was then conducting the proceedings against the defendant. Mr. Chilton addressed the jury for the defendant, in a speech replete with humour, and characterized the affair as a mere drunken squabble, which would not have occupied the jury's attention that day, had not the plaintiff's brother-in-law been an attorney, and with much sarcastic irony and ridicule, commented on the plaintiff's keeping his bed, and having so much medical attention, merely in consequence of his having his nose a little pulled. He then recommended the plaintiff for the future either to keep a civil tongue in his head, or to carry a piece of soap in his pocket, to soap his nose with, and called upon the jury to give only a farthing damages. The jury returned a verdict, - *Damages Twenty Shillings.*

SHIP BRUTUS.—AWFUL MORTALITY.

With feelings of the deepest sorrow, we have to convey to our readers intelligence of the most distressing nature, which will carry dismay to many, and regret to all, and further arrest the public mind to the consideration of a disease which is so fearful and desolating in its progress. After devastating the land, it has invaded the deep; and the sum of human suffering which we this day announce, shows how fell and destructive has been its short career on the waters.

The ship BRUTUS, Captain Neilson, left the Mersey on the 18th May for Quebec, with three hundred and thirty passengers, principally composed of persons from the agricultural districts, anxious to find in the Canadas profitable returns for their labour and capital. The crew was efficient, the captain able and attentive. The services of a surgeon and clergyman were also engaged, and every thing promised a favourable and pleasant voyage. The weather was calm and beautiful; and the first six days were spent without regret of the past, but in pleasing anticipation of the future. On Friday the 25th May, there was illness on board, but it created no alarm. On Sunday, the 27th, the crew and passengers were summoned to prayers, and the Reverend gentleman preached from 1 Cor.—"*Now abideth faith, hope, and charity.*" He was listened to with the most marked attention, and the day closed in serenity and peace. The sun on the following morning rose unclouded,—it shone on health,—it set on dismay and death! A man, in the vigour and prime of life, was suddenly seized with illness; and, soon the principal symptoms of malignant *Cholera* manifested themselves. The surgeon, aware of the necessity of prompt and vigorous exertion, at once applied the necessary remedies, and his patient recovered. His next case was not so fortunate; and soon the news of a woman's death thrilled through the ship with awful solemnity. A child of a few days old soon followed; and the next day, Tuesday, death made a fearful advance. Alarm then arrived at its height, and each passenger began to view his fellow with looks of fearful apprehension. Sympathy became absorbed in the fear of general danger, and many sought protection by keeping aloof from those parts of the ship in which the sufferers lay. This was found of no avail; and when, on the following Sunday, the awful splash told of thirteen bodies being committed to the deep! then, indeed,

"Shrunk the timid, and stood still the brave!"

The *Brave!* few, few, in truth they were! despair seemed to sit on every visage, the stillness of the grave was around, and the doctor's melancholy movements were viewed with almost the listless gaze of inanition. On Monday the deaths swelled in

their amount, and the captain finding himself deprived of the services of his second mate, carpenter, and steward, thought it in accordance with his duty to bear up for Cork, but finding that impossible, he altered his course for Liverpool, and arrived yesterday morning, and was immediately reported. The deaths amounted to seventy nine, and two having died after coming into port, leaves the amount of mortality EIGHTY-ONE INDIVIDUALS since the disease broke out.

The Board of Health had all the particulars laid before them, and the Newcastle lazaretto ship in the Slyne was ordered for the accommodation of the remaining passengers, and the necessary supply of provisions sent on board. The number of cases were in all 117, and the recoveries 20, a proof that the medical gentleman, (one) efficiently discharged his duty. We have obtained the names and former residences of the deceased, which we deem it our duty to publish.

There is not so much waste of labour, they are not so much put to work of no use to any body ? - No; I was passing lately through the town of Deddington, in Oxfordshire, and I saw a number of men, about twenty, standing in the market-place; I asked the reason of that; they said they had nothing to do, and they made them stand there the whole day, to show the overseers they were not employed.

PUBLIC MEETING AT BANBURY.

In Aid of the Labourers' Friend Society.

It was stated in our last that a Meeting was to be held on Friday, the 6th inst. in aid of the above Institution. The Meeting was held in the Girls' National School-room, and the chair was taken, on the motion of Mr. Golby, by the Rev. J.R. Rushton, curate. The company was numerous, and highly respectable. Many ladies were present, also several clergymen and others from the surrounding district, and most of the opulent and benevolent inhabitants of the town itself.

The Rev. R. Greaves, Vicar of Deddington, moved the first resolution:- "That this Meeting cordially approves of the objects of the Labourers' Friend Society, established in London, for the purpose of advocating the letting of portions of land to labourers, and printing and disseminating facts and illustrations, shewing the benefits arising therefrom." He observed, that when called upon to assist in the object of the present Meeting, he had no hesitation; for he was happy to say the subject was not new to him; and he was prepared, from what had fallen under his own view, to speak as to its beneficial tendency. Three attempts had been made under his own eye, and they had all succeeded.

In the first place, three acres of land, under his own care, had been let out to the poor for four years, and with the most beneficial consequences. - The success which had attended this first experiment in his own parish, had led the poor themselves to apply for eight acres of land, which had been

bequeathed for charitable purposes, and they now wished to farm it. It had formerly been let to a farmer, and the annual rent had been laid out in the purchase of coals. The feoffees had been induced to grant the request of the applicants, taking care, indeed, that every one who had a share of the land should pay an annual rent for the same, which rent being higher than that formerly paid by the farmer, a double advantage had been [raised] by the transfer, since a larger quantity of coals could be purchased.

The expectation which had been formed from this measure, had also been answered with success. The land was let out to thirty-five families, and those who had the management of the concern had not failed to receive every halfpenny of rent from those to whom it was now entrusted. The parish feoffees had been induced, last year, to procure more land for the use of the poor; a piece of eight acres, which might be seen from the Banbury road, near the top of Deddington hill, and which was divided into ninety allotments.

