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DEDDINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Meeting in Town Hall 21 May 2008

Present: Cllrs Squires and Flux [Chairman see below] Alton, Anderson, Collins, Ince, Privett, Rudge, Spencer, Todd, Westbury, Wood and County Cllr Jelfs, the Clerk, Minute Clerk, two members of public and the DN correspondent.

PC Chairman

At the April meeting Cllr Squires said he did not wish to stand for re-election as chairman; to handle the handover Lorraine Watling as Clerk assumed the chair and asked for nominations. Cllrs Flux and Anderson were elected as Chairman and vice, unopposed.

Open Forum

Mary Robinson informed the meeting that, following the previous evening's Annual Parish Meeting, an anonymous £5,000 donation had been made to the Windmill project. Cllr Collins was nominated as liaison co-ordinator. The proposal was now to seek planning approval from CDC for the project. Charles Barker reported that an approach had been made to OCC for some adjustment to prevent light nuisance from the street lights in the Stile but had been informed that this would have to be approved by PC/Highways. There was also some concern about health and safety and maintenance of the lights.

Highways

• Hempton line painting should be completed by end July

• Mobile speed cameras are now being deployed in Parish

• Earls Lane parking, no resolution to problem yet

• New Street southern crossing point, alternatives to be reviewed

• High Street northern crossing point *request button* on east-west traffic lights suggested.

Finance & General Purposes

General discussion about cash flow in line with forecast, budget allocations and location of funds. Cherwell DC legal dept are investigating the title of Stonepits. Public liability insurance to be increased to £10 million.

Special Projects

The millennium tree planted on the green was in fact an oak, a protective guard was not considered

necessary but when tree was established OCC may consider installing a circular seat. A *styraciflua acalycina* or *liquid amber* was recommended as a suitable tree for the other green to be planted in early 2009.

Hempton Seat: no volunteers to sponsor the replacement. Cost of £500 to come from PC budget.




Year 4 hope to get our new garden plot going that week too, with the help of Mrs Haselgrove and F1 children who have been growing lots of plants.

Well Remembered

Doreen Smith grew up in Croydon and was spotted by Ken in his first year at Ashburton School beginning a friendship which lasted 75 years. Wartime saw them in the WAAF and RAF. Their wedding during an air raid in 1944 sealed the marriage of a blithe spirit and the salt of the earth. Doreen worked in the valuation department of Croydon Council, but then devoted herself to family life: the care of Ken, Peter and Michael, both of whom were senior choristers at Westminster Abbey. When Ken retired, they moved to Clifton and then to Deddington, where Doreen enjoyed the WI and retail therapy. She travelled widely in the Americas and across Europe, once even being arrested in Moscow on suspicion of a black-market deal.

Christopher Hall Kathleen Berry was born in 1924 at Hanwell to parents of a farming background. She was one of eight siblings, four girls, four boys. There was also a half-brother and a half-sister. She went to Wroxton School then into service. During the war Kath worked as a bakery van driver and after at Lampreys store in Banbury. She married Ken in 1946; they had four children: Sue, Mary, Thelma and Paul. In 1961 the family moved to Deddington where Kath was caretaker at the Health Centre. She enjoyed her garden, wildlife, her dogs and her pet birds; she was a TV sports addict: football (especially Chelsea), snooker and motor-racing (having been a hands-on banger racer). But her main focus was her family, to whom, down the generations, she was devoted. HW Jeremy Richard Philip Vallender, Jerry, was born on 28 September 1949 in York where his first years were spent. He was the only son and second child of Philip and Mary Vallender. After Jerry had finished school the family moved to Colwell, Malvern. In 1986 Jerry met Agmara Hering, a beautiful German girl, and they married in September 1987. They moved to Barford St Michael in 1988. During this time, Jerry and Agmara set up their business of JAV Consultancy. Agmara died in 2000. In Deddington Jerry was a regular at the Unicorn where he was known for his good humour and kindness to strangers. He is also remembered for his love of motoring and how his cars were always in pole position in the Market Place. John Dane

New Car Share Scheme for Chiltern Railways

hiltern Railways has recently launched a carsharing scheme to allow passengers to reduce travel costs, as well as congestion and pollution.

