The gathering of about one hundred and sixty, divided into smaller groups according to ages, then go outside for organised games, ranging from games and tennis to "Test Cricket". Regular meetings are held for six weeks from Monday to Friday, the latter being particularly so when film strips are used and the necessity of Christian living is presented.

Two £3,000 Fire Stations Opened at Deddington and Hook Norton

LORD MACCLESFIELD "CUTS THE TAPE"

THE FIRE fighting resources of the county have been greatly increased by the opening on Tuesday evening by Lord Macclesfield, chairman of the Oxfordshire County Council, of two new fire stations, costing approximately £3,000 each, at Deddington and Hook Norton. The new stations, housing the latest mobile fire fighting appliances, are voluntarily manned. They replace the derelict buildings which formed for many years the headquarters of the local fire fighters. The new stations will be a great boon to the fire brigades in the county, as they will be able to respond to any fire within a few minutes time control under the remote control calling system to be operated from Banbury Station, which is manned by a full-time staff.