So far as this most recent experiment had been tried, the result had entirely corresponded with their wishes. He should say little more, after this statement of facts, with reference to the principles under which the operation had been conducted. It was our duty to do good to all men, and we were most of all bound to do good to those who laboured in our fields, and by whose exertions we were enabled to eat the bread of this life. - If the facts adduced were such as, in their result, must be warmly approved, he felt also that the object of the Society would be warmly supported.

First Report of D.O.P. Okeden, Esq.

ON THE

WESTERN PART OF OXFORDSHIRE,

*Copied from the Appendix to the Reports on the Poor Laws
just laid before Parliament.*

At Deddington, during the seven winter months, about 60 men apply every morning to the Overseer for work or pay. He ranges them under a shed in a yard. If a farmer, or any one else wants a man, he sends to the yard for one, and pays half a day's wages; the rest is paid by the parish. At the close of the day the unemployed are paid the wages of the day, minus two-pence. I could multiply instances of this application of the scale to the superfluous labourers, but to do so would only waste your time.

Emigration has taken place from a few parishes. The largest number went about six years ago from the parish of Hook-Norton; it consisted of about 175 persons, reckoning the men, women, and children: it answered well. About five returned; the rest remain, and write word that they are quite contented.

Deddington sent to North America about 50 last year, but their fate was melancholy, and damped the spirit of emigration in the district. They formed a part of the crew of the *Brutus*, of Liverpool, the major part of whom died of cholera. A few have been sent as emigrants from different parishes at the expense of individuals who possess the parish; and upon the whole, there appears no disinclination to the emigration system.

CROWN COURT.

James Simons, 28, charged with having maliciously set fire to and burnt a barn, with 20 quarters of wheat therein, the property of John Davis, of Hempton.

John Davis, overseer of Hempton sworn - "I know the prisoner at the bar; he worked for me as a labourer. I have a barn about 20 yards from my house, in which there was about 24 quarters of wheat and some implements on the 10th of May last, and a waggon outside the barn with a cock of straw. I was awoke on the morning of the 11th of May with an alarm of "fire!" and I saw the barn in flames, issuing from a corner of it where the thatch was nearest the ground. I went to the spot, and there was no one else at the barn when I first got there; afterwards saw the prisoner there; he was standing with his hands in his pockets. Persons came from all parts and assisted in putting out the fire; there were many dissatisfied persons at Deddington, for there had been an arrangement respecting the labouring classes. A reward of £100 was afterwards offered for the apprehension of the person who set the premises on fire.

Joseph Nicholls - "I am a near neighbour of the prisoner. I saw the prisoner at the fire about 4 o'clock; I had been there two hours before; he was standing still. I was at my pigstye the Thursday preceding the fire, when the prisoner said to me 'Joe, will you go and help me set Davis's barn on fire?' I said, 'No; if I am to die I will die a different way, and wont die with a rope round my neck'. I left him and went to my father. - I saw the prisoner on the Saturday morning after, when I came from the fire; he came into my house; William Dale and others where *[sic]* there; the prisoner

said, 'Joe, you have no call to look so sly; it was Will Dale and you who set the place on fire!' I said, 'if there was never a place set on fire until I set it on fire there would never be one!' I did not tell any of this conversation to Mr. Davis before the fire. I was examined before the Magistrates three times, having been taken up myself. Did not tell the Magistrates what had passed between prisoner and myself until I was in custody accused of setting the premises on fire. I was taken up by a Bow-street officer.

William Dale corroborated the account given by the last witness respecting the conversation at his house on the Saturday morning. He said he made no answer to the prisoner when he said "Nicholls and he (meaning witness) did it." He did not tell the Magistrates; it was some time after the prisoner was committed that he mentioned it.

John Sollis - "The prisoner told me on the Thursday evening before the fire that he had said to the deputy overseer he understood he was a *goal taker*, and he (the prisoner) was the first he would have to take to gaol. The prisoner said to him that Mr. Davis was the best master in the parish until Mr. Fowler came and spoiled him; now he was become the worst, and would have something happen before long. Prisoner said the ashes had grown cold that fell from the other fire, and it wanted another good fire to stir them up again. On the Friday evening the prisoner said they were going to take off the head money next morning. Mr. Loveden had a barn burnt down before this. I saw the prisoner after the fire was out; he said the ashes were got cold, and that there had been another smartish fire, which would stir them up again; he would be bound to say that they would not take the head money off that morning; he said Joe Loveden and young Field had been watching about after him; he did not know what they wanted; he had a good mind to ask them, and he dare say they would take him up.

John Kilby, assistant overseer of Deddington, said he had heard the prisoner say that he should like to see another good fire; he said it several times. After the fire at Mr. Loveden's the wages of the labourers were raised, which pleased them much; the pay was afterwards lowered. I understood the prisoner to say another good fire would do good.

Several other witnesses were called, but there was nothing material in their evidence.

Mr. Baron Alderson summed up the case to the Jury. He told them that this was a case of circumstantial evidence, which required the strict attention of the Jury, for if it led to the only conclusion of the prisoner's guilt, they were

bound to find him guilty; but if it were such as might warrant any other solution, such testimony was very fallacious, and they ought not to act upon it so as to convict the prisoner; that this was a case of suspicion undoubtedly, but they were to say whether it produced a cogent and irresistible conviction in their minds of his guilt.

The Jury deliberated a few minutes, and then *acquitted* the prisoner.

