MEETING IN TOWN HALL, 19 MARCH 2003

Present: Cllrs Flux (chair), Alton, Cox, Ellis, Harvey, Haslam, Rollason, Spencer, Squires, Swash, Todd, Watts, Westley, Wood, D/Cllr O'Sullivan, the Clerk, the Minutes Secretary, and 3 members of the public. GRASS CUTTING

PC accepted tenders from DesignGro for the Windmill site, and T Fox for the Castle Grounds, all verges in Hempton, Clifton and Deddington and other areas specified in previous contracts. Clerk to collect information on pros and cons of PC purchasing/ leasing own equipment, including training and insurance.

NATURE DAY

Walter Meagher has responded to the PC's suggestion of a major presentation of his work, and asked for support for a wider-ranging Nature Day. Chairman and Clerk will meet Mr Meagher to discuss possibilities. The School might be interested, and also Deddington Boys/Girls Brigade who are looking for a community project. PC confirmed that this is the kind of initiative which could involve and benefit the whole parish.

NEWS IN BRIEF

- PC will not enter Thames and Chilterns County in Bloom 2003.
- Overhanging trees at St Thomas Street junction have been cut back.
- New parish noticeboards (funded by DN) are ready to be installed by Village Stewards.
- In response to OCC query, PC confirmed its support for the provision of a pedestrian crossing on Hempton Road.

Replacement for Parish Office computer, budgeted for 2003/4, will be paid out of 2002/3 underspend.

PLANNING AND PROPERTY

- PC no objection, provided neighbours agree where appropriate: (i) Castle End, Deddington - new opening, oak gate and stone steps to boundary wall not visible from road. (ii) The Granary, Duns Tew Road, Hempton - 2-storey side and rear extension. (iii) Craxton, Castle Street, Deddington - tree surgery including crown reduction of horse chestnut. (iv) Cromwell House, Market Place, Deddington - fell silver birch. PC recommends planting of replacement tree.
- PC objection (v) The Hair Workshop, Market Place, Deddington - retrospective permission for signs over doorway and on west elevation. Inappropriate in conservation area. PC have no objection to appropriate signs.
- CDC approvals (vi) Paper Mill Cottage, Oxford Road, Adderbury - amended plans for single storey extension to front, and other changes. (vii) Greenstone Cottage, 4 New Street, Deddington - new internal ground floor toilet and first floor ensuite bathroom. (viii) The Cottage, Philcote Street, Deddington - demolish outbuildings and erect 2storey extension (Cllr Haslam declared interest). (ix) Mullions, Castle Street, Deddington - fell conifer.

TALKING TO EACH OTHER

- The Chairman's letter about the precept, carried in last month's Deddington News, proved a very effective way of communicating with parishioners. The method will be used again on selected occasions. IT'S PAYBACK TIME AGAIN
- Deddington Map Group has transferred a further £1,000 to PC. Total value to date of Group's returns to parish is £6,000, against grants of £650, £3,000 and £3,600. PC congratulated the Map Group on its achievements.

BROADBAND

BT will provide Deddington with Broadband internet facility if at least 400 potential users register their names on the internet. PC fully supports this initiative. Contact the Clerk on 01869 337447, for details of how to register.

ACCIDENTS AT TRAFFIC LIGHTS

The recent crash at Hempton Road/Banbury Road traffic lights brings the average of accidents at this site to one a week over the last month or so. Clerk to pursue with OCC.

WHAT DOES THIS MEAN?

CDC has written to PC about proposed transfer of housing stock. Planning and Property Working Group to study these proposals to identify exactly what is intended, and to report back to PC for a policy decision.

PARISH FINANCES

Invoices passed for payment totalled £8,947.35, including £1,113.34 imprest account (wages), £5,615.75 on new parish noticeboards, £1,046.93 on new computer for parish office.

Investments totalled £522,245.57 of which £9,426.27 Barclays (£4,694.71 @ 1% on 14 days + £1,636.61 @ 0.3% overnight + £2,544.95 @ 0.1% imprest + £550 @ 0.1 % current); £1,000 Bradford & Bingley @ 3.4% on 120 days; £511,819.43 West Bromwich @ 3.75% overnight. PC to reduce number of accounts with Barclays to 3 - current, imprest and holding.

