Medical profession

At the beginning of the period 1800-1819 John Griffin was the resident surgeon/apothecary in Deddington. He was listed in the <u>Universal British Directory</u> 1791.

Griffin seems to have been an entrepreneurial type, since in 1800 and 1801 his name appears as local agent for the payment of Hair Powder Certificate Duty and Armorial Bearing Tax.¹

He is listed in 1806 as one of the 17 Deddington members of the 'Deddington Association for the Protection of Property, and Prosecution of Felons and other Offenders'.

Griffin died in 1809, and his executor was William Griffin. John Griffin is listed as owing 103 acres under the Inclosure Award 1808.

Griffin appears to have been succeeded by Richard Ordway, who is recorded as proprietor of 2 acres in 1808. Ordway had a house and apothecary's shop near the parish church, with a close of 3 acres adjoining, when he died in December 1816, following which the premises were offered to let.

It seems that Edward Price and John Wilson, surgeons, took over Richard Ordway's business. Their partnership was dissolved in 1819, Wilson thereafter practising in Deddington on his own account.