George French, 23, Henry Cowley, 19, William Gibbs, 24, James Wilkins, 36, Samuel Wilkins, 30, Frederick Pain, 35, Samuel Bennett, 22, Jas. Jarrett, 22, and Wm. Callow, 23, were charged with having, together with several other persons, riotously and unlawfully assembled, and broken and injured the windows and other property of Mr. Thomas Fardon, overseer of Deddington, with intent to obtain money by intimidation, and assaulting and beating several peaceable inhabitants. - The prisoners are paupers of Deddington; the Vestry there had determined to take 1s. per week off their allowance, and when the paupers went for their money they first heard of the reduction, and refused to take the money. An uproar was made in the Town Hall, and it was with great difficulty the Overseers escaped from the Hall to their own houses; a large mob were collected, consisting of about 150 persons, much noise was made, and numerous stones were thrown at the Overseer's house and windows, and one of the Overseers was struck on the head with a stone. It appeared that the men had been encouraged in this riotous conduct by a person of the name of Griffith, who acts as an attorney at Deddington. The riot lasted from 7 o'clock in the evening until between 2 and 3 on the following morning. There was a difference in the prisoners, some of them having encouraged the others by words and violent conduct. - The Jury returned a verdict of "Guilty" against all the prisoners. The Learned Judge, in sentencing them, said that a great deal of the confusion arose from the improper manner in which the Parish Officers acted in paying the idle and industrious at the same rate. - Gibbs, Pain, and Jarrett to be imprisoned six months, and kept to hard labour; the others three months.

OXFORDSHIRE ASSIZES.

- *John Wheeler, Robt. Cowley, and Henry Cowley*, charged with stealing eight sheep, the property of Henry Dean, sen. and one sheep, the property of Henry Dean, jun.; and *John Cowley*, charged with receiving the same knowing it to have been stolen.

There was a meeting of the Magistrates at Deddington, and the prosecutor attended as Overseer of Deddington; the prisoners applied for relief and was refused. The next morning the prosecutor's sons went into the field where the sheep were, and found eight tegs dead and one not quite dead; they were all stuck by the jaw; part of the legs of one of the sheep was taken away; it was not cut in the proper place; and one was partly skinned. There were marks of footsteps very plain and deep where the sheep had been caught. The constable took the shoes off the prisoners, Wheeler and Robt. Cowley; they were very bloody; this was on the 8th of Feb.; their clothes were bloody. The prosecutor's son, the constable, and others, went to the field with the prisoners' shoes, and measured the prints of the footsteps with compasses, and the shoes, and they fitted exactly; there were also marks of a man kneeling in cord breeches; Wheeler's exactly fitted. On Tuesday evening the prosecutor went to John Cowley's house; he and his wife were at home; Cowley's wife was up stairs, and the constable and John Dean followed her; John Cowley followed after; the constable said we have got the mutton, and John Cowley said it was a done job, or words to that effect. It was part of a leg of mutton; there was wool on it; it was boiled, and being compared with the other part of the shearhog sheep, it exactly fitted. The prisoner Wheeler was handing a man of the name of Cox, and Robert Cowley was second to a man named French, at a fight which took place on the Saturday night. French bled much. The prisoner, John Cowley, made no objection to their searching the house. Robert Cowley is the son of John Cowley, and lives with him. On the other shoes there were five small nails on the front of the toe; the shoes were not pairs; both were left shoes, and exactly corresponded with the footsteps traced in the lane. John Cowley's wife went into his bed room; the constable followed, and found the mutton under some dirty clothes. Robt. Cowley's gaiters were

very bloody, and there was a small quantity of wool on them. Wheeler and R. Cowley were seen together between 10 and 11 at night, at John Cowley's house; and R. Cowley was spoken to by the watchman about 3 o'clock.

All guilty. - John Wheeler and Robert Cowley to be transported for life; J. Cowley, six months' imprisonment. - The bill was ignored against Henry Cowley.

William Painton was indicted for stealing a quantity of hay, the property of Mr. Churchill, of Deddington. The hay was tracked from the prosecutor's premises along the road to the prisoner's loft, and being of a peculiar nature was easily identified. - Six calendar months' imprisonment and hard labour.

William Merry, a publican at Clifton, was formerly a man of considerable property, was indicted for receiving several loaves and some butter, the property of John Gardner, well knowing the same to have been stolen. There had been a match at pigeon shooting at Deddington, and two of the prisoner's sons, with two young men of the name of Coles, went there; being in liquor, on their return home, they set their dogs at some sheep belonging to the prosecutor. The dog tore one of them, and the prosecutor caught it and took it to his house. On the next morning the four young men were taken before Mr. Lechmere, and were fined. They again that day got in liquor, and having been told that their dog was at the prosecutor's house, they swore they would have it. It was then about 11 o'clock at night; and they went to the prosecutor and called him up, and said they would have their dog. He said it was hung, and desired them to go away; and on their refusing, presented his gun, and nicked it three times. Not finding their dog they broke open the dairy, threw the churn in the yard, and afterwards went away. The prosecutor did not perceive they took any thing with them, but the next morning he missed six loaves and 13 lbs. of butter; he immediately got a search warrant, and searched the prisoner's house and premises, and in the kiln house they found the same. The prisoner had the key in his pocket, and one of the witnesses stated that whilst they were searching the malt house he saw the prisoner come out of the kiln house, where the goods were afterwards found. - In his defence the prisoner called several witnesses, who proved that they had been in the kiln house unknown to the prisoner, as the window shutters might be opened from the outside. There were many witnesses to his character, but only six or seven were examined, who gave him a most unexceptionable character for honesty, and having been known to many of them upwards of forty years.- The prisoner was acquitted.

OXFORD CIRCUIT.

OXFORD, MONDAY.

John Wheeler, aged 25, and *Robert Cowley*, aged 22, were charged with killing nine sheep, with intent to steal a part of one of them, and *John Cowley*, aged 46, was charged with receiving nine pounds weight of the stolen mutton.

Mr. MACLEAN conducted the prosecution.

Mr. Thomas Dean said — I live at Deddington. On the 7th of February there was a Magistrates' meeting. I am the acting-overseer for my father. The prisoners applied for relief and were refused. They went away, and did not appear dissatisfied. On the next morning, which was a Sunday, I went to the place where my father's sheep are kept, and found eight of them dead, and one more not quite dead. A leg of the mutton had been taken from one of the sheep which had been killed.

