Meeting in Town Hall - 16 June 2004

PRESENT: Cllrs Flux (Chair), Alton, Cox (part), Haslam, Rollason, Squires, Todd, Watts, Wood, C/Cllr Jelf, D/Cllr O'Sullivan (part), the Clerk, the Minutes Secretary and 5 members of the public.

10 MINUTE OPEN FORUM

Charles Barker, Lime Cottage, New Street, queried the terms of reference of the working group on parking, and volunteered to join the group. He understood a decision had already been taken to reinstate the damaged verge and not allow parking outside Lime Cottage. The Chairman said, on matters of fact, that the parking group was still being constituted, no decisions had yet been taken and the issue would be raised under agenda item No 6 when the Highways Working Group report was discussed.

TOWN HALL

The lease runs out in 2006 and Deddington Charity Estates propose to extend it for a further 20 years. PC discussed various options; noted that substantial alterations to the (listed) building would be necessary to comply with disability and other regulations; agreed that better use could be made of the Town Hall as an asset to the community; decided that its future would be considered in the context of the Village plan; determined that parishioners will be consulted.

VILLAGE PLAN PROJECT TEAM

There are a couple of vacancies on the Village Plan project team, a mix of councillors and parishioners who will research the views of all residents of the parish on local issues, leading to an update of the Parish Appraisals of 1994 and 2000, revised priorities and a new Action Plan.

NEWS IN BRIEF

- OCC will be asked to trim overgrown hedge at Manor Farm, Deddington, so that pedestrians are not forced on to the junction which is dangerous.
- Damaged grass verges need to be reinstated at Parish Church and Featherton House by those responsible. PLANNING
- PC objection: (i) No 15 The Daedings 2-storey side extension. Over-development; absence of garage; parking problems; impairing neighbours' access to garages etc. Request that case be dealt with by CDC committee, not delegated to officials. (Cllr Flux declared an interest.)
- Application withdrawn: (ii) No 7 Market Place replace front windows with like for like.
- CDC approvals: (iii) Holcombe Hotel erect dwelling with leisure building and garage. (iv) Home Farm, Clifton erect detached stone house and double garage: construct new access to highway. (v) The Hermitage, Market Place - repair south gable, replace window and rebuild chimney. (vi) The Archers, 2 Archway Court, New Street - conservatory to rear, porch and first floor window to side. (vii) ex-Deddington Post Office - new front door and window, and internal alterations. (viii) Pekein Cottage, St Thomas St - 2-storey rear extension. (ix) Little Hardres Cottage, High St - remove existing extension, erect new single storey side extension. (x) South Gate, Market Place - replace 3 windows at first floor front.

- Upper Heyford Airbase Planning Forum. Next meeting 7 July. Copy of Draft Supplementary Planning Guidance, May 2004, available at Parish Office, Windmill Centre. <u>SOUTH EAST REGION</u>
- Responsibility for regional planning policy has been shifted to an un-elected body, without adequate prior consultation. The Regional report, due out in November, allows for only two months' consultation. PC and C/Cllr Jelf expressed concerns. PC to write to Keith Mitchell (OCC) and Tony Baldry MP on this and also on the specific issue of regionalisation of the Fire Service.
- TRAFFIC NEWS IN BRIEF
- Clifton footpath build-out to be completed by end August. • Hempton - new illuminated sign to be installed end July. •Deddington - sharks teeth and road markings completed end June; gates, roundels etc end August. <u>AYNHO ACCIDENT</u>
- PC to write to County Councils of Oxfordshire and Northamptonshire, following the recent fatal accident near Aynho. Remedial and preventive action is needed urgently, so that a known danger spot is made less hazardous.

MUCH ADO ABOUT PARKING

- The new project team on parking already has more than enough volunteers to fill the 3 or 4 vacancies for parishioners, to work alongside councillors. To ensure that the group is balanced, councillors will contact the interested individuals, assessing their motivation for joining the team, and the ability/experience they would bring.
- On the question of whether to restore the damaged verges outside Lime Cottage, and the implications for the safety of the 3 young children living there (with their parents), PC will continue discussions with all concerned. PC policy is clear - no designated or allocated parking spaces for residents; protection of grass verges. With C/Cllr Jelf's help, a compromise solution must be found.

PLAYGROUND SAFETY

Annual inspection report by external examiners noted a number of small issues now being addressed by the Village Stewards. PC decided that full monthly safety monitoring will be carried out, ratified by PC, actioned as appropriate and filed with Official Minutes of PC meetings.

