

## The men whose names are not on the War Memorial

The War Memorial currently includes names of men who are not from Deddington and it includes men who were dear to the people who were living in the Parish after the wars. This list is of men who have an officially recorded link to the Parish of Deddington, either by birth or residence, and whose names do not appear on the War Memorial.

### **Percival Bryan BANNARD**

Corporal, 1<sup>st</sup>/4<sup>th</sup> Battalion, The Oxfordshire and Buckinghamshire Light Infantry, 145 Brigade, 48<sup>th</sup> Division.

He was killed in action on 7 August 1917 age 21 during the Battle of Passchendaele. He is remembered on panel 37 and 39 of The Menin Gate, Ypres.

He was born in Deddington and was the son of Frederick P and Florence N A Bannard, 4 Grosvenor Road, Banbury.

### **Ernest Walter CURRYER**

Gunner, Royal Horse Artillery and Royal Field Artillery, 44 Brigade.

He died of wounds received during the fighting on the Somme on 30 September 1918 age 29.

He is buried in grave III B 14, Doingt Communal Cemetery Extension near Peronne.

He was born in Hempton and was the son of Frederick and the late Mary Curryer, Kempton Green, Princes Risborough.

### **Frederick DEANE**

Private, 1<sup>st</sup> Battalion, The Oxfordshire and Buckinghamshire Light Infantry, 17 Brigade, 6<sup>th</sup> (Poona) Division.

He died on 30 June 1916 probably from illness age 24.

He is buried in Islahie Mem 201, North Gate War Cemetery, Baghdad.

He was born in Deddington but moved to Compton, Berkshire. He was the son of James T and Agnes A Deane.

### **Charles George FLETCHER**

Private, 2<sup>nd</sup> Battalion, The Oxfordshire and Buckinghamshire Light Infantry, 5 Brigade, 2<sup>nd</sup> Division.

He was wounded near Ypres and died on 26 October 1914 age 33.

He is buried in grave III A 12, Boulogne Eastern Cemetery.

He was born in Deddington, the son of John and Elizabeth Fletcher.

### **Clarence Bert GILKES**

Private, 5<sup>th</sup> Battalion, The Oxfordshire and Buckinghamshire Light Infantry, 42 Brigade, 14<sup>th</sup> Division.

He was killed in action between Gheluvelt and Polygon Wood in the Battle of Passchendaele on 16 October 1917 age 20.

He is remembered on panel 96-98 of The Tyne Cot Memorial.

He was the son of George and Susan Gilkes of New Street.

His name is recorded by the Vicar in the Deanery magazine (p.40)

**Ernest James HAWKINS**

Private, 202 Company, Machine Gun Corps (Infantry), formerly with The Royal Army Service Corps.

He was killed during the Battle for Passchendaele on 9 October 1917 age 22.

He is remembered on panel 154 to 159 and 163A of The Tyne Cot Memorial.

He was born in Deddington, the son of Stephen H and Martha Hawkins.

**James HICKS**

Private, 5<sup>th</sup> Battalion, The Duke of Edinburgh's (Wiltshire Regiment), 40 Brigade, 13<sup>th</sup> Division, formerly with The Oxfordshire and Buckinghamshire Light Infantry.

He was killed during the second assault on Sanniyat on 9 April 1916 age 31.

He is remembered on panel 30 and 64 of the Basra Memorial, Iraq.

He was born in Deddington, the son of James and Sarah Hicks, Rock Farm, Baginton, Coventry.

**Ernest Charles HITCHMAN**

Private, 51<sup>st</sup> (Graduated) Battalion, The Royal Warwickshire Regiment, 205 Brigade, 68<sup>th</sup> Division.

He died on 23 October 1918 age 18 whilst he was stationed in East Anglia.

He is buried in grave 54 197, Norwich Cemetery.

He lived in Deddington and he was the son of Mrs Fanny G Symonds, 31 St Mary's Road, Cowley St John, Oxford.

**George William JORDON**

Lance Corporal, 5<sup>th</sup> Battalion, The Oxfordshire and Buckinghamshire Light Infantry, 42 Brigade, 14<sup>th</sup> Division.

He was killed in action at Delville Wood on 24 August 1916 age 19.

He is remembered on pier and face 10A and 10D of The Thiepval Memorial.

He was born in Deddington, the son of John and Annie Jordon.

**Isaac SMITH**

Private, 6<sup>th</sup> Battalion, The Oxfordshire and Buckinghamshire Light Infantry, 60 Brigade, 20<sup>th</sup> Division, formerly with The Oxfordshire Yeomanry (The Queen's Own Oxfordshire Hussars).