Mr. Henry Dean said — I am the brother of the last witness. I am a butcher at Deddington. I saw the nine sheep which had been killed, the leg of one of them was cut off at the round bone, which is not a butcher-like way of cutting. I saw the prisoners Wheeler and Robert Cowley taken into custody. They had blood on their clothes and shoes. Their shoes were delivered to Mr. Fardon, the watchmaker.

Mr. Thomas Fardon said — The shoes of two of the prisoners were delivered to me to measure with some foot-prints which were in the field where the sheep were killed. I measured the length of the shoes with compasses, and the breadth with calipers, and the distance of the nails of the shoes from each other with a spring divider. The shoes corresponded in every particular with the footprints. I saw the constable take the cord breeches off the prisoner Wheeler. The knee of the breeches had dirt upon it, and I had observed in the field a mark of a person so dressed having knelt down. I measured the size of the cords with the divider, and marked them on a piece of paper. I then went into the field and measured the marks of the cords in the impression, and they corresponded exactly.

John Hartley said — I am the constable of Deddington. I went to the house of John Cowley; his wife showed me up stairs. I found a part of a leg of mutton in a box in his room under some dirty clothes. The mutton had been boiled, but I saw the bone compared with that from which it had been cut on the sheep, and they corresponded. The prisoner, John Cowley,

came up stairs just as I had found the mutton, and he said, "It is a done job."

The prisoners all asserted their innocence. - Verdict, *Guilty*.

Mr. Justice COLERIDGE sentenced the prisoners Wheeler and Robert Cowley to be transported for life, and the prisoner John Cowley to be imprisoned for six months.

Beesley, of Banbury, for the excellent Rules he had prepared for the government of the Society, which were unanimously and cordially adopted; and for other valuable information which he had furnished them respecting the government of the Banbury Mendicity Society. The mode by which the operations of this Society are designed to become effectual towards removing the present evils of Mendicity, is by inducing a general determination on the part of the inhabitants of Deddington and the neighbouring villages never to give money to persons applying at their doors for charity, but to give them tickets on this Society; where every case will be scrutinized, and relief granted or refused, according to the circumstances of the case, by a person to be appointed for that purpose, and acting under the directions of the different members of the Committee. If this plan should meet with extensive support from the public, the truly distressed will never fail of receiving necessary assistance, while the trading beggar will find that the utmost he can do by a whole day's begging will be to obtain a number of tickets, which will only secure him the same relief that he would get from a single one: he will also be subjected to the chance of being sent to the tread-mill; and indeed to the certainty of it, if found possessed of more than one ticket, or begging after relief has been extended to him. The begging imposter thus obtaining one day's food and one night's lodging, and no more, will be obliged to quit Deddington and the neighbourhood, and probably without a wish ever to return to it: while at the same time his report will serve to deter others of his class from coming into so unprofitable a vicinity. It is hoped the district will thus in a great measure be relieved from the pest of trading beggars, comprising characters of the lowest and worst description; while charitable persons will be satisfied in seeing succour given to all those whom religion,

humanity, or policy, would alike enjoin them to assist. It is also earnestly recommended that those travellers who offer matches and other trifling articles for sale should not be encouraged; the real object of such persons in carrying them, being the excuse they thereby obtain for wandering and begging.

NISI PRIUS COURT. - (Before Mr. Baron Bolland.)

HARRIS v. STUART, GORDEN & OTHERS. - (Special Jury.) - This action was brought by the plaintiff, a farmer, residing in the township of Clifton, in the parish of Deddington, to recover from the four defendants, two of whom are magistrates in this county, and the other two overseers of the parish of Deddington, the value of 13 head of cattle, which had been sold under a warrant of distress. It appeared from the statement of Counsel, and from the evidence, that the parish of Deddington contained three townships, Deddington, Clifton, and Hempton. For all purposes, except with regard to the Church and Poor Rates, those townships had for many years been treated as separate districts, each of them having its own Constable, Surveyor of Highways, and Assessor, and each paying separately to the county rate. Before the passing of the New Poor Law Amendment Act there had been two Overseers appointed for each township, and for each a separate assessment was made, and the accounts of the Overseers were separately audited and allowed. In June 1835, the Poor Law Commissioners, acting under the powers of the Act of Parliament then recently passed, formed a Union called the Woodstock Union, which included the parish of Deddington, and directions were given by the Poor Law Commissioners in which they treated each of the three townships as a separate district, each paying its own proportion of the money directed to be raised. There was a workhouse in the township of Deddington, which had been used in common by all the three townships, and for that reason a custom had for some time prevailed for the Overseers of Clifton and Hempton to pay over to the Overseers of Deddington the surplus of the rates they collected. When the Poor Law Amendment Act came into operation the Workhouse no longer continued to be the Workhouse of the whole parish, and the inhabitants of the township of Deddington had the liberty of disposing of it as they would for their own benefit. At that time the plaintiff and Mr. Gardiner, who were the Overseers of the township of Clifton, had a balance of about 94*l.* in their hands, which the Overseers of Deddington required them to pay over to them as

they had done previously; but as the Workhouse in Deddington was no longer common to all the three townships, they considered themselves bound, by the provisions of the new Act of Parliament, to pay over the balance in their hands to their successors in office. The Overseers of Deddington, not being satisfied with this course, summoned Mr. Harris and Mr. Gardiner before the Magistrates at their Petty Sessions, but the case was not then decided. About two months afterwards, however, they made another application to the Magistrates, the result of which was that a warrant was granted empowering the Overseers of Deddington to distrain upon the property of Mr. Harris for the balance in his hands, amounting to 94*l.* it being intimated to him that the warrant would not be put in force if he would pay over the balance. This, however, he declined to do, upon which the cattle in question were seized and sold for a sum of 124*l.* 10*s.* out of which, after deducting the 94*l.* and the expences, they paid Mr. Harris the balance amounting to 9*l.* 7*s.* 11½*d.* - Mr. Baron Bolland, in his charge to the Jury, distinctly stated that the money ought to have been paid over by the plaintiff without waiting for a warrant, and that no blame whatever could attach to the Magistrates for granting it; but inasmuch as it did not contain certain necessary recitals, it could not be sustained. - Several points of law were raised in the course of the trial, which, after occupying several hours, terminated in Mr. Baron Bolland directing the Jury to find a verdict for the plaintiff for the sum claimed. - Mr. Serjeant Talfourd and Mr. Cooper conducted the plaintiff's case, and Mr. Serjeant Ludlow, Mr. Maclean, and Mr. Cripps, appeared for the defendants.