- Invoices passed for payment totalled £6,143.44, including £789.96 imprest account, chiefly stewards' wages; £2,942.79 grasscutting and weedkilling, £665.78 clerk's wages.
- Investments totalled £574,863.29, of which £9,603.44 Barclays (£1,338.79 imprest + £8,264.65 current) @ 0.1%; £1,000 Bradford & Bingley @ 2.35% on 120 days; £564,259.85 West Bromwich @ 4% overnight.
- Annual Accounts 2003/4 have been passed by Internal Auditor, approved by PC and forwarded for National Audit.

ROGER NOBBS moved to Castle Farm, Deddington in 1991. After growing up on the family dairy farm and attending college, he learnt sheep farming at Dunthrop House, near Heythrop, from Nancybell Gregory, whose daughter Ann he married in 1967. Until their move to Deddington, they ran Dunthrop, winning many cups and trophies. Roger himself was a Crop Judge. In 2003 the Banbury Farmers Association gave him the Tony Baldry Award for 'an outstanding lifetime contribution to agriculture and farming clubs'. Modest about his own achievements, he was immensely proud of Fiona's and Duncan's. Deddington is indebted to him for clearing rights of way across his fields and creating extensive tree plantations on his land.



Christian Aid Week 2004

The Living Rooms Project - One year on

The project was launched on July 2003 and much has happened since!

Our aim was to raise £40,000 to be shared equally between the new room inside the church (replacing the curtained-off area directly opposite the main entrance door) and for a support group in South Africa helping children infected and affected by AIDS. So far we have raised nearly £15,000 and aim to raise the rest of the money by the end of next year.

The project to build the room in church was given an excellent start thanks to some very generous donations and, as we have internal church planning permission, we are starting building soon. Bids are awaited from interested builders to start the work. The rest of the money being raised is needed to fit the room out.

We have already sent the first £5,000 to support the project in South Africa. This is being added to money raised locally to build a new church for the community so that their existing church can be used to house and support the orphans currently in an inadequate temporary building.

I was interested to read Our County Flower. I was born in Oxford and from when I was quite small have understood that the Snakeshead fritillary was the flower of Oxfordshire. It is used as the emblem for the Oxfordshire Federation of Women's Institutes and I have a very attractive badge with the flower on it.

I was born and lived in New Hinksey. As children we would go over the lake bridge to the water meadows between the railway sidings and South Hinksey where there was a huge meadow full of Snakesheads, as we

called them, and a very pretty flower we knew as 'Milkmaids'. There were Kingcups in the opposite field - those large and glossy Buttercup-like flowers. As children we did, of course, pick all of them in their season. A neighbour tells me that there is another large meadow full of Fritillaries at Ducklington, apparently coloured mauve because the flowers are so dense.

Deddington News GLEANINGS FROM THE PAST

GEORGE ROBERT WING - 1908-1997

"It's an ill wind that blows no good!" Had it not been for the outbreak of World War II and fears of raids on London, George Wing, teacher in a Fulham school, would not have been evacuated with his school to South Oxfordshire, and Deddington might never have known him as the distinguished Headmaster of the all age Elementary School and, ten years later, in 1951 as Headmaster of the new Windmill Secondary Modern School in Hempton Road. Although the Windmill was to remain in 'temporary' buildings for the next 16 years, there was nothing 'temporary' in what Headmaster Wing achieved with the youth in his expert care. Bob Stevens, Deputy Head Teacher at the school recalls: "I always admired George as a man with a mission - a man before his time. He took pupils on school journeys all over the country culminating with exchanges in Denmark and Bavaria which proved to be the inauguration of European Studies. Many scholars had never travelled abroad and a boy peering out of the carriage window at German commuters exclaimed: 'They look just like us'!"

George Wing certainly was an innovator. A founder member of the National Council for European Studies in Secondary Schools, he was also on the National Council for Environmental Rural studies. He had the first working farm attached to a school. He encouraged the study of Technology which, incidentally, brought fame to the Windmill when pupils of specialist teacher Douglas Ward won a national competition with their entry of a hovercraft and a racing car. During the war years George Wing was commissioned in the Home Guard and joined the Civil Defence team and still had the time to contribute a great deal to village life as Secretary to SS Peter & Paul Church Parochial Church Council and a Deanery Synod member.

Just writing of all his commitments makes my head spin, but there is more to come. He was also Treasurer and three times President of the Banbury & District NUT Branch. In 1967 he oversaw his school's move from the Windmill to the new purpose-built Warriner Comprehensive School in Bloxham and became the Warriner's first Head. He retired in 1973.

George Wing died in West Sussex, near the home of his daughter in 1997. On the 6 November 1998 his daughter and family, many friends, teachers, old pupils and a few Warriner scholars assembled in the grounds of the Warriner School to watch the planting of a Magnolia tree dedicated to his memory by the Revd Ken Reeves, Vicar of Deddington.