Passengers can access the scheme at <u>www.chilterncarshare.co.uk</u> and register their journey details free. The system will then tell them if anyone else is going in the same direction, leaving it to them to make contact through a secure email



connection, and arrange to share both the journey and the costs of travel. If three rail passengers travel together to a Chiltern Railways operated station (eg Banbury or Bicester) in the same car at any time of the day, there is no charge for car parking. Ask the car park attendant when you arrive at your station for a '3 go free' voucher.

The software behind the system has been provided by the specialist car-sharing company, Liftshare, which has established more than 900 carsharing schemes for communities across the UK.





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On the Farm

he warm weather at the start of May set things off with a real buzz and has given the bees just the boost they needed to get over the set-backs of last summer and autumn. Despite all the doom and gloom merchants' predicting the demise of British bee-keeping, the bees at Home Farm are hard at work. We have already had to artificially swarm all our colonies on to new wax foundation (thin sheets of beeswax on which they build their brood cells) to prevent them from buzzing off. By the time this falls off the printing press I shall have split each of the strongest hives down into three nucleus boxes, each headed by a new queen. If the summer turns out as good as 'the oak before the ash' predicts, these nuclei will have expanded into full colonies before harvest and will give us some late season honey.

The ewes and lambs are now back in the river valley with plenty of grass in front of them, which is the way I hope it will stay after last year's flooding. The problems on the ovine front are still a long way from being resolved, as Defra has just extended the Blue Tongue protection area to cover all of Oxfordshire, so it's back to movement restrictions

and we shall have to vaccinate all the ewes and lambs, so it will be a case of filling the syringe and then filling out the paper work.

After the cold wet April the wildlife front is showing a considerable improvement. All our summer visitors have returned, with six pairs of swallows taking up residence in the buildings. We have also seen an increase in the numbers of curlew, redshank, lapwing and snipe looking for breeding sites on the river meadows, and we can now add the barn owls to the list of breeding birds on the farm as a pair of them has taken up residence in a box put up two years ago.

With the cold spring the first butterflies were very late, with brimstone, orange tip and the blues not emerging until early May. The moth situation in the early part of the year was giving some cause for concern as, unlike other years, very few were coming to the light traps, but that too is beginning to improve. With the right weather conditions we could see an improvement in the 173 different species of moth identified on the farm last year.

S adly I failed to follow my own advice last month about covering vulnerable plants in the event of frosty conditions and suffered the consequences with young runner beans on that one frosty night we had in May. They are, however, still alive, if only just, and I promise to publish the outcome. A number of Hempton allotment holders quite unexpectedly suffered a similar fate with frostbite on potatoes and French beans.

A little on pests and diseases might prove helpful for those growers planning to sow a second crop of carrots when the carrot fly is least effective in mid-June. Carrot root fly is the commonest and worst pest; the maggots, which are about 8mm long, eat into the lower layers of the carrot and leave unsightly lines and cracks that can be the starting point for rot. The leaves of mature plants infected by carrot fly tend to take on a reddish colour. The fly is very hard to control. Sowing carrots in mid-June provides a better chance of avoiding attack. The variety 'Sytan' is particularly resistant.

Parsley, parsnips and celery can also come under attack by the carrot fly. All, of course, may be covered with fleece (see May DN for details).

Other methods of control are placing barriers 60 -80 cm high around the rows and planting sage or onions among the carrots. They tell me the smell confuses the fly. Another option might be a soil insecticide worked into the upper layer of the soil before planting.

Carrots can be left in the ground over winter, especially if the soil is sandy. If the soil is heavier or slug infested, you might be well advised to store them in boxes of barely moist sand in as cold a place as possible. Young carrots are excellent when frozen whole.

The Parish is organising a Fruit and Vegetable show on 6 September and I wondered how many had thought about growing some carrots in drainpipes. The pipes should be filled with finely sifted sandy soil and kept well watered, thus enabling the bottom of the pipes to remain moist to encourage the root downwards. I am told you can grow a carrot, using this method, to a length of 1.5 metres. May I wish you the best of luck!