Mr. J. in the course of the very able address which he delivered, spoke of the great propriety of holding meetings in places dedicated to the service of God, for the purpose of disseminating the Gospel of Christ, as there were many poor persons, he said, who did not consider themselves privileged to enter some rooms where such meetings were held; but he thanked God that the doors of the Church were opened to all, and every one in this favoured land knew that he should be welcomed there. At the conclusion of Mr. J.'s speech the meeting separated, and the sum of 4l. 14s. 3d. was collected.

On Monday last an inquest was held at Deddington, before R.D. Gough, Esq. on view of the *disinterred* body of Sarah Ayres, a girl of seven years old, whose death was occasioned by her clothes catching fire. When the cost of disinterment has been defrayed, it will perhaps be clear to certain parishes, that burying a body without notice to the proper officer is not real economy. This is the second instance, in the space of three weeks, of the same coroner ordering the body of a pauper to be dug up again.

William Coles, 23, Earnest Merry, 38, was [sic] charged with burglariously breaking open the dwelling house of John Gardiner, of Deddington, and feloniously stealing 13 lbs. of butter and other articles, the property of John Gardiner.

John Gardiner examined by Mr. Cooper - I reside at Clifton, in the parish of Deddington; I remember the night of the 14th of January, 1836; I was alarmed by the dogs barking; it was a very light night; I could distinguish the two prisoners and two others; they were making a great noise by pelting at the dogs, and throwing at the windows; they said, give us the dog, and there shall be nothing the matter; I said the dog was hanged by order of the magistrates; I did not know who the dog belonged to, it was in the habit of following them. I said if they did not go away I would shoot them; I fetched my gun and pulled the trigger twice; I thought it was loaded; I saw the prisoners break the dairy open; found the bread and butter in their father's house, in the kiln house.

Cross examined by Mr. Serjeant Ludlow - The prisoners were not present when the house was searched, I had a sheep worried by a dog that belonged to one the prisoners; he was fined by the Magistrates, and the dog hanged by their order. The prisoners called out to me "let us have the dog, and there shall be nothing the matter;" they opened the gate and let my cattle out and broke my windows, by force of arms.

Sarah East, servant to the prosecutor, upon being questioned said she could recollect nothing about it; her head was so bad. Mrs. Gardner could swear the Bread was theirs, and the butter likewise; but from its being so long ago, she had forgot all about it.

Mr. Serjeant Ludlow offered no defence - The learned judge summed up, and dwelt particularly upon the improbability that the prisoners, who were well known to the prosecutor, should go in that open manner to commit a burglary.

The jury, after a short consultation, returned a verdict of *Not Guilty*.

There can be no question that the Editor of the *Herald* intends this as a slap at the over-zeal, as he supposes, of Independent Dissenters in favour of Popery, and I would send him a correct statement of the matter, did I not know that he is less fond of truth than of a highly-seasoned paragraph against Dissenters. For the benefit of the public, however, and that they may not be gulled by such bold and false assertions, I will state exactly the fact. The building alluded to, and which was at one time as described, an Independent Chapel, is at present held for a lease of seven years the Rev. W.C. Risley, Vicar of Deddington, and has been fitted up by him as a School Room, though neither master, nor mistress, nor children have as yet enjoyed it. There are some, indeed, who shrewdly opine, that it has been so leased and fitted up, as the most effectual mode of preventing its being again used as a Meeting House. Let the Rev. Editor of the *Herald* then, who is a staunch Churchman and no Papist, enquire of the Vicar of Deddington by whose zeal it was that the building he leases was so employed. It surely never could have been his own, for so earnest was he on the other side, that the Vicarage House (tell it not in Gath) which should be the residence of peace and unanimity, was the head quarters, in plain English, the Committee Room of one of the Tory Candidates - Lord Norreys.

Sir, - As it appears that no less than twenty-nine clergymen of the Church of England could assemble on the day of the Election, at Deddington, for the purpose of opposing Mr. Stonor, and preventing the spread of Popery, I hope you will allow me, through the medium of your Paper, to invite those gentlemen there again on another occasion, which will enable them to promote the same object in a manner perfectly in accordance with their profession. Election at Deddington, for he was there heard to say, that
"he would sooner vote for the Devil than vote for Stonor!"

But the gentlemen of his cloth, who reside in this immediate neighbourhood, cannot help earnestly and respectfully entreating to support our Bible, and Missionary and Tract Societies, & every other similar Institution, with that earnestness and zeal which they have just now manifested in supporting and recommending their three favourite Candidates. If each clergyman, who has not already done so, would now set about it, there would be little to fear from the spread of Romanism, or the increase of Methodism, but the coming of that time would be hastened when we "shall be one fold and one shepherd." A most highly respectable meeting, to celebrate the recent glorious triumph of Conservatism over the Whig-Radical and Popish faction in Oxfordshire, was held at Deddington, on Tuesday last. About 100 persons were present. The unfavourable state of the weather did not for a moment damp the zeal and ardour of the North-Oxfordshire Conservatives, who appeared anxious to show again and again their devoted attachment to our glorious Constitution, which they expressed themselves determined to uphold unfettered and unimpaired. The meeting was held in the Infant School Room, which was most elegantly and tastefully decorated with flowers, evergreens, &c. The banners were very handsome; the one over the Chairman, "The Queen and Constitution," with "V.R." was tastefully formed with flowers; and the others were "Norreys for ever" - "Speed the Plough" - "Queen, Lords, and Commons" - "God speed the Plough and prosper Oxfordshire" - and "Parker and the Constitution." In the unavoidable absence of J.H. Whitmore Jones Esq. [Chastleton], Daniel Stuart, Esq. of Wykham Park, was unanimously called to the chair. Amongst the company present we noticed the Chairman, T.A.W. Parker, Esq. M.P. Major Cartwright, Rev. S.R. Cartwright, Captain Henry Cartwright, Fred. Cartwright, Esq. William Willes, Esq. Colonel Dawkins, Rev. W.C. Risley, Rev. G.D. Faithful, Rev. Mr. Chambers, J. Davis, Esq. and many other very respectable gentlemen of the neighbourhood. The Chairman was supported by Colonel Dawkins, who officiated as Vice-Chairman; the Rev. W.C. Risley presiding, assisted by James Gardner, Esq. at the side-table. After the substantials and delicacies which Mr. Herring, of the King's Arms, had supplied in great abundance, were removed, the Chairman gave the good old English toast, "Church and Queen," which was enthusiastically drank with three times three, the band playing "God save the Queen."