DEDDINGTON MAP GROUP

It was in June 1997 that Deddington Map Group first put their Millennium proposal to the Parish Council. The idea was simple enough - produce a large scale, full-colour, illustrated map of the Parish in the year 2000, put it on public display and make it accessible to all. Smaller-scale prints were to be sold, and

supporting publications. The Parish Council gave us a startup grant, and we showed that what we intended was a practical proposition which would benefit the whole community. We planned, costed and carried through, specific programmes of work, funded by further PC grants. The Group undertook to return what we could to the par-



ish, if and when there was ever a surplus of revenue over expenditure. At the end of this financial year, this is where we stand:

Total value of PC grants to Map Group: £7,250. Value so far of Map Group's returns to parish: £6,000 approx, of which (1) cash transferred from Map Group to PC: £3,250. (2) Map display in parish church: £1,700 approx. (3) CDC grant repaid to PC: £500. (4) Map display under Town Hall arches: £400 approx. (5) Library display: £100 approx. (6) Donations etc: £50 approx. This astonishing result reflects great credit on all concerned and there will be more cash transfers to come

THE FLOWER GARDEN

For some time this flower garden column has gone in tandem with another which is about vegetables and allotments. For a while that was written by Oliver Hawes. Oliver is no longer with us, and we shall miss him so much, not just for his words on vegetables, but for himself. He was a kind, considerate man, a man with a twinkle in his eye, who believed in sharing his crops and his ideas. His allotment was a source of great pleasure and interest to him throughout the year. We offer our warm condolences to his family.

At this time of the year the winter damage becomes apparent, and we are faced with some hard decisions. It all depends on whether you feel it's your duty to rescue damaged shrubs and nurse them with kindness, pruning and fertilisers, or whether you prefer to have an instant nice-looking garden. The choice is yours and if necessary you must brace yourself to chop down and compost the poor looking specimens and at the same time get rid of plants you have never really liked. There are some to which we give a bed and breakfast just for old time's sake, although we have never really taken to them. So, out with them and into the bin. I shall stick to my policy of renewing foliage plants. They give so much pleasure and are easy, but need replacing quite regularly. Variegated and red sage make splendid pot plants for the patio and are colourful in the perennial bed, but sages get woody after about three years. I shall soon pay a visit to the herb nursery on the Warmington road. They have a good choice of plants and you can sit down to a nice tea with chive scones. Marianne Elsleu G reat excitement in my little, unheated, greenhouse last month! The sweet pea seeds that I had carefully sown at the end of February began to come up. First there was just one. A little shoulder-like shoot bent double forced its way through the compost. A day or two later, when some



others had also emerged, it began to unfold and show the delicate green leaf buds that will gradually grow into proper plants. Provided always that the mice are not equally excited and come and feast on them. Then, it will not be long before I can plant them out and begin to wait for their beautifully coloured and scented flowers.

That's spring for you, full of thrilling promise. We had some wonderfully deceptive spring days last month. Deceptive because, as always, it seems too early and there could be frosts to come. But, no doubt, the potatoes planted in the allotment gardens down Satin Lane will be sprouting soon and, hopefully, will be hardy enough to cope with any more cold weather. Before the end of the month some of the tougher beans will be in the ground and before long root vegetables and others will be showing life. All that heavy digging and composting will soon be bearing fruit - or should I say veg.?

THE OLD QUARRY

The landscapes of Deddington bear evidence of enterprises no longer viable: water-wheels packed away, small sheds crumbling amidst concealing shrubbery, and shining crane's-bill (*Geranium lucidum*) growing on the foundations of a house in a disused quarry.

Undisturbed since the days of its useful life, when clay was dug and tiles were fired in the kiln, the old quarry is now home for plants self-sown, some that have arrived with the garden diggings left there, and others persisting - garden privet (*Ligustrum ovalifolium*) for example - from the time when there was a garden by the old house.