I visited the school grounds last month and am delighted to report that the late flowering Magnolia, well guarded against attacking geese, looks a picture of health. Its shiny green leaves are almost hiding the first huge red-purple flower with plenty of buds ready to open any day now. At the back of the school is the Farm and on a distant field graze a large flock of sheep. George Wing's spirit of innovation is alive and well, thanks to the many teachers who have followed in his footsteps.

DEDDINGTON 150 YEARS AGO

The following are extracts from the diaries of the Rev. Cotton Risley for the months of July and August 1854:

- 11th July An unfortunate Navvie was killed near the Heyford Station by the train passing partly over him he having fallen asleep between the sleepers - from drunkenness it was said.
- 13th July A Breach of Promise of Marriage case tried at the recent Sessions, when the lady obtained a verdict of £400 damages against the defendant.
- 16th July Left home for a month to go to St. Leonards at Hastings.
- 16th August J. Calcutt came to talk over the conduct of certain persons towards him - in consequence of his proceedings at a recent Vestry for the purpose of deciding what was best to be done with the Town Pool in its present state. Mr. Brogden and others had behaved in this matter most disgracefully and partially (as Chairman) and is endeavouring to get Calcutt turned out of his office as Post Master. I wrote to Lord Canning the Post Master General on behalf of Calcutt - begging him to enquire into all matters laid to his charge by Mr. Brogden and 11 others.
- 19th August I. Fortnum came on business and talked about the Town Pool - and the Pest House - in connection with the Feoffees,
- 28th August We convicted a man named Sparks of Oxford, a returned 'Transport' [convict], for netting pheasants at Barton sent to prison for 2 months.

THE FLOWER GARDEN

While those opening their gardens had plenty to do keeping everything tidy, we ordinary gardeners carried on with our usual tasks. The last of the bedding plants had to be put in and kept moist in an unusually dry spell. I was given some Fuchsia cuttings this year and hope for the best. Fuchsias are pretty; they have an amazingly long flowering period. They are quite easy to keep over the winter and don't take much kick-starting to get them going again in the Spring. Worth trying, even if they are not my favourites. I don't like the way you have to stand on your head to look inside the bloom. Besides, they are overdone, too much make-up for my taste, but undoubtedly very pretty blooms. The Fuchsia was brought to this country in the 14th century when men risked lives and fortunes to find new plants to please their monarch. A Dr Fuchs (the name means Fox) went on a voyage to Mexico and Chile and brought back seeds and plants. In those days medicine was looked down upon as a messy job and not greatly respected, whereas botany and related subjects were admired and Dr Fuchs got his rewards. This often meant that Botanical Gardens were regarded as medical gardens and attached to Hospices, like the one at Oxford. Anyway the Fuchsia settled down in our northern climate and all sorts of colours, climbers, bushes and standards were produced. As always when a plant is taken out of its natural habitat, allowances have to be made. They don't overwinter out of doors too happily but need the minimum of care once they are under cover. They make good attractive patio specimens and, like them or not, make easy arrangements. Try them!

The new bed we made with plastic under bark chips has done all that was required of it and has been easy to look after. A success story.

Are there any Thistle lovers out there? We have potted up a few and I shall be pleased to give them away for next year. Also seeds of the Lymnanthea 'Fried egg' edging plant. Just give me a ring and we'll arrange something. *Maxianne Elsley* 338251



CLIFTON IN YESTERYEAR

St James Church in Clifton was consecrated on 10 June 1853 and although it is now de-consecrated and used as offices, St James Day, 25 July, used to be a great day for everyone in the village with celebrations for the anniversary of St James Church, as described by Mrs Laurie Gardner.

Clifton held several Flower Shows in conjunction with St. James Day. Here is her account of the second Flower Show, held on Monday 16 August 1880, in Clifton School. (St. James Day fell on a Sunday that year, so the celebrations were held a few weeks later): 'On Monday, August 16th, a second flower show was held in the schoolroom. In the afternoon, the mothers of the children attending St James Sunday School, were provided with a capital tea at the residence of Mr. Day, the Schoolmaster. A number of races were afterwards held in a field, the winners afterwards receiving their prizes in money. Repeated cheers having been given for various friends, the company adjourned to the schoolroom, headed by Hones Band. The room in the meantime had been lit with numerous Chinese lanterns, which shed a pleasing glow on the flowers, fruit, etc. A few songs having been given. Most of the company made their way to a barn, where dancing was kept up with much spirit for some hours."