DEDDINGTON 150 YEARS AGO

The following are extracts from the diaries of the Rev Cotton Risley. He was away in France with his wife Susan for about three weeks in June 1858 visiting Amiens, Paris and Dieppe with little in the diary, so I have included some of the entries for July.

26th June - Widow Owen came to ask me to bury Widow Castle of Clifton which I consented to do with Mr Burgess's permission.

28th June - I paid Bonner for the poor's coal – and part of our own recently laid in.

30th June - A man named Owen came for another summons which I granted – against a farmer here for non-payment of wages.

6th July - An Inspector came to determine certain matters as to the future management etc of the Union House and its Inmates – and to hear the merits of a proposition for the creation of a new Union House at this place – Deddington being 10 miles distant from Woodstock, a great hardship and injustice to the poor especially. Col Piggott however held out no hopes that the Board would sanction or agree to such an arrangement, but thought that it might be more practicable to apply to be detached from Woodstock and removed to Banbury. This remains to be considered by us, whether we should eventually, if it were conceded to us, be materially benefited by the change.

7th July - Attended a Church meeting when it was agreed to commence a part of the Church work *immediately* at the East End, and to pull down the gallery under the South Aisle – and to pay for the Faculty. Mrs Busby, the carpenter's wife, came for a summons against her husband's sister for threatening to do her serious injury and otherwise abusing her. I said if she could conscientiously take an oath that she apprehended danger to her life from her sister-in-law I would grant it.

8th July - Agreed with H Franklin to commence pulling down the South Aisle gallery on Monday next, the 12th instant.

WOMEN'S INSTITUTE 1925 – 2007

DEDDINGTON WOMEN'S INSTITUTE: THE 1950s

There was change in the air, and like most conservative (with a small c) organisations, resentment to change took its time to be conquered. Discussions on whether to move meetings from afternoon to evening occupied

members, was tried out one summer season and towards the end of the decade defeated by two votes! Membership stood at a healthy 60 and expected to increase. This formidable force of women must have had guite a strong influence on village matters. They pestered the Parish Council to supply rubbish bins, boldly wrote to Chesham & Brackley Brewery Ltd when the sobriguet 'Dirty Drunken Deddington' became rather too actual in one of the pubs. The death of King George VI in February 1952 plunged the nation into deep mourning leaving WIs uncertain about the propriety of holding their meeting that month. The Committee decided in favour of carrying on as usual.

In the previous year, 1951, members dressed up to run their stall at the grand Blenheim Pageant. *The glamorous Grannies* were obviously a great hit and gladly gave permission to have their photographs taken by Blinkhorns of Banbury and printed in *Home & County* magazine. Strangely, a gramophone (record player and wireless) bought, with all members' agreement, in January 1951 was sold again in 1955 and the reason why is not

mentioned in the Minutes! I just hope they were able to make a small profit.

Various crafts flourished throughout the decade. Quilting, basketry and patchwork classes were held, Mrs Howse passed her A test for knitting and three members entered work for the Oxfordshire Exhibition in April 1959. It never ceases to amaze me how cleverly a kaleidoscope of crafts, the never missed opportunities to help others at home or abroad, and the gift of fun and fellowship was exploited by our Deddington members of yesteryears. I must finish the 1950s with the shortest, and to my mind most startling, entry in the Minute book:

'November 1953. The winner of the Potato Growing Competition was Mrs Brent with 7 lbs 14 oz for ONE potato'. Is this really possible? No doubt readers will let me know!

MUSICAL NOTES

n the last two months Deddington church has been host to a feast of concerts in the church, which suggests it is becoming a favourite venue for choirs.

On 15 March, Akeman Voices directed by Martin Quinn performed a sequence of baroque masterpieces starting with Pergolesi's haunting setting of the religious poem *Stabat mater doloroso*. The scoring for soprano and alto soloists and female chorus created an ethereal atmosphere, which the singers captured beautifully. Two Magnificats, one allegedly by Buxtehude and the other indisputably by Vivaldi made up most of the second half with probably the best known piece of the evening, Monteverdi's exquisite, *Beatus Vir*, forming a most delicious jam in the sandwich.