Identified on the OS Explorer 191 map as a nonconiferous wood (SP469304), the quarry is located on a dangerous curve of a fast road, the A4260, just south of Deddington village. The site is on a seam between

marlstone rock and Lias clay, and is identified on OS1881 as a 'Brick Tile & Lime Works'. A kiln and an unnamed building are labelled on the map and, in the second edition (1900), the quarry works are shown to have five buildings on 0.57ha (1.4 acres).



Above the old quarry on Plumdon Lane, a wide grassy track extends from the A4260 towards Tomwell Farm, where a dense cover of trees, mainly sycamore (Acer *pseudoplatanus*), garrisons the crest of the perilously steep bank, affording concealment to the tyres and rubble left among the selfheal (Prunella vulgaris) and wood forget-me-not (Myosotis sylvatica). The darkly wooded slope has a special attraction for ferns. Ferns are rare in the parish, both in kind and abundance; but there are more male-ferns (Dryopteris filix-mas) here than in any other place in the parish. The balance is further redressed by the occurrence of soft-shield fern (Polystichum setiferum), a species scarce in the county, and considered an ancient woodland indicator. Varieties of this fern were much in demand by Victorian gardeners, and so this species, which establishes a parish record, may have taken to the guarry slope when the garden was abandoned.

An entry in the Revd William Cotton Risley's diary for 23 June 1853 provides evidence of the forgotten industry of this lonely place, the making of tiles in Victorian times: "Jones from Fritwell came & I paid him his son's malt bill - I gave him leave to have 2000 draining tiles at my expense from my brick kiln here." Demand for bakedclay tiles in Oxfordshire peaked in the 1840s, and as a result of agricultural depression, brick making became less important between 1880 and 1914. Norman Davis, of Adderbury, remembers being taken to the guarry on his step-grandfather's push bike, in about 1922. The clay was dug by hand. A handsome heritage of Deddington brick is the Old Gas House on the corner of Earl's Lane and Castle Street, built in 1862. As to working in the old quarry, Norman remembers that he saw enough hard labour to know it was not a vocation he wished to follow ! Walter L. Meagher

RAGWORT ALERT Now is the time to act!

Everyone who cares about our environment and countryside will recognise the plant Common Ragwort (*Senecio Jacobaea*). It is an obvious weed in July and August when it grows up to 3 feet tall with ragged edged leaves and a yellow flower, but it is NOW that we need to act to eradicate this poisonous plant.

Some useful information about ragwort

- Common Ragwort is a listed weed under the 1959 Weeds Act, to allow it to grow, flower and spread contravenes the law.
- Further legislation is planned this year when Mr John Greenway MP brings his Equine Welfare (Ragwort Control) Bill before parliament.
- The poisons in Ragwort are called pyrrolizidine alkaloids (PAs). These are dangerous to humans and animals. Evidence of PAs in eggs, grain, milk and honey has been recorded.
- If you had Ragwort growing on land last year, it needs treating with a MCPA or a 2.4-D herbicide as soon as the young plants appear in April. A non-toxic environmentally friendly spray is also available called Barrier H.
- Never allow animals into areas where Ragwort has been sprayed until all the plants have rotted into the ground.
- The only way to deal with fully-grown Ragwort is to pull it up and burn it.
- ALWAYS wear gloves and long sleeves to cover your arms when handling Ragwort and remember to wash your hands when you have finished.
- Ragwort retains its poisonous properties whether growing, sprayed or dried in food.

Ragwort kills horses, donkeys, cattle, sheep and many other plants. Oxfordshire is one of the most beautiful counties with a wonderful spread of animal and plant life and we all need to be involved to protect it from the spread of this dangerous weed.