A church service was held on St. James Day with the Choir singing on at least two occasions the Hallelujah Chorus, and there was always a band in attendance. Each year there was a Choir outing for the Choir boys. In 1886 the trip was to Rhyl in North Wales, and the return fare was 5/-. (25p)

On St. James Day in 1897, at a public tea, 'a handsome gift of a tea service for 60 persons was presented to the village by Mrs Hall of Boulderdyke, and Mrs. Gibbons, in memory of Her Majesty's Diamond Jubilee.' In 1955 Mrs Gardner wrote: 'The tea service, though much depleted, is still used for Jumble Sales, Whist Drives, etc.'

In June 1903, the Jubilee of the Church was celebrated with a tea, to which 146 people sat dawn. A handsome Prayer Book, for the use of the officiating minister was presented to the Church by the parishioners, to commemorate the 50th anniversary. Two white alms bags were made and presented to the Church as a Jubilee gift, by Miss Mary Williams, of East Ham, who was granddaughter of Mrs Harris, late of Boulderdyke.

Notes: The Clifton School mentioned above is now a private house, just west of Castle Antiques. The Schoolmaster's residence was the house called 'Sedgehill', on left as you enter Clifton from Aynho. *Carol Drawmer*

Broadband4Deddington

Now that Broadband [aka ADSL] is available, http:// www.adslguide.org.uk has a beginners guide, an explanation of how it works and guide to suppliers of Broadband. Study the Frequently Asked Questions on http://www.adslguide.org.uk/ganda.asp.

ADSL works over one of your current phone lines, allowing both voice (or fax) to work simultaneously alongside broadband access, which is always on. Your Internet Service Provider arranges for a BT engineer to fix the line, keeping your chosen phone number.

If more than one computer needs access to the line, you will need a router rather than a straight modem, which your ISP may supply free. An RJ11 cable is needed to link your BT socket to the computer - lengths up to 30 metres are available. Your phone plugs into an adaptor with a microfilter, which may cover all your extensions if they are all are fed by the same line.

If you now have a second line (for a fax and/or internet access), broadband means that you could need only one. Broadband can save money on what you currently pay for the extra line as well as Dial-Up internet access.

The **DN** editor now has broadband. Discussions are in progress to see if each month's copy can be quickly uploaded as PDFs (Acrobat Reader freeware needed) to the D-o-L site soon after publication. Contact him if you, or distant friends, would like to be alerted by email when it is available.

A Larger Ark

It was Darwin who made us think more broadly of species number: their variety amazed him. The prevailing notion was that species were constant and that all had been created, according to Genesis, in one

day. Animals entering the ark were 'every species of cattle, every species of creeping things that creep along the ground, every species of bird, everything that flies, everything with wings.'

The notion of 'all species' was not so thorough in biblical times as it has become since the invention of the microscope (there are on average 500 species of microbes in the human mouth) and the rise of plant and

animal taxonomy. We know, for example, that there are already more species of beetles than all other kinds of insects combined, and many more are yet to be found.

Last spring I had a chance to hear one aspect of Darwin's heritage with implications for life in Oxfordshire: Recording and Conservation Day at Wolfson College, sponsored by the Northmoor Trust. Any one of us may adopt an interest in a given species or family of organisms, and take up that interest as one would take up stamp-collecting. River voles, pipistrelle bats, and staghorn beetles - creatures precious in earth's green economy - have already drawn widespread attention.

Britain has only three native snakes. The adder (*Vipera berus*) was represented at Wolfson by a man who spoke

passionately for its protection. Few hunt for adders; few know their habitat (dry grassland). The guardian for Oxfordshire adders complained, with mock disappointment, that when folks happen upon an adder, they fail to tell him!

Bees and wasps had their representatives as well. Two recorders had netted flower-visiting species, trapped ground-nesting species, and compiled a list for Shotover Hill Park, Oxford. The naturalist's pleasure is recording. Each species added to a list excites the hope of another. Although ants belong to the same order (*Hymenoptera*) as bees and wasps, they were not collected on Shotover.

This is a pity, but also an opportunity, for ants, having evolved complex societies, are fascinating without being as toxic as wasps and bees.

The Longcot Churchyard Group came as representatives of a habitat, not a creature. In this they may have been more like Noah. The group is 30 activists from a village (which won the Best Small Village in Oxon award in 2002) with a total population of 500. The churchyard is the ark: a Peaceable Kingdom where they make compost, record gravestones, and compile lists of butterflies, beetles, birds and plants. In Deddington, SS Peter & Paul is an ark too: primary school children in red sweaters visited last summer and found centipedes under logs, ivy-leaved toadflax on the wall, and an orange lichen on a gravestone. *Walter & Meagher*