A very different choir entertained us two weeks later. These singers were from Sophia Parish, Jonkoping, Sweden, and they produced a medley of unison, two part or hymn-like settings including Swedish folk tunes, psalms, seasonal songs and traditional African melodies. Mostly with piano accompaniment, a notable feature was the additional use of hand drums or organ. The choir were clearly very well trained, sang from memory with evident enthusiasm and knew how to smile and sway with the music.

The last Saturday in April brought back regular visitors in the form of Janet Lince and her choir Choros in a choral and orchestral concert. It was a return visit too for young Korean violinist, JooYeon

The choir, some of the time divided into two, and the four soloists (Helen Morton, Lorna Perry, Hugo Tucker and Jon Stainsby), coaxed by Janet's skilled baton, rose to the occasion with all the expressions of joy, tenderness, and devotion demanded by the music: a truly memorable experience.

And finally on 10 May, the Warriner Choir, under Martin Quinn, performed another choral masterpiece in Rossini's *Petite Messe Solonelle*. Neither small, nor particularly solemn, this work is a crowd puller. Unfortunately I was unable to be among the crowd myself, but my spies report that it was a thoroughly enjoyable evening, with the choir and soloists making the most of their opportunities.

When the DoL software is installed which will allow everyone to access and write their own copy, RF is anxious that the facility is explored and used for the benefit of the Parish.

The second speaker was your correspondent Charles Barker, who wanted to gauge the meeting's reaction to the idea of turning street lights off when not required. Apart from saving money, and being good for the environment and wildlife, there were indications that it reduced road traffic accidents. CB talked about the trial that is underway in Buckinghamshire where they are turning off 1700 street lights between 2.00 am and 5.00 am, and Deddington should consider doing the same. Oxfordshire CC who are responsible for street lights have said they would cooperate if the PC and the community agree. On a show of hands about 80% of the meeting supported the idea of investigating a trial.

The final speaker was Mary Robinson who wanted to promote the idea of a wind turbine at the Windmill Centre. In a carefully and thoroughly researched presentation MR covered location, viability, environmental impact and economics. The wind turbine would be 18m high and would be economically viable if a grant could be secured for 89% of the estimated £55,000 gross cost. The shortfall could be funded by a combination of PC, Windmill Committee and other local benefactors. The payback in these circumstances would be about seven years based on the committee's calculations. There followed a discussion and it was obvious that some residents of Mill Close were concerned, particularly about potential noise impact. On a show of hands, apart from the residents of Mill Close, the meeting was enthusiastic about the proposition.

An account of those sentenced to be transported from Deddington to the colonies

by Rob Forsyth, following research carried out in conjunction with Buffy Heywood, Richard Broadbent and Terence Talbot (Deddington, Tasmania)

S everal people within this village - and one in Tasmania - have spent a lot of time trying to find out how we came to have a namesake on the opposite side of the world. It is, as far as we can establish, the only other one. Sadly, despite much research, we have been unsuccessful.

In the process, however, we became aware of an exhibition in the Oxford Records Office (ORO) about those people who had been sentenced to transportation at the Oxford Assizes. Perhaps this was the place we would find our person? After all, many convicts remained in the country to which they had been so unwillingly conveyed, if only because returning to England was near impossible. They were also often granted (or purchased) some land and many had 'married'* and had a family. One of these might well have named his local area after their home parish.

We already knew, courtesy of our local resident in Tasmania, of a Thomas Waite and his son William who was transported there in 1827. The ORO directed us to some useful sources from which we were able to record the names, dates, offences and sentences of some 22 people who were either residents of and/or committed offences within the parish. We were also able to obtain quite a lot of detail as to what happened after they arrived at their destinations from a researched publication called *Banished!* These records provided us with a fascinating slice of history of our parish of which we felt many would be unaware. We are delighted that the DN has agreed to publish one or two of their stories in subsequent editions as space allows.

* Marriage was often carried out by a process in which men walked down a line of new convict arrivals and dropped a handkerchief in front of a woman they considered suitable. If she picked it up this was enough for them to be considered married – a very early form of speed dating?