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Deddington News GLEANINGS FROM THE PAST

DEDDINGTON 150 YEARS AGO

For several years I have been giving in the Deddington News extracts from the diaries of the Rev. William Cotton Risley who lived in Deddington Manor (then Deddington House) in the mid nineteenth century. These diaries are in the Bodleian Library in Oxford, and I am very grateful to them for allowing these to be quoted. Recently there has been a gap in the diaries of approximately 18 months - presumably the volume has gone missing over the years - and before restarting I thought it worthwhile to recap over his early years here. The Rev. Cotton Risley came to Deddington in 1836 when he was appointed Vicar here, having previously been Curate at Souldern He was married to Susan, had a daughter, Betsy, and three sons, Holford, Willy and Johnny, and a further son, Robert, was born later that year. He was a Magistrate as well as Vicar, so all village life was well reported in the diaries. He at first rented, and subsequently bought, Deddington House, adding to the land with it and laying out the garden, and also bought Park Farm next door. Tragically his only daughter, Betsy, died of consumption when she was 18 in 1848, and it was when she was seriously ill that he resigned as Vicar, the Rev. Brogden being appointed in his place. The family remained in Deddington House, and he remained a Magistrate. The diaries recommence in June 1853 - he had been seriously ill the first few months of the year. June saw the consecration of Clifton Church which the Rev Risley had been very involved in planning and supporting financially, and next month I will give his account of the consecration, with the remaining entries for June 1853 following in June 2003. GREAT DEDDINGTONIANS The Revd Dr Maurice Frost

"The weather in London is wet and windy!" So the voice of the pilot on our approach to Heathrow. We were still above the cloud in deep blue skies, in brilliant sunshine, a glorious firmament that had stretched above me during my entire holiday in alpine regions. Inevitably, when returning to England through low cloud into wind and rain one shuts off the present and continues to dream of past days. That wonderful on top of the world feeling, as far as I was concerned, refused to give way to serious thoughts on an article to be written on yet another 'Great Deddingtonian'. The Revd Dr Maurice Frost, Vicar of Deddington from 1924 to 1962 certainly needs to be included in the ranks of memorable local personalities. He is however so well remembered by many present day parishioners that I hesitate to "tell his story". When, some months ago, I wrote a short history of the Church Choir, Topper Davis and Arthur Lewis shared with me many delightful remembrances of this strict, vaguely eccentric hymnologist who, as shepherd of his rural flock, left such a lasting impression on his young Choir boys. I urge them to let us all share their memories of a great man. It really does not take many bribes to set them off talking of "Times gone by". This I discovered when I met, by chance, George Hirons on a sunny Sunday morning in Daeda's Wood. He too remembers the Revd Frost with delight. Many times, he and ten young Choristers travelled in the Vicar's small continued at bottom of next page

ON THE FARM

As I write this we await the first lambs to put in an appearance, so someone got the calculations wrong! But all is not lost as with the recent dry weather we have been able to get on with a lot of field work and the lambs will come when they are good and ready whatever my calculations say.

The ground that was destined for winter beans was too wet to plant in November, so it has now been planted with spring oil seed rape, a crop we have not grown for a long time. It seemed like a good idea at the time as the price for beans was on the floor, but now the rape price is fast heading the same way. However it is a long way to harvest so anything can happen yet. The warm dry weather in mid-March has been a real boon. The ground worked down well for the rape seed



heds and the rooks took full benefit of the soil movement to help with feeding their chicks. It was nice to see that the old white-winged Rook has survived another winter, but I was surprised to see a flock (if that's the right term) of ten Buzzards join them for the feast. The

crops look well for this time of the year and as soon as lambing is over we shall plant the cover crops on the set-aside land, something new for this year in an attempt to reduce the risk of the ground drying out and reducing the germination of next year's winter rape crop. Another experiment for this year is nectar and pollen strips. These will be planted in the buffer zones that we leave between the crops and the water courses. Under the "local environment risk assessment for pesticides" (LERAP for short) regulations we are obliged to leave a wide headland unsprayed and this can become an overgrown mass of weeds and a reservoir of weed seeds ready for the next crop, so we shall plant a mixture of phacelia, sweet clover and borage to provide nectar and pollen for the bees and other insects. This in turn should help the birds and provide some extra honey. We shall have to measure the strips and deduct them from our subsidy claim forms as they are not an eligible crop.

Spring seems to have sprung - well, for the moment at least. The grass is growing, the bees are flying, the clocks are changing and the trout are rising, so on the surface things don't seem too bad for a change, until you remember the landlord, the bank manager and the cash flow. Oh well, it was nice while it lasted.