The Chairman next proposed "The Queen Dowager, and the rest of the Royal Family," which was heartily drank with three times three. - Tune "Here's a health to all good lasses."

The Chairman gave "The Army."

Colonel Dawkins, as the senior officer present, returned thanks for the honour paid to the army. He assured the gentlemen present that no class of subjects in her Majesty's dominions were more anxious to discharge their duties honestly and faithfully than the British army. They were good soldiers in time of war, and as good citizens in time of peace. He begged to offer his most hearty congratulations to that meeting upon the result of the recently contested election - not as a triumph of one candidate over another, but because it was a decided triumph of conservatism over radicalism and popery. (Great cheering.) It was stated that religion and politics had no connexion with each other, but he believed that we owed much of our national prosperity and power to the manner in which religion had been encouraged and fostered. He did not wonder that those who wished to pull down the fabric were displeased and angry that the influence of the Protestant Clergy was greatly increased. These were no times for wavering; it was time for every individual to speak out, and to show to what party he belongs. The utmost endeavours must be used to put down that wild, visionary, revolutionary party which were striving to overturn all that was valuable in the Constitution, and which was governed and controlled by that Popish Irish demagogue O'Connell - (great cheering) - who would sap, and undermine the Constitution which had raised England so high in the scale of nations, and by which this country had stood for centuries the pride and envy of all the nations of the world. He entreated them to be firm and vigilant in support of the good cause, as he, in his conscience, believed the happiness of the country depended upon the preservation of the British Constitution unimpaired in its efficiency. (Cheering.)

The Chairman begged to propose a toast which should always be drank at meetings such as the present - "The Wooden Walls of Old England."

The Chairman then gave "The Navy." Three times three, which were rapturously given.

The Chairman proposed the health of a worthy and estimable man, and an excellent conservative, which he was sure the company would have great pleasure in drinking - it was the health of "The Lord Lieutenant of Oxfordshire, Lord Macclesfield." Three times three.

The Chairman next gave "The High Sheriff of Oxfordshire." He was a gentleman of great importance in the county, and an active conservative. Three times three.

The Chairman said he had been presented with a list of the musical gentlemen in the company, and he was happy to say it was a long one. He was pleased to find there were so many talented gentlemen present, and called upon Mr. Fisher, whose name was first upon the list, for a song. The call was heartily responded to, and Mr. Fisher gave, with much humour, the song "A Half-starved Whig," which was greatly applauded.

[Mr. Parker, our newly-elected Member, at this stage of the proceedings, entered the room, and was most enthusiastically cheered in his progress to the head of the table.]

The Chairman then gave "The Bishop and Clergy of the Diocese." Three times three.

The Rev. W.C. Risley was sorry he should have been called on to return thanks for the honour done to the Clergy, when there were two senior Clergymen present who would have much better acknowledged the compliment. The Rev. Gentleman said we now lived in most critical times, and every person ought manfully to come forward and avow his sentiments. The cry now raised was that the Church wants reforming - then let it be reformed; but those who raised the cry wanted not to reform but *to destroy* the Church. They would *reform* the Church by *pulling down the structure*. He would have any abuses which might have crept in reformed, but would support and preserve it in its purity, and in its union with the State inviolate. (Cheering.)

The Chairman gave the health of an old and well-tried friend, "W.R. Cartwright, Esq. of Aynho." (Great cheering.) Three times three.

Major Cartwright begged leave to return his sincere thanks for the honour they had done his father; he was sure he would highly value the compliment, coming as it did from so respectable a body of his conservative neighbours. His father was not in good health, but was recovering, and he doubted not he would be where all present wished him to be, "at his post" in the House of Commons. He required no stimulant to urge him on to do his duty. (Cheers.) When called on he was always ready - his cry was:

"Said I my limbs were old?

"Said I my blood was cold?"

(Great cheering.) No! he would say no such thing; he wanted no spur to cause him to attend at his post, at which he was

sure to be. To the young conservatives, who were present, he would say -

"May you, like him, be ever true,
"And ever still support your blue."

Song - Mr. W. Merry, "Our glorious Constitution."

The Chairman gave the health of "Mr. Willes, High Sheriff for Northamptonshire." Three times three.

W. Willes, Esq. returned thanks for the flattering manner in which his health had been received. He was proud to appear there as an Elector of Oxfordshire, who had assisted, in a slight degree, in the return of their three Conservative Members. He was always ready to assist in promoting the good cause, which he had no doubt would be more and more successful.

Song - "The good old days of Adam and Eve."

The Chairman begged to propose a toast, which he was sure would be rapturously received by all present - "The health of the Conservative Members for the County of Oxford." Given with nine times nine, and one cheer more.