He was killed in action during the Battle of Transloy Ridge on 7 October 1916, age 26.

He is remembered on pier and face 10A and 10D of The Thiepval Memorial.

He was born in Deddington, the son of the late George and Ellen Smith.

His Army records show that he had no known living relatives.

**William Thomas STANLEY**

Private, Royal Army Ordnance Corps.

He died of double pneumonia in Halifax on 14 January 1918 age 33.

He is buried in St Peter's Churchyard, Wolvercote.

He was the son of Thomas J and Eliza A Stanley and the husband of Alice M Edwards (formerly Stanley) of Wytham, Oxford.

His Army records state that he was born in Deddington but there is no other evidence of this and it is probable that he was born in Ledwell.

**Albert STEVENS**

Corporal, 5<sup>th</sup> Battalion, The Oxfordshire and Buckinghamshire Light Infantry, 42 Brigade, 14<sup>th</sup> Division.

He was killed in action during the retreat after the Battle of St Quentin on 31 March 1918 age 25.

He is buried in grave 1 D 22, Namps-au-Val British Cemetery.

He was the brother of Ellen Prew, Adlestrop, Kingham and lived in Deddington.

**Edwin SYKES**

Sergeant, 11<sup>th</sup> (Lonsdale) Battalion, The Border Regiment, 97 Brigade, 32<sup>nd</sup> Division.

He was killed in action during the attack on Albert on 1 July 1916, the first day of the Battle of the Somme age 36.

He is buried in grave 1 G 20, Lonsdale Cemetery, Authuille.

He was the son of John and Elizabeth Sykes of Deddington.

**Hubert Charles SYKES**

Rifleman, 2<sup>nd</sup>/9<sup>th</sup> County of London Battalion, The London Regiment (Queen Victoria's Rifles), 175 Brigade, 58<sup>th</sup> Division.

He was killed in action in the Battle of Passchendaele on 3 October 1917 age 37.

He is remembered on panel 151 of The Tyne Cot Memorial.

He was the son of Joshua and Mary A Sykes of New Street and the husband of Harriet C Bennetton (formerly Sykes), 99 Evelyn Street, Deptford.

His name is recorded by the Vicar in the Deanery magazine (p.42.)

**Norman William SYKES**

Rifleman, 1<sup>st</sup> Battalion, Rifle Brigade (The Prince Consort's Own), 11 Brigade, 4<sup>th</sup> Division.

He was killed in action near Albert on 1 July 1916 age 20.

He is buried in grave B5, Thistle Dump Cemetery, High Wood, Longueval.

He was born in Deddington, the son of Henry and Martha J Sykes, of North Aston.

**Alec Charles TAYLOR**

Private, 2<sup>nd</sup> Battalion, The Oxfordshire and Buckinghamshire Light Infantry, 5 Brigade, 2<sup>nd</sup> Division.

He was killed in action in the first Battle of Ypres on 26 November 1914.

He is remembered on panel 37 and 39 of The Menin Gate, Ypres.

He was born in Deddington and the husband of Ethel M H Geen (formerly Taylor), 7 Clarke Street, Ebey, Cardiff.

**William Henry Valentine TUSTAIN**

Private, 7<sup>th</sup> Battalion, The Leicestershire Regiment, 110 Brigade, 37<sup>th</sup> Division.

He was killed in action during the Battle of Arleux on 28 April 1917 age 33.

He is remembered on bay 5 of the Arras Memorial.

He was born in Hempton. His parents were Sarah and the late George Tustain.

**Frank WADDUP**

Private, 5<sup>th</sup> Battalion, The Oxfordshire and Buckinghamshire Light Infantry, 42 Brigade, 14<sup>th</sup> Division.

He was killed in action during the third Battle of the Scarpe on 3 May 1917 age 20.

He is remembered on bays 6 and 7 of the Arras Memorial.

He was the son of Thomas H and the late Harriet Waddup of Deddington.

**Fred Cecil WOOLGROVE**

Corporal, 7<sup>th</sup> Battalion, The Queen's (Royal West Surrey Regiment), 55 Brigade, 12<sup>th</sup> Division.

He died of his wounds on 9 December 1915 age 24. He had probably been wounded at Hulluch in late October.

He is buried in plot I row B grave 6, Corbie Communal Cemetery.

He was born in Deddington, the son of Joseph and Annie Woolgrove of North Aston.