(The cheering, which scarcely subsided during the whole of Mr. Parker's manly address, prevented our catching more than detached sentences.) The following (as near as we could collect) is the substance of his speech:- He said that, in returning thanks, he much regretted the absence of his colleagues, who were unavoidably prevented from attending, as, had they been present, they would, from having been more accustomed than himself to public speaking, have better explained the line of conduct they meant to pursue. For himself, and his partner in the good cause, he would candidly, and without disguise say, that their rallying point should be the Church and Constitution - their flag, the Royal Banner - and their watchword, Conservatism. In intellectual England conservatism was rapidly and steadily progressing. England had nobly sustained the battle and happily won the victory, setting a pattern of loyalty and right feeling to all the world. He wished that Ireland and Scotland had come forward as heartily as England and Wales in the same good cause. He wished all might long live to enjoy the victory so gloriously achieved, and hoped all present would keep a sharp eye on the O'Connell-led-Ministry, lest by their constant mining and sapping they root up the sacred edifice of our national Zion, and by their political quackery, destroy that glorious Constitution they have not sense to value. The Hon. Gentleman returned his most hearty thanks to his friends for their exertions during the late contest, and for their kindness to him at that meeting.

Song - Mr. Clark, "England, Europe's glory."

The Chairman gave "The Duke of Wellington." Three times three, which were given enthusiastically, with one cheer more, repeated again and again.

The Chairman next gave "Lord Lyndhurst and the House of Lords." Three times three.

Song - "The Exciseman."

The Chairman gave Sir Robert Peel, and the Conservative Members of the House of Commons." Three times three.

Mr. Parker acknowledged the toast. He said the Conservative Members had been rather remiss in attendance upon their duties; but he believed they would be more active, and always found at their post in future.

Song - "Mary's Ghost." The band afterwards played a march with great precision and effect.

Major Cartwright begged to propose a toast. Many toasts had been drank, and many conservative toasts, but he begged to offer them another - the health of a good practical, not a theoretical conservative, gentleman who had done much to further the cause of conservatism. He, without further preface, begged to propose the health of their Chairman, "D. Stuart, Esq," (Great cheering.)

Mr. Stuart returned thanks for the honour paid him, a compliment which he highly valued. No man felt more joy at the triumph which they had met to celebrate than himself. Five years since Lord Norreys was placed at the bottom of the poll. But where was he placed now? Lord Norreys headed the poll, and is the favourite of the county! It evidently showed that a great change of opinion had taken place. Major Weyland had resigned; but had he again come forward he (Mr. Stuart) had no doubt the Major would have been again triumphantly elected. Mr. Weyland had entered into Parliament as a reformer, and a reformer he was; but finding that the Popish faction were going to great lengths, (and that he could no longer conscientiously support their measures) like an honest man, he changed sides. He (Mr. Stuart) firmly believed that the county was quite as well represented as it would have been had Mr. Weyland still continued one of its representatives. Last winter, Mr. Tancred, the Member for Banbury, stated that when he first went into Parliament there were only 130 Conservative Members, and complained that, upon returning to the House, he should meet nearly 300 conservatives. What would that gentleman return to now? - a House of more than 300 conservatives! - (cheers) - and Mr. Tancred would soon find himself in a great minority. (Cries of Tawney forever!") Mr. Tancred must confess, if asked, that

a great change in opinion had taken place. He had had great pleasure in taking the chair upon the present occasion. He had been asked, "Where could a more respectable class of Yeomanry than those of Oxfordshire be found?" He did not believe there was a more respectable body of yeomanry in England.

Colonel Dawkins, having obtained leave of the Chairman, begged to propose a toast. He had always considered the agricultural, commercial, and manufacturing interests were intimately connected and interwoven with each other; but if the agricultural interest was not upheld, the commercial and manufacturing interests would fail. He begged to give the "Marquis of Chandos, and the Independent Yeomen of the county of Oxford." Three times three.

The Rev. Mr. Risley begged to propose a toast, which all would regret if omitted - it was the health of "Colonel Parker, the respected father of the worthy Member present." Three times three.

Mr. Parker returned thanks.

The Chairman proposed "The Agents of the Members for Oxfordshire," who had exerted themselves with great skill, zeal, and energy, and with very great success.

Mr. Field returned thanks. He was at a loss to account for the absence of other agents, but hoped they were as well satisfied with being absent as he was with being present. Another occasion would probably arise, when his exertions should be again used in support of conservatism, and he heartily hoped that they might be as eminently successful.

The Rev. G.D. Faithful, with an admirable preface, proposed the health of "Colonel Dawkins." Three times three.

Colonel Dawkins returned thanks. He had had the honour of twice addressing the company previously, and he felt great difficulty in thanking them as he could wish for the very unexpected honour paid him. For the manner in which his health had been proposed and received, he begged to return his heartfelt thanks.

He recollected with pleasure the days he had spent with the family of the gentleman who had proposed his health, and hoped their acquaintance would be renewed. He was very anxious to promote friendly feelings amongst all classes. He had had the honour of a seat in Parliament for 10 years, from 1820 to 1830, and during that period he had invariably given his vote in support of the conservative cause - (cheers) - and had never regretted a vote given. It gave him great pleasure to attend so highly respectable a meeting, and he again

thanked them for the manner in which his health had been received. (Cheers.)

The Chairman proposed the health of "W.H. Ashhurst, Esq. President of the Conservative Association, and Chairman of the Quarter Sessions," a gentleman of great influence in the county, which he had used in support of the conservative cause at the election. Three times three.

Mr. Field begged to propose a toast, which, he felt assured, would be received with great pleasure. He gave the health of "Major Cartwright." Three times three.

Major Cartwright, in acknowledging the compliment, said he had come from another county to celebrate the festivities of this day. He hoped his exertions in the cause had been successful. He had taken a tour during the course of the elections. He first went to Bath, where there was a good chance of returning two conservatives; then to Devonshire, Lord John Russell's own county, where a gentleman of the same name and conservative principles as Mr. Parker, was returned in conjunction with another conservative; thence to Plymouth, where he got into a Plymouth mob, and where two radicals were returned. At Bridgwater he had gone to a radical house, and on inquiring if he could have accommodation, was answered "O yes; our Members have left the town, and we have plenty of room." They had left in the dark, as their proceedings generally are. Had he gone to the conservative house he could not have been accommodated. Then to North Wiltshire, where Sir Francis Burdett - (cheers) - was returned, and where he had changed names from "Westminster's Pride" to "England's Glory!" (Great cheering.) Next to East Surrey, where two conservatives were returned; thence to South Essex, where [sic] also two "good men and true" were returned; and last, not least, he went to Middlesex, where he had the great satisfaction of assisting to eject that great political quack - Joseph Hume - (great cheering) - from the misrepresentation of the county. He had said sufficient to shew that there were "good men and true" throughout England, who had done their duty like those present. The electors of Oxfordshire had done one thing - they had greatly displeased her Majesty's Ministers. (Laughter.) They say the electors have not acted wisely - in fact they are fools. They (the Ministers) say, "If you are Protestants you should encourage and support Popery; if loyalists, you should prove it by being disloyal and attacking the Throne of England, that you should support the Church by undermining it; if wishing to support the Constitution and preserve property, must bring it about by revolution." Oxfordshire had well done her duty, and he hoped and trusted that, as the constituents had performed their duty, the Members, who had their's to perform, would do it (as he had no doubt they would) manfully.

Major Cartwright again rose, and proposed the health of "Lord Churchill and the Queen's Own Yeomanry."

Mr. Parker returned thanks.

The Chairman next gave "The Ladies of Oxfordshire." Three times three.

The Chairman then left, accompanied by Mr. Parker, and many other gentlemen, who were most enthusiastically cheered as they retired; after which J. Davis, Esq. of Swerford Park, was called to the chair, and the hilarity of the meeting was continued until a late hour.

At the Deddington Petty Sessions, on Saturday last, before W.R. Cartwright, Esq. M.P. chairman, and other Magistrates, the toll-taker at Cuckold's Holt Gate was fined £2 2s. for demanding toll illegally; - two boys were fined 10s. each, for wanton cruelty and injuries to some turkeys; and the keeper of a beer-shop was fined 2*l*. and costs, for permitting gambling in his house.

We insert the following address sent to us by Dr. Hayle, which he considers necessary to his vindication from the effect of remarks made upon him in the Deddington news of last week:

To the Inhabitants of Deddington, and the Neighbourhood.

The circumstances under which Dr. Hayle succeeded Mr. Bradfield require explanation. The peculiarity of his situation, and its tendency to excite doubt, and invite misrepresentation, seem to bear out this assertion, and will,

it is hoped, excuse to the inhabitants of Deddington and the neighbourhood, this trespass on their attention.

The circumstances above alluded to are briefly these. Dr. Hayle having become acquainted with Mr. Bradfield through the medium of a Medical Agency Office, in London, after some inquiry, entered into partnership with him. Thus connected with him, he accordingly came down to Deddington, but had not been twenty-four hours there, before Mr. Bradfield was compelled to leave it suddenly, and for an indefinite period. The uncertainty of his return, and some facts which became known about the same time, seemed to Dr. Hayle imperiously to demand a dissolution of the partnership, and an offer to that effect from Mr. Bradfield was immediately closed with. An arrangement followed, by which the whole of the business and effects of Mr. Bradfield, in Deddington, were purchased, all demands against him, in that place, met, and his patients secured against any sudden call upon them for the settlement of their accounts. In order to effect this a large sum of money was sacrificed, and its total loss, in the event of Dr. Hayle's leaving Deddington, will, he trusts, be considered a guarantee for his remaining.

It appears from the above statement that the acquaintance between the parties was of no long standing, and of a very slight nature, that their connexion was one purely of business, and that, therefore, the behaviour of Mr. Bradfield cannot, in fairness, form an item in estimating the probabilities of Dr. Hayle's future conduct.

In conclusion. Dr. Hayle begs leave to offer his thanks for the confidence with which he has already been honoured, and acknowledges, with gratitude, the kindness of those patients of Mr. Bradfield who felt for his situation, and unknown and unIntroduced as he was, took into consideration and admitted his claims. *Deddington, October, 1837.*

Our little town during the fair could boast of possessing some beef as fine as any in the kingdom, and our wonder ceases how so large a quantity was disposed of, when we are informed that some of the principal tradesmen dined from three to four hundred friends and customers at each house. It may not be generally known to our readers that this hospitality lasts till after Christmas among the respectable inhabitants, which tends to keep up a kindly feeling so necessary among neighbours; hence we presume arises the appellation of drunken Deddington, a name so well known to travellers in the county.

On Friday night some evil-disposed persons maliciously cut and destroyed nine vine and other fruit trees, growing in the front of the range of buildings of Mr. Margetts, grocer; we perceive he has offered a reward of £5, independently of the association for the prosecution of felons (of which he is a member). We hope, as he has some clue, we shall be able to state in next week's Paper the apprehension of the party. On the same evening, the Rev. Mr. Burrows, of Steeple Aston, had his cows turned into his garden, and completely spoiled his forward crop of vegetables, beside doing other serious injury. These repeated acts, whether they proceed from malicious motives or frolics, show more than ever the necessity of an active police, and we hear with pleasure it is in contemplation to call a meeting shortly of the inhabitants, including the adjoining villages, for the purpose of establishing one.

It is singular we have in our place a family, all ringers, of the name of French, who have monopolized our belfry for many years; - whether Tories or Liberals, we cannot authenticate.

We were at first astounded at the announcement in the bill of a flea to be seen 20 feet long and 18 wide, cheese mites as large as roasting pigs, &c. - We heartily wish him success.

A dreadful and lamentable accident occurred on Thursday, to a man named Cross, of this place, he was digging stones

with his son a lad about 12 years of age in a pit in the parish of North Aston, and a bulk of the earth fell on him, and before assistance could arrive, though promptly attended by Dr. Hayle, of Deddington, life was quite extinct; we regret to state he has left a wife and family.
